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How can they hear without a preacher?

Or. Harris' Works Follow Him

When President Harris passed away on November 2, 1959, telegrams and letters of sympathy poured in to Mrs. Harris and the school. LBI alumni, other schools, friends and associates wrote in appreciation of his life and ministry.

Some of the inspiring comments follow.

"We shall be eternally grateful to the Lord for Dr. Harris. His life made an impact upon ours which we cannot express."

"Association with him has been one of the eventful friendships in my life. I was constantly aware that he was entirely dedicated to his Saviour."

"We will never think of Dr. Harris without remembering his happy, radiant face. We also remember how precious God's word was to his heart and how faithfully he gave it to us."

"Our family is the fruit of one who dared to preach the truth."

"Some of the lessons learned at school under his gracious and patient instruction are indelibly imprinted upon our experience. Above all else, he lived before us a shining e ple of the truths he taught. We knew he walked with God."

"Those of us who knew him . . . can testify sincerely to his love for Christ and his constant to the walk before men. He leaves behind him a great challenge to all of us in this respect."

Many people regretted that they were unable to attend Dr. Harris' funeral, but the Health laws of Ontario demand a private funeral for polio victims within 24 hours of death.

On Sunday morning, November 29, Central Baptist Church, London, of which Dr. Harris was a member, held a memorial service for him.

MEMORIAL FUND ESTABLISHED

The desire to erect a tangible memorial to this man of God prompted the Christian Business Men's Committee of London and LBI to establish the Dr. Percy H. Harris Memorial Fund. Because the work of the school was such a concern of his, the fund has been designated for a new girls' dormitory or much needed renovations to the present facilities.

Those whose lives have been influenced by Dr. Harris can make this memorial possible by sending their gifts to this fund.

LBI Earns Accreditation

LBI has become the second Bible College in Canada to be fully accredited by the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges.

Since the school was accepted as an associate member in 1956, its methods, faculty, facilities and courses of study have been examined in detail.

The A.A.B.C. organized in 1947, is recognized by the American Council on Education and the U.S. Office of Education. As yet no comparable organization exists in Canada.

Of the more than 200 Bible Institutes and Colleges in Canada and the U.S., 37 are now accredited members. Moody Bible Institute, Columbia Bible College, and the Mennonite Brethren Bible College, Winnipeg — the other Canadian member—are typical of this Association.

WHAT DOES ACCREDITATION MEAN?

Every buyer knows that the label "Guaranteed by Good H ekeeping" stands for *quality*. It means that the product has been thoroughly tested and approved. You may have confidence in it.

I.BI has a new label — credited". The school has been tested and approved by an organization requiring a high level of academic and spiritual training. The A.A.B.C. insists on a vital Christian atmosphere and missionary vision. An accredited school merits the confidence of both students and the Christian public.

Well-known Christian colleges in the U.S. recognize our new "accredited" label. For example, our graduates may transfer to Wheaton College and earn a B.A. degree in two years or less instead of three or four. Recently a graduate with a B.R.E. was accepted by Columbia Bible College to begin work towards a Master's degree.

Accreditation does not necessarily open doors into all Canadian colleges and universities. In Canada each school evaluates another school individually. Accreditation, however, will help our graduates gain more recognition.

Accreditation is not the climax of our development, but a stepping stone. As God enables, LBI will continue to develop in the *quality* of young people it prepares.

The Challenge of Christian Education in Canada

Experts do not call the world's population increase "expansion". They call it "explosion". In one generation, 40 years, they estimate the world's population will be tripled. In China alone enough babies are born annually to repopulate Canada

Does this "explosion" affect us? Today Canada has an estimated 102,000 college students. In five years our college population is expected to double to 204,000. To meet this leap in enrollment, existing universities are expanding. The University of Toronto is completing a \$12,600,000 expansion campaign. The University of Western Ontario has plans for a \$13,000,000 development in the next five years. New colleges and universities, such as York and Sudbury, are being planned in Ontario.

As evangelical Christians, we must ask ourselves, "Are we ready to meet the demands of the greatest decade in Canadian and world expansion?" To meet them, we must keep abreast of the increasing number of college age Christian young people. To reach the exploding population we must have hundreds more pastors, missionaries and Christian workers.

faculty has revised almost every department of the school to develop better equipped leaders. LBI's services to the Christian public have been enlarged.

Already, last September's incoming class was 50% larger than the year before. This year our inquiries are almost double last year's.

Dever before has the challenge been so great, the responsibility so heavy to develop well-trained Christian leaders as today.

Let us rise to the challenge! Pray and give that LBI will be ble to play its part in the crucial days ahead.

Administrator Appointed by Board

Upon the homegoing of our president last November, the Board of Directors appointed Mr. Harry Morrison as Administrator to lead our school until a new president is chosen.

Mr. Morrison came to LBI as Extension Director in January, 1959. His administrative experience is an invaluable asset. He has already spearheaded the 10-year expansion program approved by the Board last fall.

As a firm exponent of the principle that sound administrative practices should characterize all phases of the Lord's work, he has been asked to address such groups as Missionary Internship Inc., and the executive group of the Evangelical Foreign Missions Association.

Before coming to LBI, Mr. Morrison was an Employee Relations Manager in charge of personnel - employee - labour

relations. He was responsible for management development and campus recruiting of university students. Often he has been called to act as a member of arbitration and conciliation boards set up under the Labour Relations Act.

Mr. Morrison is a member of the Christian Business Men's Committee executive in London, of the Board of Directors of Missionary Internship Inc., Detroit, and of the executive committee of the Guelph Bible Conference Grounds.

"Today, more than ever before, there is a vital need for education that has as its root the infallible Word of God," Mr. Morrison says. "Christian Education is no mere eddy amidst the flowing stream of thought and human need. It is vital and relevent, and brings every field of knowledge and aspect of life into direct relationship to the Eternal Word."

Pray for Mr. Morrison as he directs the school's program and outreach.

We are thankful for the sy readers who already belong to our Stewardship Fellowship plan. If you will suggest names, we would be glad to send them information about the school.


Evening School Enthusiastically Received

Missions Counsellor Comes to LBI

A man whose life passion is missions is now our Mission Counsellor.

Rev. Elwyn Davies, Director for Canada of the Bible Christian Union, and a former missionary to Holland and western Europe, spends three days each month at LBI, speaking in chapel and counselling with students about their place in world-wide missions.

Mr. Davies' aim is to develop in our students a spiritual basis for becoming missionaries. "This is a slow building process," he says, "that produces the kind of missionaries needed. Young people who are dependent on an emotional response to the need of millions without Christ tend not to get to the field." Obedience to Christ's commission must be the deep, enduring motive for going.

A quiet spoken Welshman, Mr. Davies resolutely presents God's demands for discipline and obedience. His chapel messages put steel into our souls. "The man who serves God has no right to expect not to suffer," he says. "He must

avoid entanglements, which will deter him from fulfilling God's will, even if they are good, legitimate things."

After completing Bible School in Wales, Mr. Davies planned to go to Czechoslovakia as a missionary, but the war stopped him. During the war he travelled through most of Africa and the Middle East and was able to observe much missionary work.

In 1945 he became a missionary in Holland, and then came to Canad. 1953 as the Director of the Bible Christian Union. This faith mission, founded in 1904, has missionaries in most of Europe, and reaches Jews and ethnic groups in U.S. and Canada. Alternate years he attends a field conference in Europe.

Mr. Davies' present great interest is Quebec. "I love it," he comments.

His wife and family live in Hamilton. With a proud but merry twinkle he says, "I have four children, all sons, except for four daughters!"

In the front of Dr. Harris' Bible, Mr. Davies found a statement that sums up his desire for our students. "God does not want me to surrender to be a missionary, pastor or teacher. He just wants me to surrender."
