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

GRADUATION

May 22 was a lovely day for the 15th annual graduation. Thirty-seven students received their diplomas from the Bible Institute Division during the evening exercises at H. B. Beal Technical School Auditorium, thus bringing the total number of graduates up to 234. Three young people received degrees from the Theological Seminary Division.

To the Freshman, three years seem like a decade, but they soon slip by and then each student must say sorrowful goodbyes to friends who have become dear during institute days. The happier view of Graduation lies in the look to the future—a future of service for the Lord Jesus Christ.

There are at present 70 graduates who are in foreign missionary service or under appointment. 194 graduates are now engaged in full time Christian service. Many more are either obtaining further training or are waiting for the Lord to open doors.

The impact and contribution of L.B.I. & T.S. is increasingly being felt in the varied fields of Christian service.

SUMMER SERVICE

There will be little in the way of a "vacation" this summer for our students. From reports received thus far most of them will be engaged in some form of full-time Christian service during July and August. A number of men will be occupied in evangelism and pastoral work in Ontario and the Maritime Provinces. Many of the young women will be busy in organizing Daily Vacation Bible Schools for the purpose of instructing boys and girls.

Pray for these young people that by Spirit filled ministries they may win many to the Lord Jesus Christ during the summer.

A NOTE

From The President's Desk

"The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom."—Proverbs 1:7.
"The wise men are ashamed, they are dismayed and taken: lo, they have rejected the Word of the Lord; and what wisdom is in them?"—Jeremiah 8:9.

Why is a Bible School training so important?

No doubt you have heard this question asked many times. Perhaps you have asked it. Without seeking to be presumptuous, we should like to suggest a few reasons why it is important. Space permits only abbreviated answers, but we hope they may be helpful.

First, the Bible is the only source of wisdom that will stand the test of the ages. This alone is "wisdom that cometh from above". The Word of God makes this unique claim for itself; history corroborates it, and the experience of the growing Christian witnesses its approval.

Our second reason is that education without Christ is but drinking at the disappointing and corrupt pools of materialism and atheism. Dr. D. L. Marsh of Boston University, in his Presidential Report, said, "When we leave religion out of our educational program, we practically announce that life can be explained without God, which is the same thing as saying that either God does not exist or is of no consequence. The natural result is to rear a generation of practical atheists who live in an atmospheric pressure of secularism, and whose philosophy of life is crass materialism."

Our third reason is that a Christian education is, fundamentally, learning what God has to say through His Word, searching its treasures to appropriate them as life's most valuable possession, and imbibing its precepts as thought and life patterns. We must not make the mistake of thinking that an education in a so-called Christian atmosphere is necessarily a Christian education. If it is Christian, it is Christ. If it is Christ, it is the Word of God, not related subjects. There is no substitute for a knowledge of the Sacred Scriptures.

Bible Schools of higher education are geared to do this kind of work. Their chief subject is the Bible, which they approach academically and devotionally. Their aim is to train for a purpose, to educate for life, to prepare for service. The Bible Schools are centers of specialized training. Their products are specialists in Bible knowledge. To these schools has been assigned the task that no other educational unit is doing. Therefore they need your prayerful support and personal encouragement.

We have been asked to state our attitude toward the new Revised Standard Version of the Bible. The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the Board of Directors at their annual meeting June 12, 1953.

"Whereas the London Bible Institute and Theological Seminary believes in the plenary, verbal inspiration of the Scriptures in the original autographs, and whereas the newly published Revised Standard Version frequently undermines conservative Christian truth, let it be known that the Board of Directors and the Faculty of the school consider that the use of this version should be limited to comparative and critical private study by discerning students only, and that it should be referred to with the same reservation and precaution that one uses in consulting other liberal versions and religious works."
