VII-JESUS CHRIST IS LORD

The resurrection was just me man step in the exaltation of the Son of God, who had humbled Himself and become obedient even to the death of the cross.

The exalted place to which He has been raised is the right hand of God (Eph. 1:20), or as variously stated, "the right hand of the Majesty on high" (Heb. 1:3). That is the seat of highest honour, of supreme authority, of universal governance.

The exalted title which He bears is LORD. Now as the apostle Paul says, "there be . . . lords many" (1 Cor. 8:5), both among the heathen deities and among men. But how empty is the dignity! As it sits upon Jesus Christ, however, it assures the ultimate bowing of every knee before Him, and the confession of all men and angels, that His lordship is supreme and absolute. As given to Jesus, this is "the name which is above every name" (Phil. 2:9), betokening the deity of Him who bears it. Even "doubting Thomas" recognized this, and therefore in acclaiming Jesus Lord also acknowledged Him to be God (John 20:28).

The exalted office which the risen and ascended Lord holds is that of Priest. God gave a miniature picture of the priestly office in the Levitical order, the shadow of the reality to be revealed. Now the shadow has been removed, and we are privileged to enjoy the services of the better Priest, who is after a better order, who offers a better sacrifice, in a better sanctuary, supported by better
