OUR DESIGN.—The great design of the School is the training of consecrated men and women for Christian service at home and abroad.

Increased Attendance.

One of the marked features of the present term is the increased attendance in the Day Classes. The number of students taking the full course of the School is larger than in any previous year. There has been little interruption in the regular attendance from sickness, or from any other cause. The work is proceeding with evident interest and blessing. The attendance in the Evening Classes is about the same as it was at this time last year. The total number of names on the roll at present, including both the Day and the Evening Classes, is about three hundred.

Special Lectures.

The second course of special lectures for the present session of the Bible Training School was delivered during the third week of January by the Rev. H. W. Frost, of Philadelphia, Director of the China Inland Mission for North America. The evening lectures were devoted to the Deity of Christ and the Atonement. These subjects are always of primary importance, and in these days especially, when there is so much confused thinking and unscriptural teaching about them, there is great need of just such a comprehensive, reasonable and scriptural exposition of them as was given by Mr. Frost in these lectures. The morning lectures took the form of Bible Readings on the practical subjects of Dedication and Consecration. They were accompanied with that spiritual grace and impressiveness which mark all Mr. Frost's addresses. It would be hard to over-estimate their influence upon the lives of the students.

The New Courses.

During the absence of Dr. Harris in California, which is referred to in another paragraph, his place in the class work is being supplied by the Rev. Dr. McTavish, of Central Presbyterian Church, and by the Rev. T. B. Hyde, of the Northern Congregational Church. They have each very kindly undertaken in the midst of their busy pastoral duties to give a course of weekly lectures in the Bible Training School. Dr. McTavish lectures on Tuesday evening on the Life and Epistles of Paul; and Mr. Hyde on Thursday evening on the Holy Spirit. These are subjects to which they have given special attention.

Medical Classes.

Shortly after the New Year, Dr. E. Hooper began a special course of lectures for women students, which is being well attended. Dr. Bowie has just finished his instructive course on Diseases and their Treatment. Dr. Howitt's lectures on Tropical Medicine are still continued. They are of special value for mission aries, or for those who intend to fit themselves for nussionary service.

Visitors.

Among the visitors whom we were glad to welcome to the Toronto Bible Training School during the past two months was the Rev. H. W. Pope, of the Northfield Extension Movement, a work inaugurated some years ago by Mr. D. L. Moody, for the purpose of spreading the influence of the Northfield Conferences among the churches. Mr. Pope gave a very instructive talk on some methods of doing personal work. The students have been addressed also by the Rev. J. L. Murray, one of the Secretaries of the Student Volunteer Movement, and by the Rev. H. F. Laflamme, of India. Mr. Murray spoke of the new and great opportunities which are opening up before the Church among the nations of the far East, and of the need of an intelligent study of missions on the part of all Christians. Mr. Laflamme's account of the wonderful revival in India, and of a remarkable answer to prayer in the case of his own mission field, produced a very deep impression upon the class.

From President Harris.

In the middle of January our President, Dr. Harris, accompanied by Mrs. Harris and their young son Erdinan, left for California to obtain a needed rest. From letters received from him, written in Pasadena and Coronado, where they have been sojourning, we learn that he has derived great benefit from the change. He sends his Ohristian love to students and friends of the School, and hopes that every department of the work is doing well. He is very grateful to Dr. McTavish and Mr. Hyde for each taking one of his subjects in the Evening Classes. About the first week of April he hopes to be back in Toronto quite recuperated, and in the meantime we are sure that nothing will give him greater pleasure than to learn that our friends in his absence are not forgetting to remember the School in their prayers and practical sympathy.

Entered into Rest.

In the first week of January, the Rev. Wm. MacWilliam, LL.B., formerly an Instructor of the Bible Training School, after a lengthened period of impaired health, entered into rest, For more than nine years we were associated with him in the School, and we learned to esteem him highly in love for his works' sake. His modest bearing, his fidelity to duty, his interest in the students, his fine scholarship, and his able expositions of God's word, gave great value to his labors as instructor. It was a regret to us all when, through failing health, the Institution had to lose his services. Now, at the age of nearly 70, he rests from his labors and his works do follow him.

Another friend who passed away toward the end of November, 1906, was Rev. Thos. Bone, of the Welland Canal Every year since the opening Mission. of the School he paid us a visit and addressed the successive classes of students. His large and successful experience as a soul winner, and his shrewdness and wisdom in dealing with different conditions of men, gave great value to his homely illustrations and racy addresses. At the age of over 80 he has been called from earthly service, leaving a record of devoted and successful work for Christ, which has rarely been equalled.

The prayerful sympathies of many have been extended to the families and relatives of these two departed worthies.
