Beginning in September, 1963, LCBM will offer a new program in music instruction for anyone interested in studying from grades 1 to 6.

Instruction in the Saturday School of Music will be conducted by both LCBM music faculty members and music students. Young people will be able to take private lessons in piano and brass instruments. Vocal lessons as well as classes in theory and harmony will also be available.

The music department at LCBM is conducting this new program because we believe that music study plays an essential part in the total educational experience of each individual. Through this program we hope to create a greater love for good music.

VIII-THE BLESSED HOPE

The more the element of interpretation enters the field of doctrine, the less dogmatic can we afford to be. Because the element of interpretation is stronger in the field of prophecy, we need to move with caution here, allowing that differences may arise among men equally committed to the authority of Holy Scripture. It is surely a mistake to give systems of interpretation, however revered the men who hold them, the authority of Scripture itself. But when the Word speaks clearly, we may, and must, speak unequivocally!

We believe that the Bible teaches, as a matter of basic truth, that Jesus Christ will come again — not in humiliation as before, but "in the glory of the Father and the holy angels."

We believe that His comina will be personal, and is not to be equated with death or such historical events as the fall of Jerusalem in A.D. 70, or the great Reformation of the sixteenth century. His promise to the disciples in John 14:3 means nothing if it does not point to a personal return. The angelic message in Acts 1:11 specifies "this same Jesus" who "shall so come in like manner as ve have seen him go." The apostle Paul's comforting message to the Thessalonians affirms that "the Lord himself shall descend from heaven" (1 Thess, 4:16). These and other great passages cannot be de-personalized.

We hold the Lord's coming to be premillennial, and indeed we think that it requires a lot of interpreting of Scripture to believe otherwise. This teaching predicates a literal reign of



Christ on earth, the length of which gives it its name, the millennium. Premillennialists are accused of building their doctrine on "one obscure passage in Revelation" (chapter 20:1-7). We reply that the passage referred to is far from an obscure one, and that it is in perfect harmony with hosts of other passages, in the Old Testament and the New Testament alike. Without such a premillennial return of the Lord, and a consequent millennial reign, great portions of the Old Testament must go unfulfilled. Where, then, is the unfailing word of God?

Our statement of faith on this doctrine has one more word — imminent. This simply means that so far as we know, so far as revelation has been granted, that great event (or shall we say series of events?) which we embrace in the term 'the Second Coming of Christ,' may burst on us at any time. Whatever may be on God's secret schedule of events before the Lord descends from heaven with a shout, to receive His church to Himself, is beyond our knowledge. To us His coming is imminent. We are not looking for a nuclear war, or the man of sin, or the great apostasy, although the shadows of these loom on the horizon. We look for "a Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ," and that alorious Rapture which will mean "forever with the Lord."
