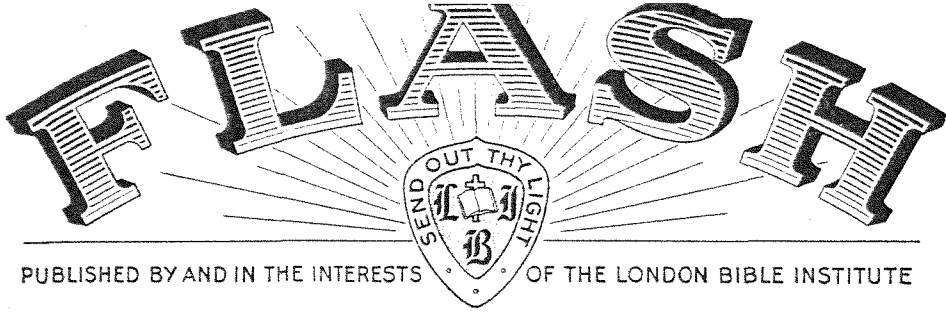

FACULTY SKETCHES

MR. EDWIN HARTILL, Dean of L.B.I.

Mr. Hartill was born at Cambridge, Ohio, U.S.A. He received his higher education at Muskingum College, New Concord, Ohio, where he received his B.A. degree. His musical talent was very much in evidence during his college days—his chief training being in violin.

He majored in speech and was training for "Little Theatre" work, in which no doubt he would have been highly successful. But God had other plans for his life and when he found the Lord Jesus Christ as his personal Saviour he began training for Christian service at Northwestern Bible School in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He received his Bachelor of Theology degree from the Evangelical Seminary connected with Northwestern. Here he was director of the Glee Club.

The Hartills came to us directly from Northwestern and L.B.I. was fortunate in getting them. Mr. Hartill has certainly demonstrated not only his musical talent but his versatility and ability as instructor and now as Dean of the Bible Institute here.

Although he has been in charge of our musical department, Mr. Hartill has specifically trained and prepared for teaching the Bible and has indeed proved to be highly efficient in this capacity. His musical ability, along with the consecration of his talents to the Lord, has resulted in some good work by the Institute Choral Club, of which the members, with a few exceptions, possess little more in the musical field than a great determination to sing for the Lord.

We thank God for Mr. Hartill—for his consecration, spirituality and ability—and we pray that God may use him in these last days for the training of ambassadors of the cross and consequent winning of lost men into His glorious Kingdom.

"The Lord has certainly taken care of us wonderfully and has supplied all our needs and most of our wants.

"If you could just take a peek at dear old China for awhile you would be drawn all the closer to the One Who has lifted you from the mire of sin. Even as I sit here in my study writing to you I can see a boat plying up the river selling incense sticks to burn in front of the boats and before their idols. Nearly every sampan has about a two-foot section taken from their limited space for their idols and ancestral tablets and nearly all the time there is a light or incense burning before them. But, praise the Lord, eleven followed the Lord in baptism and over ninety river folks gathered around the Lord's Table, remembering Him by partaking of the symbols of His body and His blood, which He has commanded us to do until He comes.

"Since starting this letter I have been to a Chinese wedding feast. Today the bride invited us to eat her rice and tomorrow, after the ceremony, we eat the groom's rice. This will be my first wedding and as I prepare for it I am reminded of my own wedding nearly three years ago. My, how time flies! Honestly, since coming to China time has flown by! For tomorrow I tremble because I am apt to make so many mistakes. In the ceremony there are a lot of 'FOO's' to be said and there are six to ten for this word and every one of them meaning a different thing. For instance: it can mean a husband, to shout, withered, a skeleton, bitter, tiger, to command, rich, trousers, to bail water, married women, father, and so on. So you can see what I might do if I happen to call the groom a father and the bride a tiger or something like that. I could get myself into a peck of trouble.

"Since I started this letter I have been down with my first attack of malaria and believe me it has been no fun. But, praise the Lord, I am some better now.

No element in stewardship is more significant than the use of time. All devout Christians realize the importance of employing their time to best advantage in the Master's work. But in the mad rush so characteristic of twentieth century civilization, so-called secular demands have a tendency to draw us away from the true path of service. However, the necessity of earning a livelihood, among other things, compels the majority of us to come in daily contact with the world of affairs. Yet this circumstance should not be permitted to detract from our usefulness. Rather, it should add to our opportunities for service to God and humanity. In a sense, no occupation is actually secular to those who are interested in Christ's Coming and the establishment of His Kingdom on earth.

But we, as Christians, are confronted with the problem of the proper distribution of the time at our disposal. However, in this we are not left without a guide. Bible instructions are quite explicit regarding this question. In the first place, we are urged to spend a portion of our time in prayer:

"... in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known unto God."—Phil. 4:6.

Christ, our great example, spent much time in prayer. The psalmist recognized the importance of supplication when he wrote:

"Evening, and morning, and at noon, will I pray, and cry aloud: and he shall hear my voice."

Another vital element in the utilization of our time is a study of God's Word. Without a knowledge of the Scriptures our efficiency as stewards is seriously impaired. Here, too, the Almighty's instructions, as expressed through the lips of His servant, Paul, are clear and plain:

"Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."—II Tim. 2:15.

While seasons of prayer and study are indispensable, the conscientious steward realizes that a goodly part of his time must be devoted to positive action for the Master and in the interests of mankind. The command to "follow Me" is a call to service. The Christian life is anything but a state of inactivity. Here again Christ set the example: "... my father worketh hitherto and I work." (John 5:17.). The number and character of His accomplishments during a three-year ministry have been the marvel of the ages. The great work of redemption, of course, He alone could perform. That Jesus expects His followers to be workers is indicated in many passages of Scripture. The order: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15) was no easy commission.

Rest and recreation are also factors of great importance. The human organism requires a periodic cessation from labor in order that it may regain vitality. This "recharging" of the body does not always necessitate physi-

mental exercise is essential to the storing up of energy requisite to the efficient performance of our daily tasks. Consequently, many earnest labourers in the Master's vineyard would accomplish more if they developed a hobby or followed some other form of regular recreation. Christ recognized the desirability of a change of scene. After a certain strenuous day He said to His disciples:

"Come ye yourselves apart into a desert place and rest a while." (Mark 6:31.)

Prayer, study, work, rest and recreation all have a just claim in regard to the manner in which the "faithful and wise steward" uses his time.
