ABSENT FROM THE BODY . . .

. . . PRESENT WITH THE LORD

On February 7, 1909, at Parry Sound, Ontario, there was born one who was destined to become "an earthen vessel" from whom the "treasure" of the gospel was to shine forth so clearly that it was completely obvious "that the excellency of the power" was "of God" and not of her. This selflessness endeared Miss Jean C. Scott to all who knew her, but it was especially used of the Lord to enable her to win and retain the confidence of every student who trod the halls of L.B.I. between September, 1944, and January, 1957, the date of her home-going.

Not only had Miss Scott been prepared academically for her task by her graduation from both the Toronto Bible College and the University of Western Ontario, but also she had been equipped by the Lord with those spiritual graces which in an outstanding manner characterized her life—the graces of love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness and self-control.

Throughout all of her years of ministry at L.B.I., these graces were abundantly manifest. They were evident in her letters which were used so often by the Spirit of God to draw many students to the school. They were seen daily in the quiet, consistent, humble Christian testimony that she bore. They were revealed in the letters of encouragement to the alumni, in her intense interest in them, and in her fervent prayers for them as they laboured in the Lord's harvest field around the world.

Speaking at her Memorial Service of the motivating factors in Miss Scott's life, President Gannett pointed out that one of the chief among them was that one recorded in 2 Corinthians 5:9, "Wherefore we labour, that, whether present or absent, we may be accepted of Him". Many verses of Scripture might have been selected to present the same truth, but no better one could have been chosen, for this verse records both the ambition which was uppermost in her life and the result which was accomplished by the Spirit of God through her.

Miss Scott's labours for the Lord on earth have been completed. Still, she being dead yet speaketh. And what is she saying? Even as she exhorted us by her life, so does she now by her death: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord." This steadfastness characterized Miss Scott until the very moment of her homegoing. The memory of this life, so dedicated to God, shall ever be to us who remain a voice proclaiming, "Be ye steadfast". By God's grace we will!

IN MEMORIAM

A Memorial Service for Miss Jean C. Scott was held at 11:00 a.m. Thursday, January 31, 1957, at Central Baptist Church, London, with her Pastor, the Reverend A. R. Pyke, officiating. Pastor Pyke was assisted by the former President of L.B.I., Dr. James N. Bedford, who paid tribute to his former close associate at the school; by Dean Percy H. Harris, who gave further words of tribute and led in prayer; and by President Alden A. Gannett, who delivered the message from the Word of God.

Pallbearers were: F. B. Dixon, W. H. Hulbert and E. A. Hunt from the

Board of Directors of the school. With them representing the Faculty were Dr. L. D. Beckman, Dean F. R. Koksma and Dr. W. D. E. Matthews. The burial service, conducted by Dr. Bedford, was held at Mooretown, Ontario, near Courtright, where Miss Scott's father ministered during her earlier years.

Miss Scott's death followed an extended heart ailment which, though her's from her teens, had troubled her acutely since September of last year.

She is survived by her brother, Mr. Karl E. Scott of Bloomfield Hills, Michigan.

A second Memorial was established for Miss Scott by her brother who requested that, in lieu of flowers, gifts be made to the London Bible Institute. Already \$360.00 have been given in her honour. Moneys received in this fund will be used in some special way as a lasting memorial to our beloved Registrar.

NEW BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR COMES TO L. B. I.

Well known in London Christian circles, particularly as an executive of the Gideon Camp in London and an active worker in Central Baptist Church, London, Mr. Peterson has for some time had the desire to devote his business experience to the Lord's work and is looking forward with real delight to his association with the London Bible Institute and Theological Seminary.

Mr. Peterson accepted Christ as his Saviour. They have one son, Darrell, seventeen years of age, attending Collegiate.

Since then, they have taken an active part in Christian work, forming an Auxiliary in Windsor and Chatham, with the help of Christian friends, for the Mission to Lepers. Mr. Peterson was the first Secretary of the Gideon Camp when it was organized in Windsor and has held all offices on the executive of the Gideon Camp in London. All the family are members of Central Baptist Church, where Mr. Peterson is active in Sunday School work and past chairman of the Board of Deacons.



FORMER TEACHER ADDRESSES HOMECOMING

Special speaker for Alumni Homecoming was Dr. John R. Dunkin, Dean of Baptist Bible Seminary, Johnson City, New York. Dr. Dunkin was formerly on the faculty at L.B.I., and Pastor of Wortley Road Baptist Church, and his return served to make the weekend more meaningful to homecoming graduates.

Dr. Dunkin's messages emphasized the basic principles of the spiritual life as revealed in the Old Testament and confirmed by the Apostle Paul. Supported by his thorough knowledge of Biblical and theological fields, Dr. Dunkin's ministry was both stimulating and challenging.

In his messages to the alumni his emphasis was that all-important principle, "Thus saith the Lord . . ." Friday morning he used the text, "Thus saith the Lord, let not the wise man glory in his wisdom, . . . but let him glory in this, that he understandeth and knoweth Me . . ." In another message on the subject of discouragement, he employed the text: ". . . if in the land of peace . . . they wearied thee, then how wilt thou do in the swelling of the Jordan?" On Sunday afternoon he spoke from the familiar portion in Lamentations: ". . . His compassions fail not".

The busy Homecoming Weekend included a chapel service and a public meeting on Friday; a missionary forum, games of basketball and volley ball between the alumni and students at Beal Tech., (the students won), a turkey supper, the film "I Found My Messiah", and a public meeting on Saturday; and the closing message from Dr. Dunkin Sunday afternoon.

Of our more than 400 alumni, nearly one-quarter of them returned for the Homecoming weekend.

HOMECOMING FORUM FEATURES MISSIONS

One of the highlights of the Alumni Homecoming Weekend of November 9 to 11 was the Missionary Forum of Saturday morning. The missionary panel consisted of nine graduates of L.B.I. in the persons of Miss Joyce Ager, missionary appointee to Haiti with the Unevangelized Fields Mission; Miss Marie Armstrong of the South Africa General Mission headquarters, Toronto; Miss Peggy Degnan, Baptist Mid-Missions, Venezuela; Miss Marion Lankin, Baptist Mid-Missions, Africa; Rev. Jack McKillop, Baptist Mid-Missions, Jamaica; Miss Muriel Vanderlip, Christian Missions, Inc., Africa; Miss Winnifred Price, Far Eastern Gospel Crusade, Japan; Miss Ruth Wardell, American Board of Missions to the Jews, New York City; and Mr. Donald Wunker of the Unevangelized Fields Mission, Dominican Republic.

Under the leadership of President Gannett, our alumni submitted such questions to the panel as those concerning the relationships between the home church and the missionary on the field, types of churches established by the various missions, and problems caused by nationalism. The members of the panel, representing a cross section of missionary work throughout the world, exchanged views relative to each individual situation.

Our 1956 Homecoming Weekend accomplished four things. First, it gave to our graduates and friends a new appreciation of the world-wide task to which our beloved school is dedicated. Secondly, it was a step toward the removal of the division that has existed in some of our minds between home and foreign service. Thirdly, it gave to us all a fresh appreciation of the problems which the missionary faces. Finally, it presented much information and challenge to our students who are facing the first phases of application to mission boards and thence to deputation work.
