Another Session Begun.

The fourteenth session of the School is now well on the way. It opened on the 17th of September with a good enrolment, which has gone on steadily increasing. The actual number of names on the roll at present is not greater than at the same period last year, but the average attendance of students is better. It is interesting also to notice that while last year at this time the women students were in a considerable majority, this year the numbers are about equally divided. The students are all taking hold of their work with commendable diligence and earnestness.

Public Lectures.

The session began as it also did a year ago, with a number of public lectures by Mr. A. C. Gaebelein of New York. These lectures were delivered in the afternoons and evenings of the first three days. The afternoon lectures were on prophetic themes, and were based on the Book of Joel and on two of the Psalms. The evening lectures took the form of a course of expositions of the Epistle to the Galatians. Mr. Gaebelein's unfolding of the teaching of this Epistle was clear and helpful, particularly his explanation and illustration of the difference between law and grace. Many were heard to speak of the benefit they had received from these expositions.

New Lecturers.

We welcome to the number of the Instructors of the School two new lecturers who have been appointed for the present year to divide the subject of Bible Doctrines, formerly taught by Dr. Stewart. The Rev. F. S. Weston is carrying on this work with great efficiency during the first part of the session. The Rev. V. H. Cowsert will continue it after the new year.

Student Organizations.

A Students' Executive Committee was appointed early in the session to deal with matters concerning the general student body. It consists of the following members: Mr. George Tester, Chairman; Miss N. E. Houlding, Secretary; Mr. H. L. Troyer, Miss M. G. Lesslie, Mr. R. E. Jones, Mr. L. R. Rist.

The Missionary Society has been organized with Mr. H. L. Troyer as President, Mr. George Sanderson, Vice-President, and Miss M. G. Lesslie, Secretary-Treasurer. The Society is carrying on a systematic study of China, according to the plan of the Young People's Forward Missionary Movement.

The Evangelistic Band is under the leadership of Mr. R. E. Jones, with Mr. L. R. Rist as Associate Leader, Miss M. E. Halpenny and Miss A. Garbutt as Secretaries. Already much blessing has attended the work which the students have been carrying on in some of the missions throughout the city.

Special Classes.

The morning classes in English are being conducted this year by Mr. Fred Harris, a son of the President of the School, who has recently graduated with distinction from Princeton University.

Mr. Cringan's music class on Tuesday afternoon has been resumed. Very satifactory progress is being made in this department.

The Medical Lecturers this term are Dr. E. F. Bowie and Dr. G. D. Porter. The former lectures every Wednesday on "Drugs and Medicine," the latter every Thursday on "Medical and Surgical Emergencies."

To Foreign Fields.

Since last annual meeting several of our former students have removed to distant fields of labor. Mr. E. C. Austin. Canada's first missionary to Peru, has gone to labor among the Incas, about two millions of whom have no knowledge of the love of Jesus. Miss Maud West, who was a missionary teacher in Argentina, is now at work for the Master at Santa Cruz, Teneriffe. Miss M. E. Standen, who has been home for furlough, has recently returned to her important field in Kiangsi, China. Miss Lily Tilley, who graduated with us, and then took a course of training as a nurse, has sailed for China, under the auspices of the China Inland Mission. Miss Lucy M. Jones has just left for India, where she will labor in connection with the wonderfully successful mission among the Telugus.

We may also state that Mr. Charles Waddell, with his young wife, expects soon to return to Northern Nigeria, and that Miss C. Domm has been accepted for service in the same distant and needy field. May the blessing of God accompany all these friends, and make them wise in winning souls.

The Rev. T. C. DesBarres, M.A.

By the death of Mr. DesBarres on the 2nd of September, the Training School has lost one of its warmest friends. He was a member of the Council from the beginning, and at different times he gave much appreciated assistance, both as lecturer and examiner. He was an earnest Bible student and a gifted expositor of the Word of God. To the great evangelical truths, which the School makes prominent, he gave devoted allegiance and consistent testimony during a ministry of forty-seven years. Our sympathies have been extended to his son and daughter in their great loss. May God raise up others who shall manifest like loyalty to the Scriptures and consecration to the Saviour as our friend did who now rests from his labors.

Another Death.

Mrs. W. J. Standen, mother of Miss-M. E. Standen, whose return to mission work in China is recorded in another column, died very suddenly in this city on Nov. 13th. She was an earnest, faithful Christian and a devoted wife and mother. We sympathize with the bereaved husband and family in their great loss, and especially with our former student, Miss Maybeth, who will not know of her mother's death till some time after she reaches her distant station in China., May the Lord give all needed support.

On Monday'evening, Dec. 9th, a great treat will be provided for all members of the Training School and their friends. An illustrated lecture on Burma, with fine views, will be given in our large audience room by the Rev. Ernest Grigg, returned missionary from that interesting country. Admission is free. An offering will be taken for the cause of missions.

We have been cheered lately by receiving an increasing number of donations from former students, and by their hearty words of appreciation. Two members of our Evening Olasses, now married, write as follows:

"I cannot forget the School or its Instructors. The lessons are too deeply impressed on my mind for that. It is my earnest prayer that the Word of God may continue to be taught in the same clear and powerful way as in former years."

Digby, at Griffin's Corners, Elgin County, where about thirty made a profession of their faith in Christ.
