Allan Blakney: "I had opportunity to speak 12 times in August. I was asked to take on the responsibility of organizing a church in Talbotville and I am now working there under the direction of the pastor of First Baptist Church in Strathroy."

**Carolyn Brenton:** ", . . There arose a persistent desire within me to gain my fellow employees' friendship and introduce them to the One who would make life meaningful to them." Carolyn relates how after the last day of work she had an unusual opportunity to witness to a fellow-worker. She is now praying that this girl will come into a personal relationship with Christ.

Joy Campbell: "On the 24th of May holiday weekend I was a counsellor at a Youth Retreat in Noranda, Quebec. I had the opportunity of discussing with teenagers the potential of Christianity." Concerning her work she wrote: "There were opportunities for witnessing which have really broadened my view of Christianity and how I as a Christian must present Christ to the nonbeliever. Definitely, the most significant incident was the opportunity of leading my Roman Catholic girlfriend to the Lord."

# **INTO FOCUS**

One of the thrilling experiences for those of us who serve the Lord at LCBM is the arrival of the students. To sense their enthusiasm and vitality brings into focus for each of us the importance of training young people for "World Evangelization".

Anything that is worthwhile costs something. It is costing these young people much in terms of personal and material things to train for our Lord's service. # Buying Up The Opportunities...

"Proclaim the Message, press it home on all occasions . . ." (II Tim. 4:2, NEB)

Whither Rome? Pope John XXIII declared the need for an up-dating of the Roman Church. At the last ecumenical council in Rome two distinctly Protestant emphases were recognized — a) the importance of the Bible as "divine truth" and b) an awareness of the Person and work of the Holy Spirit.

How shall we interpret this? At the WHEATON CONGRESS last April, some 930 evangelical mission leaders heard their brethrer, from Latin American churches wisely issue a word of caution: — "Always the Same! — is still the motto of this church whose history demonstrates her unchanging purposes in spite of changes in some externals down through the ages."

LET US SEIZE THE CURRENT OPPORTUN-ITIES FACING US AS EVANGELICALS! As the Wheaton Declaration said, let us "rejoice in the wider use of the Scriptures among Roman Catholics," even to the extent of praying "that all those who study the Scriptures will be led by the Holy Spirit to saving faith in Christ." To stop here would be folly, yes, SIN! Let me suggest two very practical ways we can "seize today's unique opportunities for witness among Roman Catholics":

1. In OUR OWN COMMUNITIES, maybe across the street, are members of the Roman Church. Many of these rarely attend a service, except perhaps on special occasions — Christmas, weddings, christenings. They are not likely to respond to invitations to

come with us to Gospel meetings. However, we can begin small, NON-CHURCH-RE-LATED Bible Study Classes in a home, led by evangelical laymen. (Preachers might frighten them away.) We can capitalize on this declared freedom to read and study the Word. Let us wisely use editions of the Scriptures that have the approval of "the Church", eg., Knox, or, better, perhaps, the R.S.V., or the French "Louis Segond Bible". This coupled with ardent, believing prayer for Christ-likeness in our own lives PLUS the working of the Spirit of God in their lives, could lead to the salvation of many.

2. FRENCH CANADA! Whenever a people is in revolution, whenever men are questioning their customs, their religion and their political affiliations, they are avowedly open to new concepts and new direction. Quebec and the rest of French Canada are in such turmoil today. Our evangelical workers there report not only a wider interest in the Gospel, but also success in its proclamation — not in great mass meetings, but in individuals turning to the Lord Jesus. This as never before in her four centuries of history appears to be THE DAY OF THE GOSPEL in French Canada.

But, the cry from Quebec is that trained, evangelical workers are too few. Will you pray — That God will send to us at LCBM young people to train as harvesters for French Canada? He has given us an aim to which as a College we must be faithful — "World Evangelization through Trained Leadership". But, we must have dedicated, young believers to train for His work. Pray them TO us!
