SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT

With a sincere desire to increase its usefulness to its constituency the London Bible Institute and Theological Seminary has announced a new "Bible College Division" specially designed to appeal to young people who have completed high school work and who are qualified to take more advanced training than is now provided in the Bible Institute Course.

The courses in this new Division will follow the same general plan as the courses previously offered, in that they will be Bible centred while at the same time they will maintain the highest standards in Bible College work. Two important changes between the former policy and the new program are (1) that the Bible College students and Bible Institute students will meet in separate classes, and (2) that the specialized courses have been moved from the Bible Institute Division to the Bible College Division. Students who successfully complete four years' work will receive the degree of Bachelor of Theology. This will apply to those who specialize in the Pastors' Course, Missions Course, and Christian Education and Music Course. The degree of Bachelor of Re-ligious Education will be given for successful completion of three years' work in Christian Education, and a diploma for three years' work in a Gen-eral Bible Course.

The details of the curriculum have been worked out by the Academic Committee, headed by the Dean, the Reverend Percy Harris, and approved by the Faculty and Board of Directors. The President of the London Bible Institute and Theological Seminary, Reverend Alden A. Gannett, believes that in raising the standard of academic training for those who have completed high school the institution will be rendering a much better service both to students and to the churches and mission boards. The new college level program will be in keeping with the requirements of the Accrediting Association of Bible Institutes and Bible Colleges, and Canadian Universities, and will also follow the excellent example set by such leading evangelical schools as Moody, Biola, Nyack, Providence, Philadelphia, and others. It has been the experience of these schools that the raising of academic standards has resulted in an increase in enrollment rather than a decrease.

The London Bible Institute and Theological Seminary, while providing this advanced course on a college level, will maintain the Bible Institute Division offering a course available to students who have not finished high school work but who desire to become equipped for Christian service. The Institute Course will be a General Bible Course and successful completion will entitle the student to a certificate of graduation. The new terms both are 18 weeks in length.

The chief advantage of this new program is that students may come to the London Bible Institute and Theological Seminary and receive as fine a training as that offered by a university with the added advantage of an integrated program of Arts and Biblical studies.

Dear brethren in Christ, our resource in this great work is the Lord God Almighty! The Psalmist declared, "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord, which made heaven and earth." We earnestly covet from you, our friends and co-labourers, faithful, intercessory prayer. Pray, pray much, pray believingly, and God will do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think. Forward we go—on our knees. May we count on you?

MID-YEAR CONFERENCE

The annual Mid-Year Conference of the London Bible Institute and Theological Seminary was held January 18-21, with the emphasis being "Missions". The speakers for the occasion were the Rev. Ezra A. Shank, executive director of the South Africa General Mission. and past President of the Interdenominational Foreign Mission Association, and the Rev. David H. Adeney, missionary secretary of the Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship International.

Rev. Shank, whose job it was to show the Bible Basis for Missions, pointed out from Scripture that the Basis of missions is a Person, whose life's work, death, and resurrection are a mystery from the world's point of view because of spiritual blindness on its part. It was soon clearly evident, however, that in a measure to each saint these same things are a mystery because of a lack of complete appreciation of them. It was likewise clearly evident that the more each Christian enters into a deeper appreciation of these truths, the heavier will be the burden on his heart for the lost, and the keener will be his missionary vision.

That the missionary program is a very vital part of God's program of the ages was clearly pointed out from Scripture by Mr. Shank as God was seen to allow the fall of man, to provide a Saviour, to raise up the Apostle Paul as a missionary to the Gentlies, and to commission His own today to go "into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature".

It was the task of Rev. Shank, Rev. Leander Roblin, of Benton Street Baptist Church in Kitchener, and Mr. Gordon Donaldson of the L.B.I. staff, to deal unitedly with the subject of "The Local Church and its World-Wide Missionary Vision". This they did by stress-ing the fact that each local church member is already a missionary and that by his own personal testimony, as well as by uniting his resources with the rest of the local church to meet the challenge at home and abroad, he can play the part that God would have him play. A statement made by one of these speakers seems to summarize this phase of the conference. The statement was, "The question is not-Shall I be a missionary?', but since every Christian is one automatically. 'What kind of a missionary shall I be?'"

Rev. David Adeney, assisted by his brother, Rev. Ronald Adeney, and Mr Shank, was assigned the discussion of the theme, "The Student's Missionary

Perspective", a task for which he proved well qualified. Under the title, "Chang-ing World—Changeless Christ", Mr. Adeney spoke of the chief forces in opposition to Christian missions abroad today, nominal Christianity, nationalism, and communism, each one of which presents it own peculiar type of opposition. These forces were capably an-alyzed by Mr. Adeney and appropri-ate action was suggested to cope with these forces wherever found. Discussion groups dealing with different mission fields such as Africa, Israel, India, and China; and with different types of missionary fields such as the rural areas of Northern Ontario and Quebec, and the university campus were used to broaden the perspective of everyone who attended the conference so far as needs, obstacles, and methodology were concerned.

As this well-balanced program came to a conclusion, the testimony of those who attended was that not only had everyone been more fully enlightened regarding the world situation pertaining to missions today, but again and again they had been reminded of the most important factor in missions submission.

The following excerpts have been gleaned from recent letters to L.B.I.

"Enclosed you will find a cheque for five dollars (\$5.00) to be used to carry on the Lord's work at L.B.I. We are indeed grateful and praise the Lord that there are still such Christian colleges, who train and send out such fine pastors as ours, Rev. ——. I cannot express in words just what Pastor and his family have meant to us. Daily we thank God for such a loving, gospel-preaching, and Biblebelieving servant of God, and we pray that He will see fit to leave him with us for years to come, if the Lord tarry.

"My prayer is that our precious son, Richard, who is now 13 and in Grade 9 in a Christian high school, will continue to serve the Lord, and who knows, feel called to continue his training at L.B.I."

"Three weeks ago we went to El Tocuyo and four received the Lord, one of whom has joined the catechism class. The following week the meeting was in Buen Retiro where a goodly number gathered to hear the Word but none accepted the Lord.

ous. The Christians do not wait for the missionary to send them out. They go out witnessing to their neighbours and although many make public profession of their faith in the chapel, most of them have been won to the Lord through the personal work of the believers.



LIBRARY TO BE MOVED

As our school expands and the level of its academic training rises, the importance of the library naturally increases. Consequently to assure the more effective use of the library, it is being moved from its present crowded quarters to the basement of the new chapel. Book shelves are already prepared to accommodate 10,000 volumes. A special section of the study area will be devoted to reference works. with periodical racks and reserve shelves. Tozer on the theme, "The Man God Uses". Immediately following there was a lecture and discussion period on missionary progress from the first century to the present day. During the afternoon, small groups of students met in one of the many buildings on the campus to discuss lands and methods.

Meal time afforded a splendid opportunity to meet missionaries and students from other schools and other countries, some of whom participated in the evening praise and prayer service. Evening messages were brought by Dr. Paul White, Mr. William Nagenda and Rev. Alan Redpath.

The young people who attended the convention left Urbana with hearts dedicated to the Lord and a determination to serve Christ "Today on the campus, Tomorrow in the world".

NEED

We are frequently asked by the Christian public for information concerning our policies and methods of financing the work at L.B.I. This is a faith enterprise, and we look to the Lord as the source of our supply, believing that He will prompt the friends of the Institute to assist in this ministry of training young people for His service.

Our yearly budget is approximately \$80,000.00. About \$39,000.00 of this is secured from student a tuition fees, room and board, cafeteria sales and other miscellaneous revenue. The remainder must come from those whose hearts that have been challenged by the Lord to support this basic missionary enterprise.

May I share a pressing burden with you? We need \$1,200.00 this month to meet the next mortgage payment on our new building. There is only \$76.00 in our Building Fund Bank Account to meet this payment.
