OUR NEW STUDENTS

The halls of LCBM are once again echoing with the voices of students returning for another year of study. Many faces are new but already these new students are contributing to the life of our school.

The freshmen, 21 men and 16 women, come from throughout Ontario, Eastern and Western Canada. Representing 12 denominations, the students have enrolled in courses leading to Bachelor degrees in Arts, Theology, Christian Education and Sacred Music. Twenty-one of the new students have post-high school training. Among these are two doctors, four nurses, three teachers, one student lawyer and ten with previous theological or university training.

Two of the new students have won Ontario government scholarships because of high marks obtained on Grade XIII departmental examinations.

An \$800.00 Scholarship and Bursary Fund has been established and personally maintained by the Faculty of LCBM. Scholarships are awarded to students of outstanding spiritual and academic achievement.

Chapel Echoes VI

Psalm 143:10 - "Teach me to do thy will; for thou art my God: thy Spirit is good: lead me in the land of uprightness."

Why should the will of God be done in my life? Simply because He is God. Whoever is our God must have his way with us. If we are insisting on having our own way, we are by so much claiming the place of God, and denying His godhood, while seeking to establish our own. We remember Lucifer's series of "I wills" in Isaiah 14:13, 14. He was determined to be his own God, and that is exactly what is involved in our lack of submission to God. The logic of this text is inescapable: "Thou art my God; therefore, Thy will."

Did you notice that word "teach"? There is a profound implication here - that I can neither know nor do the will of God without being taught. The knowing and the willing and the doing do not come naturally, for we are sinners, and need to have our faculties trained in this holy exercise. This, then, is the prayer of the disciple. The student may say, "Teach me the body of doctrine, the techniques of service, the philosophy of the Christian life, the history of the Christian church," but the disciple prays, "Teach me to do thy will." One may be the most brilliant student and be no disciple. We want all our students to be disciples, who make their studying part of their obedience to the will of God. That lifts it onto the plane of discipleship.

When we speak of doing the will of God we quite naturally have in mind the big epoch making decisions of our lives. The dedicated Christian seeks to be led of God in the choice of a career or calling, in the important auestion of marriage, or other great matters in which a mistake could have tragic and life-long repercussions. But this is a prayer for every day, and a prayer for all day, and a prayer that should cover all our conduct, all our decisions. Was it not Thomas Carlyle who said that the casting of a pebble from his hand altered the centre of gravity of the universe? We cannot know how far-reaching an apparently small act may be. Therefore we must surround all with the prayer "Teach me to do thy will." Practice in the small things will fit us for the big decisions.

The rest of our text tells us the character of the will of God. "Thy Spirit is good." Therefore, whatever God's Spirit leads us to do will be good, kind, beneficent. "Lead me in the land of uprightness." Indeed God will never lead us in any other land. His will can never have a streak of dishonesty or lack of integrity. This is one of the tests to apply to anything that offers itself as the will of God. To learn that lesson is to have a big answer to our prayer.
