Easter Tidings

The resurrection of Jesus was the keynote of the apostolic message. It was this that gave certainty to their declaration that Jesus was the Christ. It was this that illumined His death, bestowing upon it a truly redemptive significance. It was this that enabled them to proclaim with all confidence "that Jesus Christ is Lord." The faith they preached was not faith in a set of principles, exemplified by One now dead. It was "the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me" (Gal. 2:20).

The resurrection which the apostles preached was a new thing, something which none before Jesus Christ had experienced, on the basis of which He should show light to Jews and Gentiles alike (Acts 26:23). It was foundational, without which their preaching would be void of content, and faith itself would crumble to ashes (1 Cor. 15:14-18). Moreover, it was a resurrection which embraced all who should believe in the Lord Jesus Christ. He was the Firstfruit, and the harvest was sure (1 Cor. 15:20-23).

Such a resurrection was something more than the persistence of personality through death, more than the survival of the spirit. It involved the body. Those who deny the bodily resurrection of our Lord admit that the empty tomb constitutes a problem. It was a problem to the disciples too - until they saw the risen Christ. When our Lord showed them His hands and His feet, when He invited Thomas to put his finger into the still open wounds, when He said, "A spirit hath not flesh and bones as ve see me have," was He playing tricks on them, simulating a body and wounds to bequile them into a false faith?

Of course if these are legendary tales that grew up around the idea of resurrection, we are dealing with another problem. But so long as we believe that we have a faithful record, given by inspiration of the Holy Spirit, we have no alternative to a bodily resurrection, and we seek none.

True, a change had come over the risen body of Christ, as indicated in the changed behaviour, and no doubt a further change took place at the ascension. So at the resurrection of the dead in Christ. The apostle Paul is very clear on that point. It is a change from natural to spiritual, from corruption to incorruption, from dishonour to glory (1 Cor. 15:42-44). A like change is promised those "who are alive and remain" at the Lord's return (vv. 51,52). But the change does not make the resurrection non-bodily - neither His nor ours. And if some want to quibble about those whose ashes have been scattered over land and sea, I can only say that that is not my problem. God, who formed us from the dust in the beginning, doubtless has the answer.

What does it mean to me this Eastertide that Christ rose from the dead? In such short compass I cannot say all that it means. Let these few samples suffice for now:

1. It means that I have a living Saviour. His resurrection reflects back on His death and assures me of the remission of my sins through His blood. In addition, He is able to save me to the end, through His prevailing intercessions (Heb. 7:25).

2. It means that I have a living Lord, to whom I owe complete allegiance and obedience, and in such obedience to His will life takes on new dimensions and new meaning.

3. It means that I have a living Friend, who knows me and loves me, with whom I can commune, and who will give unfailing help.

4. It means that I have a living hope, for this Saviour, Lord, and Friend has said, "I will come again, and receive you unto myself" (John 14:3).
