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1965-66 SCHOOL YEAR BEGINS

"Walk Ye in Him" was the theme for this year's freshman class composed of 28 men and 29 women.

As an interdenominational school ten denominations are represented in the freshmen class.

Over ninety percent of the new 57 students come from Ontario. The London, Hamilton, Windsor, Toronto and Kitchener areas were well represented. Six came to us from the United States and one young man came from the Virgin Islands to study. The average age is 22 in the incoming class.

This year we received the largest number of applications ever recorded. What potential lies in these 142 students who comprise our student body! Keen minds and eager hearts are being molded for His Service.

The sense of God's presence is very evident as together our students train so that they might be "vessels fit for the Master's use".

SUMMER 1965

Summer — 1965 — an exciting period of time for the student of LCBM. Hawaii, Canada, Quebec, New England States, Ontario—these were all touched by their ministry. Students held positions as missionaries, pastors, assistant pastors, camp directors, Vacation Bible School workers, camp counsellors, etc. Seventeen of our fellows had opportunities to preach.

Reports from our young people indicate blessing from the Lord, experiences in service, opportunities innumerable for witnessing. Over 300 came to know the Lord through their efforts.

But, the results of the summer are not just counted in the number of services conducted or the number of souls converted. Important and significant changes took place in the lives of these young people.

One wrote—"I have a deeper longing to be in the place of the Lord's choosing." Another indicated —"I have a new sense of the Lordship of Christ. I received the confirmation that God wants me to go forth and **teach**." This student is looking forward to a teaching ministry in the future.

Still another — "I learned that sensitivity to the Holy Spirit is **essential**—I recognize a greater need to **study** and know the Word of God."

"When I was accepted as a summer missionary I felt inadequate realizing the responsibility before me, and yet confident that this was the Lord's will for my life. I experienced this summer the power of prayer as I sought the Lord for strength and wisdom in presenting the Gospel clearly to many children who had no background knowledge of the Bible. I was really aware of the working of the Holy Spirit in my life, and in the lives of the children during our daily program."

"Like many others I knew that the Bible was a two-edged sword, quick and powerful. I was also confident that the Holy Spirit could enter a life and cause it to pass from death unto life when a person confesses Christ as their Saviour. But to actually lead a person to Christ caused my knees to shake, but as I became involved in the evangelism and witnessed the power of the Holy Spirit I was thankful that He could work unhindered by me."

"I have a growing desire to preach God's Word, a renewed dedication to apply myself to the studying of God's Word, and an awareness of my own lack of faith."

"I received far more than I gave. I learned in a new way what it meant to depend on God for physical strength. Night after night I praised Him for working in hearts and lives."

"In my own life—I thank the Lord for my summer experiences. I realized that it was a real privilege to serve the King of Kings. I was keenly aware of the tremendous responsibility that was mine as we dealt with each child."

"I experienced a deeper walk with the Lord, and a real love for the ministry."

"In my life there were results that have affected me greatly. I think one was a new and deeper appreciation for the Christian faith. As I talked to men and saw their empty lives, it made me realize more than ever before that it is a privilege and a deep honour to know God's way of salvation."

How to do it.

Autumn means "back to school" for our vast student population, including the student body of LCBM. Indeed most people feel the quickened pulse that Autumn brings. There is much to be done, and the question is, How to do it? The Bible has some answers, which, if followed, will assure our tasks being well done.

"Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might," says the Preacher (Ecc. 9:10). Now the fuller light of the New Testament affords the stronger reason for putting all we have into whatever we do. The text bases its exhortation on the fact that now is our only chance to do it. Sheol offers no opportunity to make up for our negligences. The larger reason is the relation of "now" to "then". All that we do is related to eternity. What we do and how we do it will affect our place in the everlasting Kingdom of God. See, then, that your hand finds the right thing to do, and then pitch in.

"Whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God" (1 Cor. 10:31). It is a sober thought that the glory of God is committed to us. Now this glory of God rests not only on His children's avoidance of wrong things, but also on how we do right things. It is right to eat and drink, but God's glory is affected by how we eat and drink. If we are gluttonous, greedy, demanding, we shall rob God of glory, while if we are thankful, considerate and moderate, we shall glorify Him. Like principles can be applied to "whatsoever ye do".

"Whatsoever ye do . . do all in the name of the Lord Jesus" (Col. 3:17). Ancient monarchs would on occasion give their signet ring to a trusted servant, so that whatever the servant wrote, whether letter, document, or decree, stamped with the king's seal, was reckoned as written by the king (see Esther 3:10; 8:2). Could our letters honestly carry the name of the Lord Jesus? Could our actions bear His seal? Can it be said of all we do, "This is His doing"? Yet that is what it means to "do all in the name of the Lord Jesus."

"Whatsoever ye do, do it heartily, as unto the Lord" (Col. 3:23). This goes even deeper than the first. It is possible (though not probable) that one might put all his strength into an operation although his heart was not in it. But God calls for the heart, the reason being that whatever I do is to be an offering to the Lord, and He cannot accept a heartless offering. Here is a life-attitude which requires daily practice. It means that whatever cannot be offered to the Lord is out, and everything else is done heartily because it is for Him.

Now then, do it!
