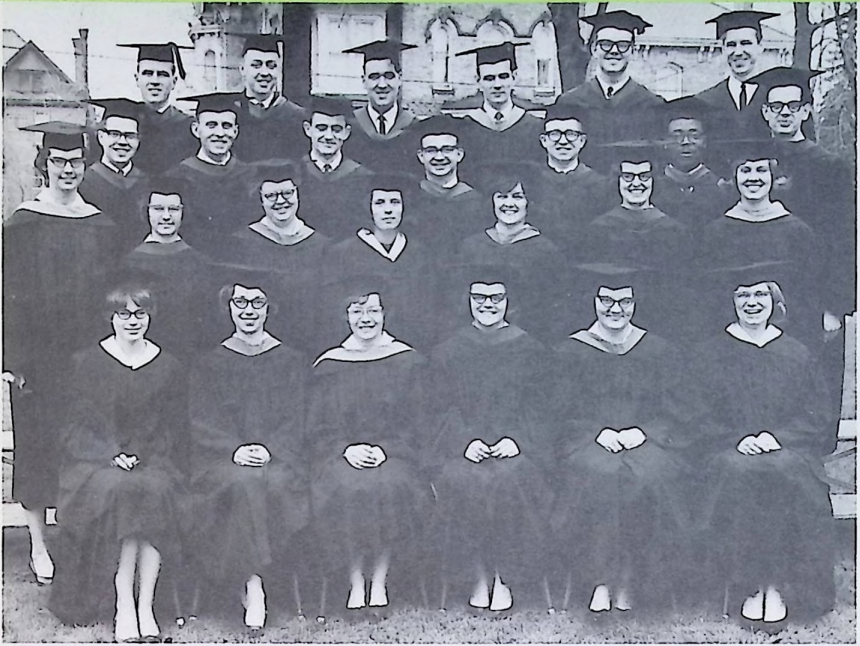

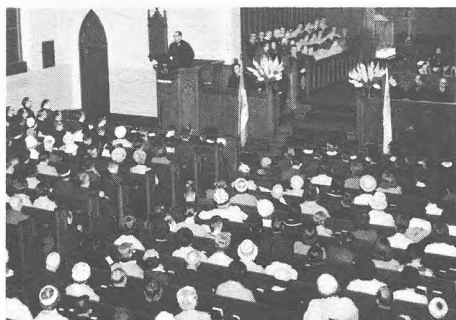

FINANCIAL NEEDS MET

We are praising the Lord that we are able to report to you that we have enough cash on hand to meet all of the expenses of last year. We want to say "Thank you" on behalf of our students to each of you who prayed and gave to make this possible. Of special note is the giving of the alumni. They gave \$10,650 to the school, and earned a matching gift of \$2,650 for gifts over their goal of \$8,000. Their givings were 48% above last year.

In addition, we received a gift of \$6,396 from the estate of a friend of the school who remembered the Lord's work here in her will. This money was applied against our mortgages.

PLANNING FOR THIS YEAR

The number of applications received so far indicates that we will have a student body as large as last year's. We expect to receive many more applications before September. The faculty and staff are busy preparing for the responsibility that will be ours when the students arrive.

One of the responsibilities is to be sure that we will be able next year, as we did this year, to meet the expenses of this training. The students pay only one-third of the cost of their training. The balance comes from the Lord's people. So that you may see clearly what is needed we have printed a summary of our anticipated operating expenses.

The largest portion of this budget relates directly to the classroom ministry of the Faculty.

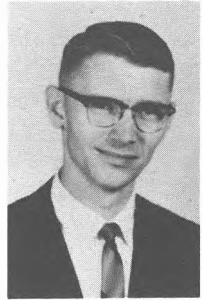

The Church and Education

The world in which we live is a world which must be faced with the claims of Jesus Christ. Population explosions, racial riots, moral degeneracy, and shifting values provide the context in this world of the 20th century. Even simple mathematical calculations indicate that more workers are needed to serve Jesus Christ in this generation than in any previous generation. The opportunities to serve in the church of Jesus Christ are more varied now than possibly in any former generation. How can the church send forth workers to meet the great numerical challenge of a ballooning population? How can the church provide the skilled workers to fulfil the varied opportunities of Christian witness? London College believes that the solution to these questions is contained in its motto "World Evangelization through trained leadership".

Education is a necessary link in the task of global missions — "Go . . . make disciples . . . baptize . . . and teach" (Matt. 28:19). The increase in the number of Christian missionaries during this past century has been directly related to the development of the Bible Institute and Bible College. Secular universities have seldom provided any substantial number of missionary volunteers, but large percentages of the graduates of a Bible College, like London College of Bible and Missions, have responded to the call of Christian missions. 60% of the graduates of London College are engaging in vocational Christian service while a large majority of the remainder serve Christ effectively as laymen and laywomen. Both groups are engaged in global missions.

The modern church has not always been aware that its actions are often visualizing

an incomplete and unbalanced commission. The amount of money set aside in the budgets of many churches for the purpose of Christian Education is not at all commensurate with its importance in the fulfilment of the Great Commission. Few Christian schools are not faced with the problem of inadequate facilities and deficient finances. This problem undermines the effectiveness of this important and scriptural ministry, and thus to some extent means that the equipment of the church's workers for their task is undermined. Of all people Christians should be the ones most interested in training their workers well. These workers have the most glorious ministry of any human to fulfil — "they are ambassadors for Christ".

London College of Bible and Missions makes the service of God in time and eternity its high calling. Students are challenged to "study to show themselves approved unto God, workmen that need not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" (2 Tim. 2:15). This command from the apostle establishes the three areas of concern in our approach to education — "God . . . the workman . . . the word of truth." The student needs to be related to the will of God, to develop the talents and abilities which God has given him, and to obtain a proper knowledge of the word of truth written in the Scriptures. When these purposes are accomplished in the life of the student, then trained leadership is effective in contributing toward world evangelization. The Church which educates is the church which evangelizes.
