The Seventeenth Session.

So far as the number of Day students and the total amount of income are concerned, the report for the Seventeenth Session is probably the best in the history of the Institution. The total number enrolled in the full course has been 76, and the total amount of donations has been \$4,415.00. The interest and enthusiasm displayed by the Alumni, and the valuable practical suggestions they have made, met with a sympathetic reception from the Board of Incorporation and the General Council, and it is likely that several of these will be adopted without much delay. The present issue of our little paper is the joint production of the Faculty and the Editorial Board of the Alumni.

The names of other friends in important centres are yet to be added to the General Council.

Annual Meeting.

The Annual Meeting of the Board of Incorporation and the General Council of the School was held in the Reception Room of the building on Friday, April 28th, 1911, at 4 p.m. Prayer was offered by Rev. R. Wallace and Rev. W. H. Frost.

The members present were the President Dr. Harris, the Secretary Dr. Stewart, and the Treasurer Mr. Shensstone; also Mr. McNicol, Mr. Nasmith, Mr. Kilgour, Dr. Mackay and Mr. Love. Of the General Council there were present Messrs. Hyde, Cole, Penman, Bingham, Dr. Parsons, with Messrs. Gzowski, Roadhouse, Wallace, Frost, W. J. Robertson, Pratt, Orr, Dr. Baldwin, D. Howitt, Messrs. Copeland and Gartshore. Regrets for necessary absence were received from Dr. Hoyles, Mr. Duncan Stewart of Stratford, Messrs. B. W. Robertson, S. J. Moore, Rev. Dr. Bishop, Judge Reynolds, Mr. Elias Rogers, who is out of the city, Mr. Hudgetts of St. Catherines, Dr. Wardrope, who sent an interesting letter, written at the age of 92 years, Mr. A. Stark, Mr. Jno. MacKay and Judge Ardagh, who is at present in the West Indies.

The minutes of the last annual meeting and outlines of the business transacted at the Board meetings during the year were read and approved.

Mr. McNicol presented his report as Principal of the School, giving an account of its work and progress during the year. Dr. Stewart read his report as Secretary of the School. Mr. Shensstone, the Treasurer, followed with his report of receipts and disbursements, accompanied with a comparative statement of the same for three years. Mr. Roadhouse spoke for the Alumni, giving several quite important suggestions, some of them a little radical in their nature. One of these is a change of name for the institution from the Toronto Bible Training School to the Toronto Bible College; another was the securing of a residence for our students, and another was the adoption of still more active measures for securing new students. There were some further

suggestions, but these three are the most important. Mr. Pratt, Mr. Hyde and Dr. Howitt were appointed a committee to act with the Board in dealing with these suggestions and also with certain suggestions made by the Principal. Several members of the Board moved and seconded that all these reports be received.

Mr. McNicol on behalf of the Board of Instruction recommended that Diplomas be presented to the following students who have completed their course of study in the day classes and have passed satisfactory examinations thereon: Miss Anna Margaret Albrecht, Mr. Frank Blain, Mr. Grenville P. It was also recommended that Certificates be awarded the following members of the evening classes, who have also satisfactorily completed their course of study: Miss Agnes Bain, Miss Annie Barlow, Miss Rose A. Bolton, Miss R. A. Chapman, Miss Maud Hewetson, Miss Helen Penstone, Mr. Jno. Smith, Miss Mabel Taggart. These recommendations were adopted.

Post Graduate Diplomas were also awarded to Mr. T. R. Burpe and Mr. J. C. Wallis.

The members present then adjourned to the Library for dinner, kindly provided by the President, at which they were joined by Rev. Dr. Campbell and Rev. A. Imrie.

The evening meeting held in the Assembly Hall had a crowded attendance. Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. J. Ross. President Harris said a few words about the excellent progress made by the School in some of its de-

partments during the past term; then addresses on suitable themes were given by J. S. Smith, representing the evening class, and by Miss Frost and Miss Wu, representing the day class. Mr. Isaac Erb gave the Valedictory address.

The students named above were presented by Dr. Stewart for Diplomas and Certificates.

Special addresses were given by Rev. H. W. Frost, who spoke very effectively on the subject "Dwell Deep." Dr. Campbell followed with some stirring words on the "Higher Criticism, and the duty of all true lovers of the Bible to oppose it." The interest of the meeting was greatly enhanced by the musical exercises conducted by the students under the leadership of Mr. Byler.

Mr. McNicol closed with prayer and the benediction.

Report of the Principal.

The Toronto Bible Training School has finished another year of successful work, and we desire to record our Thanksgiving to God for His continued goodness during the past session. The actual enrolment of students has not been greater than last year, but a greater number of students have continued in regular attendance, a greater number have written on the examinations, and the class which will be presented to-day for graduation is considerably larger than that of any previous year.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

Day Classes—Rev. Dr. Harris gave expositions of the Psalms, the Epistles to the Colossians, Ephesians and Philemon and the Epistle to the Hebrews.

Rev. A. Imrie gave instruction in Christian Doctrines and Church History, and conducted a men's class in Homiletics.

Rev. Dr. Stewart conducted the class in the Preparation of Essays and Addresses.

The Principal's subjects were the study of the Old Testament, and Bible Introduction.

Rev. R. V. Bingham gave a course of lectures entitled "The Universal Testimony of the Gospel, a Study of World Wide Missions."

Mrs. Eva Rose York of "Redemption Home," conducted a women's class in Practical and Personal work for women.

Evening Classes—Dr. Harris gave exposition of the Psalms and of the Epistles to the Colossians, Ephesians and Philemon.

Mr. Imrie gave instruction in Christian Doctrines and conducted the class for Sunday School Teachers.

The Principal carried on Outline Studies of Old Testament Books.

Special Classes—Instruction in New Testament Greek and English subjects (Grammar, Composition and Reading) was given by Mr. C. E. Luce, who continued the very satisfactory work he had begun in the preceding session.

The only instruction this year in Medical subjects was given by Dr. W. H. Howitt, to whom the School is again

indebted for his valuable course of lectures on Tropical Diseases.

The class in vocal music was conducted by Mrs. H. L. Stephens, with her usual efficiency, during the first part of the session; but her regretted illness and absence from the city necessitated its discontinuance after the New Year. During the last few weeks of the session, the singing class was resumed under the leadership of Mr. J. I. Byler, in preparation for the closing exercises.

MISSIONARY INTEREST.

The Students' Missionary Society has been very active during the session, and has well maintained the missionary interest and work of the School. The Society held 21 general meetings with an average attendance of 28, and 23 morning prayer-meetings with an average attendance of 22. There were organized and conducted during the session 14 mission study classes in groups of from 5 to 8 students. Correspondence was carried on with former students now on the foreign field. The number of volunteers for foreign missions was increased, and the Volunteer Band at the close of the session numbered 25, or about one-third of the whole class.

EVANGELISTIC WORK.

The Evangelistic Band conducted their usual weekly meeting at the Yonge St. Mission throughout the session, and helped also at the Sunday morning free breakfasts during the winter months. On Sunday evenings 10 other missions in different parts of the city were visited and assisted. In all 66 gospel meetings were held, with a total attendance of about 4,500 people, in which more than 40 persons were led to a profession of faith in Christ. During the Chapman-Alexander campaign in January, the students of the School had charge of one section of Massey Hall for personal work. A few of the students engaged also throughout the session in the important work of hospital visitation.

PROBLEMS.

At a subsequent period in the meeting, Mr. McNicol presented three "problems," which he pressed on the consider-

ation of the Board and Council. The first of these is the strengthening and expanding of the course of Instruction. This is now done by making the course one of three years instead of two. The second problem is the provision which seems to be required for a residence for students under kind judicious care; and the third is the maintenance of the interdenominational aspect of the School, as presented on the Board of Instruction.

The Secretary's Report.

By the good hand of our God upon us, we are now come to the close of the seventeenth year of the Toronto Bible Training School. During last summer, when the Instructors were out of the country, I discharged all the duties that devolved upon me as Secretary of the School. When this session began I continued these; and also till the end of 1910, conducted a class of all the Day students once each week in the preparation of Essays and Addresses. During the latter part of this session I confined my attention to the duties of the Secretary's office. These are now sufficiently numerous and important to require the time and labors of one man.

In some respects the session has been remarkably successful. The number of graduates has been the largest in the history of the School, and the written examinations have, as a whole, attained a high standing. The attendance at the day classes has been very large; but when the Chapman-Alexander campaign of evangelistic services began in January, the attendance at the evening classes fell off nearly 40 per cent. During the first four months of the session, the average attendance at the evening classes was 60; during the last four months it had fallen down to 42. The fees from the evening classes of the previous session were \$261.75; the fees from the same classes this session were only \$180.75, or about \$80.00 less.

In some important respects there has been considerable increase in the income of the School. Last year the number of donors was 210; this year it has been 223. Last year the amount of ordinary

donations was \$3,491.56; this year it has been \$4,415.00, a gain of \$921. It must be remembered, however, that last year we received two bequests—one of \$500, and one of \$100, or \$600 in all. This year we received no legacies, and yet the income without them was \$38 greater than the income with them. As many as eight of our friends have doubled their donations during the year, while as many as ten have failed to send any contribution. It is quite certain that the goodly number of those who have renewed or enlarged their gifts have been induced to do so by the loyalty of the School to the Bible, and by the necessity in these days of maintaining the inspiration and authority of God's Holy Word.

During the year the School has lost the faithful services of two young ladies who have rendered us very efficient service. The first of these is Miss Annie Burns, who was for nine years the faithful Assistant-Secretary of the School, and who secured the esteem of all connected with the School for her kindness and courtesy. She was married during the last Christmas holidays. The other young lady is Miss Nora Shenstone, who had no appointment from the Board or Council, but who acted as the assistant of her father in keeping the books of the Treasurer. Without remuneration from the School, and with rare fidelity and accuracy she has for years kept the books as a model of correctness. This week she also has entered the holy state of matrimony. Both these ladies have the prayers of many friends that the best of blessings may attend them in the new relationship on which they have now entered,

In my last report I referred to the eight students of foreign nationality, whom we were glad to welcome to our classes last session. Four of these are now laboring in the Gospel among their fellow-countrymen in different parts of the world. Messrs. Ma Tim Wou, Mr. S. Iijima, Mr. L. Gredys and Mr. J. Magnan, and four others have been with us for another session.

Referring to our foreign students, it

seems right that I should call the attention of the Board and Council to the testimony recently given to the services in Calcutta of Mr. B. C. Sircar, one of the three East Indians, who took their course of study with us about seven years since. We had already heard more than once of Mr. Sircar's great acceptability as the College Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. of Calcutta. About a week ago we received the following account of his promotion to yet higher service:

" Mr. B. C. Sircar who for six years has done most valuable service as Secretary of the Branch and whose influence has been felt in all its departments, as well as in securing the sympathetic attitude of the Hindu and Christian community to the Association, from the beginning of 1911 accepted the post of travelling evangelistic Secretary for Bengal, under the Indian National Council of the Association. The high appreciation in which Mr. Sircar is held by all, found enthusiastic expression at a Farewell meeting on December 22nd at which addresses and presentations from members, Committee of Management and Secretaries clearly showed the place Mr. Sircar has won among all, and the good wishes with which he is followed into his new work."

That an ever-brightening future lies before the School, we have little doubt. He who has provided both men and means in the past will not fail nor forsake. Out President finds it necessary to be a year away from home in distant lands. An efficient substitute must be provided. The expansion of the course of study must be continued. In all the arrangements for these, there must be much prayer and consecration. To the loving Lord who has the hearts of all in His hands, let us look for the right men to fill the vacant place, and for the additional means that will now be required to carry forward this great and growing work. Thankful to the Lord for a past that is full of goodness and mercy, we confidently trust Him for the days and years to come.

The Alumni Annual Gathering.

The second Annual Meeting of the Bible Training School Alumni was held this year in the Williams' Cafe, Yonge Street. A supper preceded it, at which nearly 100 were present. The programme of speeches and music was carried out with zest and much enjoyment. All the faculty spoke save Mr. Imrie, who made an appropriate closing prayer.

* The officers of 1910-11 were re-elected, it being felt that so much new ground had been broken that the same Executive should carry on the work to fruition. The Secretary had been indefatigable in his labors. A finely printed hand book, with photo of every graduating class in it and present addresses of their members, had been issued, and was admired by all. Envelopes, too, and cards, colors, bookmarks, etc., of the School had been made, and one "insert" had been sent out with the School's RECORDER. This had been the work of the Editorial Board.

The following is an epitome of the evening's business, in the way of suggestions and recommendations. These again were presented by the writer to the General Council of the School at its meeting on the following day.

1. Minor Matters. A request for opportunities for nursing, attendance at clinics, etc.; a lecture, weekly, on per-

sonal work for evening classes; a debating society with opportunities for public speaking; a summer, evangelistic band, more compulsory, practical Christian work; a mission hall in connection with the School. The above came, all of them, from under graduates or graduates of 1911.

2. Unprogrammed Ideas. A post-graduate course that would be fitted for anyone to take up; also extra-mural studies leading to a diploma. A gymnasium, several hours per week, when the male students could have the floor, as in some Collegiates throughout the Province.

3. Major Matters. It was and had been felt by many that another name would raise the prestige of the School. And the recommendation was made (and afterwards endorsed by the School Council) that the name be changed to "The Toronto Bible College." Several during the evening also urged the securing of a residence for the lady students. This was felt to be urgent, and was also considered seriously by the Council.

Altogether, the Alumni gathering of 1911 will mark a distinct advance for the School, we feel sure. A fine enthusiasm, earnestness and spirituality characterized the entire meeting. May there come to us a new sense of obligation and of purpose to push this service for our Lord until it reaches its very largest fruitfulness.—W.F.R.
