Trained At LBI – Used Of God

Revival does happen today. Read what graduates Don ('56) and Thelma ('57) Webster wrote about the work of the Holy Spirit in Wainwright, Alaska.

Don and Thelma have served there under Wycliffe Bible Translators, Inc., for two years.

"Revival has come to Wainwright. For the past ten days we have been exulting in the incomparable joy of spiritual revival. Every Eskimo in our village of 250 who is over 16 years of age has been saved or revitalized except for four or five. The young people have been particularly touched, and we know that this is a definite answer to your prayers as well as ours.

"You have been praying for the immediate needs of the village, as well as the translation program. God has marvellously answered, 'exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think'.

"How can we thank you enough for promoting this great move of the Holy Spirit? Pray for us now, that we may guide the new converts into spiritual realities. I now teach all the young people from ages 16 to 35. We shall begin a study of Romans, which book is printed in the dialect of Eskimo. 'Let everything that hath breath praise the Lord. Praise ye the Lord'."

Men Ought To Pray



I am sorry for words. They are tertribly abused. Take this word "ought". It is a prince among words, yet it is often associated with a mere trifle.

No such humiliation of it occurs in the Scriptures. This mighty word rings out its trumpet note in the realm of moral duty — and not least where our Lord teaches the necessity of prayer. "Men ought always to pray" (Luke 18:1).

Let the force of that "ought" grip us, and we shall confess that neglect of prayer is sin. Samuel was conscious of this truth as he committed himself to pray for Israel: "God forbid that I should sin against the Lord in ceasing to pray for you" (I Sam. 12:23). Notice that failure to pray was not merely sin against his people, but first was sin against God.

This fact is true because God instituted prayer. He established it as a way of communication between the human heart and Himself. Establishing means of communication is sometimes costly. Think of the Pennsylvania Turnpike being bored through mountains, or the Atlantic cables being laid on the ocean floor. Yet their cost cannot compare with the cost of the communication line called prayer. To establish this line, Christ had to take away the sin of the world with His precious blood. If the institution of prayer was so costly to God, then "men ought to pray".

Prayer is also an acknowledgment of God. The Proverbs exhort: "In all thy ways acknowledge Him" (Prov. 3:6). The man of the world does not acknowledge God, first because he wants his own way rather than God's will, and second because he feels that he needs no help from God. It is nice to know that God is there to help in a pinch, but otherwise let Him mind His own business, whatever that is!

The man who prays has a very different philosophy. To him, God's will is paramount and must be sought for and carried through. He believes that he needs God's daily enabling to do His will. This man acknowledges God. So men ought to pray because prayerlessness is practical atheism.

Prayer is God's method of operation. When He would end Judah's captivity in Babylon, He set Daniel to pray. When he would bring His Son into the world, He had His Simeons and Annas praying and waiting for the consolation of Israel. And when the Lord comes again, He will return in answer to the prayer of the church: "Even so, come, Lord Jesus" (Rev. 22:20). God thus unites His people with Himself in His great purposes. Men o ught to pray because prayer is participation in the works of God.

"Praying always . . . for all saints," writes the apostle Paul and then adds, "and for me". As you, dear friends, fulfil your prayer responsibilities, allow me to insert an "and for us". God's purpose for London Bible Institute will be fulfilled as you and I pray. May this grace be ours!
