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## The Fifteenth Session.

We are thankful to say that the Fifteenth Session of the Bible Training School has been in several respects the most successful in its history. The number of students enrolled has been larger than in previous years, and there has also been an increase in the number of those who have gone out to labor as missionaries in different foreign fields. The returns from the different examiners show a higher grade of marking than before, and the Treasurer's report is in every way gratifying. No friend of the School can read the contents of the present issue of the RECORDER without gratitude to our gracious Lord for the past, and hopeful confidence for the days to come.

The names of other friends in important centres are yet to be added to the General Council.

### Fifteenth Annual Meeting.

The fifteenth session of the Toronto Bible Training School closed on Thursday, April 29th, 1909. In the afternoon of that day the annual meeting of the united Board of Incorporation and General Council was held, when the reports for the year were presented and the entire work of the School received careful review and consideration. There was an excellent attendance of members present and much interest was manifested in the continued prosperity of the institution. At the close of this meeting, on the kind invitation of President Harris, the members present with two or three of the instructors had dinner together in the library.

At the evening meeting held in the assembly hall, notwithstanding the rain, there was a very large attendance of friends of the School interested in the graduating exercises and the lecture of Dr. Orr. After devotional services conducted by Rev. Fred E. Howitt of Hamilton, the President made congratulatory remarks on the condition of the School, referring specially to the number of students who have left during the year for foreign fields, and to the fact that nearly one hundred in all had gone to the "regions beyond" since the opening of the Institution. The enrolment of students and the income for the year had also been the largest in the history of the School. Two of the graduates gave addresses, Mr. Lloyd Rist, of Eglinton, speaking earnestly on "Witnessing for Christ," and Miss Abbie Garbutt, of Peterborough, giving a suitable valedictory.

Seventeen young men and women were then presented by Rev. Dr. Stewart for diplomas and certificates, of whom thirteen were regular students, one a post-graduate, and three were evening class scholars. One of the graduates is a former Jewish rabbi from Poland, who had been at the School three years. Another is a young Chinaman who had taken a two-year regular course and a one-year post-graduate course, and who will return to his native land to preach

the Gospel. The following are the names of those who received diplomas: Misses Abbie Garbutt, Lilian Jackes, Janet Longhurst, Alberta Monkman, Myrtle Moore and Martha Wallis; also Messrs. Henry Bregman, Richard H. Clark, Joseph T. Gawthrop, Sydney Hood, Lloyd Rist, Thos. R. Sorton and Dorwin J. Storms. Post-graduate: Mr. Ma Tim Wou. Certificates: Mr. John Cameron, Miss Margaret Duffus and Miss Mary Taylor.

After the President had given the diplomas and certificates, the Principal, Rev. John McNicol, gave parting words to the graduates, urging upon them the knowledge of God, of His Word, and of their fellow-men as conditions of successful service. Dr. Stewart, the Secretary of the School, in view of the completion of his fiftieth year as a minister of the Gospel, was made the recipient of a gift from the students. The chief address of the evening was then given by Prof. James Orr, D.D., of Glasgow, Scotland, who spoke highly of the Toronto Bible Training School, and said it compared favorably with similar colleges he had visited in his travels, both on this and the other side of the Atlantic. He closed with an able, timely and practical address on "The Indispensableness of Holy Scriptures."

### Principal's Report.

The session which is closing to-day has been a very satisfactory one. An increased number of students have attended the classes in both departments of the School. The work has been carried on without interruption and the blessing of former years has continued to rest upon it.

### ATTENDANCE OF STUDENTS.

Seventy-two students attended the day classes for longer or shorter periods during the session, thirty men and forty-two women. Of these, twenty-two were Presbyterians, seventeen Methodists, seventeen Baptists, sever

Anglicans, four Christian Workers, three Mennonites, one belonged to the Society of Friends, and two had no Church connection recorded.

In the Tuesday and Thursday evening classes 155 students were enrolled, 42 men and 113 women. Of these 44 were Methodists, 38 Baptists, 28 Presbyterians, 17 Anglicans, 10 Congregationalists, and the remaining 18 belonged to various other Christian bodies. A large number of others attended the Friday evening class for Sunday School teachers. Altogether, the total number who have attended the various evening classes would be at least 250.

Marked features of the attendance during the year were the number of returned missionaries who took advantage of the opportunity to pursue a course of Bible study, and the number of foreigners among the regular students of the School. One of the two students' public meetings held during the session was of special interest from the fact that the programme was composed altogether of addresses by students of foreign nationalities.

#### COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

Dr. Harris gave expositions of the books of Jonah and Micah and of the Second Epistle to the Corinthians to both departments of the School.

Dr. Stewart gave instruction to the day classes on Christian Doctrines and Bible Interpretation, and also conducted a class for the latter half of the session on the preparation of Bible readings and discourses.

In the former part of the session Mr. Hyde gave a course of lectures twice a week to the day classes on the Holy Spirit, and also conducted a class on Methods of Personal Work. In the latter part of the session Mr. Weston gave a course of lectures twice a week on Eschatology.

The Principal's subjects in the day classes were the Books of the Old Testament, Studies in the Gospels, and Bible Introduction; and in the evening classes

Studies in the Gospels and Old Testament Outlines. He also conducted the Friday evening class on the study of the Sunday School lesson.

Besides this regular work, the following special classes were held during the session: A class in vocal music, conducted by Mr. A. T. Cringan, three medical classes, one on Drugs and Medicine, conducted by Dr. E. F. Bowie, another on Medical and Surgical Emergencies, by Dr. George D. Porter, and a third on Tropical Diseases, by Dr. W. H. Howitt.

Examinations were held as usual twice during the session on the regular work of the School. Forty-two students wrote on subjects taught in the day classes, and seventy-four on subjects taught in the evening classes. The results on the whole in both departments were very gratifying.

#### PRACTICAL WORK.

The work carried on by the students in both the Missionary and the Evangelistic departments maintained the high standard set last year. The Missionary Society conducted a regular weekly meeting for the consideration of missionary topics, a special missionary prayer meeting and a special mission study class, and made extensive use of the missionary section of the library.

The Evangelistic Society held open air meetings in the down town section of the city while the weather was favorable, carried on a Gospel meeting once a week in the Yonge street mission, and were engaged on many Sunday evenings in different churches and missions in the city.

During the year the School was called upon to mourn the loss of Miss Mary G. Lesslie, one of its best students and warmest friends. Since her graduation three years ago she had maintained an active connection with the work of the School, and was one of the leaders especially in the missionary activities of the students.

The spiritual life of the institution was maintained as in former years principally through the Tuesday morning devotional service. The spirit of devotion and consecration manifest among the students continued to deepen as the months advanced. With profound gratitude and thanksgiving we acknowledge the goodness of our Heavenly Father throughout this fifteenth session of the Bible Training School.

### Report of Dr. Stewart.

As Secretary of the School, my work during the year has required constant attention. The correspondence has been quite as large and important as ever, first with friends and supporters of the School who require to be reminded of its increasing necessities; secondly with former students who are at work for the Master in every quarter of the world; and lastly with large numbers of young men and women who seek information and advice about courses of Bible study preparatory to Christian service. The increase this session both in the number of contributors and the amount of their donations, and the larger enrolment and attendance of students are a proof that the work of the office has met with a large measure of success.

I have given courses of instruction to the Day Classes in Christian Doctrines, Bible Interpretation, and the preparation of plans of discourses and Gospel addresses. While I have been graciously spared to do this, and occasionally other work of instruction as necessity arose, with comfort to myself and I trust with profit to the students, I am very thankful that a new Instructor has been appointed, who can now take part in this essential department of the School, and help in the enlargement of its scope and efficiency.

An increase in the annual income of the institution will now be required.

It will be gratifying to the Board and Council to learn that one of our graduates, Miss M. G. Lesslie, who was faithful to the Lord and much beloved, and who died in January of this year, showed her appreciation of the School by bequeathing to it a legacy of \$100. Sir James Gowan of Barrie, for many years an honored Senator of the Dominion, has also named the School first in a list of several Christian Colleges and missions among which the sum of \$4,000 is to be distributed during the next two years.

In the beginning of March a novel and most important public meeting was conducted by six of our students of foreign nationality. Of these two are Jews, one from Poland, and one from Roumania; two are Tamils from Burma, one young man and one young woman; one is a Chinaman and one a Japanese. All the addresses were in English, and all of these students expect to labor as Christian missionaries among their own people.

It is worthy of special note also that during the last ten months no fewer than thirteen of our students have gone from Canada to labor as foreign missionaries in different parts of the world. This is a larger number than during any previous year in the history of the Bible Training School. Miss M. K. Brown left for Peru in June last, where she married Mr. E. C. Austin, also one of our graduates. They are now settled at Lima. Miss Helen Reikie and Miss Charlotte Yarcoc sailed for China under the auspices of the China Inland Mission. Miss Carrie Zimmerman, who got private lessons from myself, went to the Telugu Mission in India. Miss E. E. Hall, one of our early graduates, after a furlough during which she was engaged in Christian work in this city, has returned to her mission service in China. Miss Etta Leaper, also one of our first graduates, now Mrs. Waters, has gone to Swaziland, South Africa. Miss E. Jaeger, now Mrs. Hitch, has settled in Japan. Miss L. Seigrist, now Mrs. Hindle, has gone to Mongolia. Mr. F. X. Stanley, Miss H. Button, and Miss M. A. Witt

left for Northern Nigeria, under the auspices of the Soudan Interior Mission. Miss A. Bartlett, now Mrs. Rice, also left for the same mission field; while Miss J. Brechin has found open doors for her service in Monrovia, Liberia, West Africa.

These now make in all a grand total of nearly 100 students from the School.

who during the last thirteen years have gone to labor in foreign fields in every quarter of the globe in connection with different evangelical churches and missionary societies. Surely we have abundant reason to thank God and take courage. May the future be still more fruitful in results. "The Lord hath been mindful of us: He will bless us."

Mr. Imrie was strongly recommended by members of the Council in Brantford and by other friends of the School. He is a young Canadian with full University education in arts and theology. He is known as an excellent scholar, an able Bible teacher, a successful pastor for eight years, and an earnest and gifted evangelist. He is also a firm believer in the complete inspiration and divine authority of God's holy Word. Let there be much prayer that the best results may follow his services in the School, which will, D.V., begin with the new session in September.

### Jubilee of Ordination.

On the kind invitation of President Elmore Harris and the Council of the Bible Training School, a company of more than 200 friends met in the large hall of the School on the evening of May 15th, to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Rev. Dr. Stewart's ordination to the Christian ministry. The official record of his ordination was presented, and addresses were given descriptive of his pastorates in Brantford, Toronto and Hamilton. Letters were also read about his professorship in Woodstock College, and his work as president of a University at Nashville, Tenn., and of Berea College, Ky. Congratulatory and eulogistic

remarks were made by Dr. Harris and other friends. The graduates of the School were represented in grateful and affectionate letters from Rev. James Desson and Rev. T. G. R. Brownlow; while Rev. R. J. Garrett and Miss A. R. Hitchon made kind and appreciative remarks. Dr. Stewart made a suitable reply, in which he expressed his warmest thanks for all the kind words that had been said, and especially to Dr. Harris, the President, to Mr. Shenstone, the Treasurer, and to the Board of the School for their unfailing sympathy and help during his fifteen years' connection with it. Above all he expressed his devout gratitude to God for the way by which He had led him during these fifty years of Christian ministry, and for the abundant blessing He had bestowed both on the School and on himself.

MR. FRED RUTHERFORD expects soon to go forth to labour in the Soudan Interior Mission, supported by churches and Christian friends in London, Ont.
