### Annual Meeting.

The closing exercises of the eighteenth session were held on Friday, April 24th. The Board of Incorporation and General Council met at 4 p.m. The members present were: Rev. R. P. MacKay, D.D., the Vice-President, who presided; the Secretary, Rev. T. B. Hyde; the Treasurer, Mr. Jos. Shenstone; the Principal, Rev. John McNicol; and also Messrs. Robert Kilgour and Martin Love, Rev. Dr. Parsons, Rev. Dr. McTavish, Rev. R. V. Bingham, Rev. N. F. Roadhouse, Dr. W. H. Howitt, Dr. E. St. G. Baldwin, Messrs. T. S. Cole, Duncan Stewart, J. J. Gartshore, W. H. Orr. Letters of regret for unavoidable absence were received from Dr. Hooper, of Bronte; Judge Reynolds, of Brockville; Judge Ardagh, of Barrie; Mr. Penman, of Paris; Mr. Struthers, of Galt; Mr. Foster, of Brantford; Mr. Robertson, of Kingston; Rev. R. Wallace, of Belleville; and Rev. Dr. Bishop, Dr. N. W. Hoyles, Messrs. Copeland, Gzowski and John MacKay, of Toronto.

Dr. Mackay, who presided, opened the meeting by reading the Scriptures, and asked the venerable Dr. Parsons to lead in prayer. He then spoke very fittingly of the great and peculiar loss which the Board had been called upon to suffer in that Dr. Harris, Dr. Stewart and Mr. Nasmith, the three men who had been perhaps most deeply interested in the organization of the Bible Training School and had been most closely

connected with it from the beginning, had all been removed from their midst since the last annual meeting. Appropriate resolutions were then unanimously adopted, recording the profound sense of loss felt by the members of the Board and Council and their deep sympathy with the bereaved families.

The various reports, those of the Principal, Secretary and Treasurer, were received and discussed.

Other important matters were presented and were referred to the Board for full consideration and final action. These include the appointment of a President, the rearrangement of the teaching staff, and the whole question of finances.

It was unanimously agreed to invite Mr. A. G. Olive, of Brantford, to become a member of the General Council.

After the meeting the members present were entertained at dinner in the Library of the College, through the kindness of Mr. Shenstone.

At 8 p.m. the Graduating Exercises began in the Assembly Hall, which was well filled. Dr. Mackay again presided, and the devotional exercises were conducted by Mr. Imrie.

Addresses were given by three representatives of the graduating class, Mr. F. R. Vine, Miss Etta Cale, and Mr. O. J. Smith, the last of whom gave the valedictory.

Diplomas were presented to the following graduates of the Day Classes:

Smith, Frederick R. Vine, William Yates. Mr. Frederick W. E. Story was given a Post-graduate diploma. The following students from the Evening Classes received certificates: Eva Crown, Elinor Mitchell, Ruby Mill and Etta M. Saunders. Miss Eva MacDowell, who has removed to the west on account of her health, will also receive a certificate.

The address to the graduating class was given by Mr. McNicol, and the main address of the evening by Rev. Canon F. E. Howitt, of Hamilton, who spoke very appropriately and effectively upon the all-sufficiency of God as revealed in His name "Jehovah." The interest of the meeting was deepened by the choruses which were sung by the students under the leadership of Mr. J. I. Byler.

#### Principal's Report.

The session which is now closing will mark an era in the history of the Bible Training School. We meet to-day under the shadow of a great loss. The death of Dr. Harris and Dr. Stewart within less than three months of each other has removed the two men who have been identified with this work from the beginning, and who have been the chief instruments in the hands of God in its organization and development. The permanent value of the service they have rendered is evidenced by the fact that the work of the School has been continued without interruption and without loss of efficiency. The present session has been marked by the same blessing and devotion that have characterized the past, and the same spirit of hopefulness for the future.

#### ENROLMENT.

The total enrolment of students numbers 81 in the Day Course and 156 in the Evening Course. These are distributed as follows in comparison with the enrolment of last year:

#### INSTRUCTION.

The work in Exegesis of Old and New Testament books, formerly carried on by Dr. Harris, was divided between Prof. W. H. Griffith Thomas, of Wycliffe College, and Rev. F. S. Weston; Dr. Thomas lecturing on the book of Genesis, and Mr. Weston on the Epistle to the Romans.

Rev. A. Imrie gave lectures on Christian Doctrine and on Modern Missions, and conducted the practical department, including instruction in Personal Work and the Principles of Teaching.

Rev. T. B. Hyde gave a course of Studies on the Holy Spirit.

The Principal's subjects were constructive studies in the Books of the New Testament; the Geography and History of Bible Lands, and a course of lectures on Homiletics.

Examinations were held in these subjects, the results of which show that on the whole, satisfactory work has been done by the students. Fifteen students have completed the two year course of

study which entitles them to diplomas, and two former graduates have taken an additional year of post-graduate study.

Special classes among the day students were held in English and in New Testament Greek by Mr. C. E. Luce, and in Vocal Music by Mr. J. I. Byler. These classes were optional, but it was required that every student receiving a diploma should pass a satisfactory examination on one of the three subjects.

A special course of Lectures on Tropical Diseases for intending Missionaries was given by Dr. W. H. Howitt, to whom the School is again indebted for this valuable service which he has been giving gratuitously year by year.

The work of the Evening Classes was as follows: Christian Doctrines and the Preparation of the Sunday School Lessons by Mr. Imrie, the Epistle to the Romans by Mr. Weston, the Books of the New Testament and the Miracles of Christ by the Principal. Examinations were held on the work of these classes with very gratifying results. Four students have completed the full three years course of study required of those who receive a Certificate from the Evening Classes.

#### EVANGELISTIC WORK.

The Practical work carried on by the students has been more fully organized and brought under closer supervision. A system of record cards has been adopted by means of which the results of this work can be kept more accurately. The Evangelistic Band conducted regular week night meetings at the Yonge St. Mission, the Sackville St. Mission and the Laplante Ave. Mission, and on Sunday nights, carried on Gospel meetings in other places throughout the city. The record kept by the Band covers only the last half of the session. During that time they held 46 evangelistic meetings, at which 83 persons professed conversion.

In addition to this work some of the students assisted at the Yonge St. Free Breakfast, others went every Sunday morning to the Central Prison, and

others made weekly visits to the Hospitals. As a direct result of the work of the students during the first three months of the present year, 116 persons have been led to confess Christ as their Saviour. This fact alone is a significant illustration of the value of the Bible Training School as an evangelizing force in city.

#### MISSIONARY WORK.

The Missionary interest in the School has been sustained and deepened. The Missionary Society, in addition to the regular weekly meeting, organized and conducted 8 Mission Study Classes among the students, kept up correspondence with former students now on the foreign field, and conducted the early morning missionary prayer meeting throughout the session.

The depth and vitality of the missionary spirit in the school is shown by the number of volunteers for foreign missions. The Volunteer Band has grown steadily throughout the session, until now it numbers 31, more than one-third of the entire class of Day Students, and is the largest Volunteer Band in the City in proportion to the number of students.

The devotional atmosphere in which all the work of the School is carried on has been maintained as in former years. Morning by morning throughout the session, for half an hour before the classes assembled, a number of the students met to wait on God and invoke His blessing on the School. Once a week this meeting gathered an hour before the classes, and was then devoted to the Missionary interests of the School. Every Tuesday morning in the midst of the regular work, a special devotional service was held, conducted sometimes by the instructors, sometimes by the students, and sometimes by visitors. A sober and wholesome spirit pervades the lives of the students. A spirit of unity and harmony prevails in the fellowship of students and instructors. The manifest grace of God continues to abide upon the life and work of the institution.

### Secretary's Report.

The 18th annual report of the Toronto Bible Training School or the 1st of the Toronto Bible College, will occupy a unique place in the history of this institution. It was agreed last year that the name be changed to Toronto Bible College, but owing to our inability to comply with the legal requirements, that was not completed.

Through the blessing of God, the work of the year has come to a successful close, all the departments have been fully covered, and a class of twenty students prepared for graduation. The enrolment in the Day and Evening Classes numbered 237, which is the largest in our history. Of those graduating, two expect to go to the Foreign Field; four to work in the Home Mission Field; four will pursue further studies: two enter for training at the Nursing At Home Mission, and one returns for a post-graduate course.

In addition to the work done by the Principal and Mr. Inrie, Prof. W. H. Griffith Thomas conducted a series of lectures on the Book of Genesis, proving from a scholarly and scientific point of view the entire credibility and authenticity of this important portion of scripture. These lectures were of great value, not only to our regular students, but also to a number of visitors who attended the course throughout. Rev. F. S. Weston lectured on the Epistle to the Romans with clearness and ability, and the Secretary lectured once each week during the last term on the Person and Work of the Holy Spirit. Special mention should be made of the valuable course of lectures delivered by Dr. W. H. Howitt, on "Tropical Diseases," for the benefit of those students who expect to go to the foreign field. We greatly appreciate this contribution to our work from one so well qualified to do it as Dr. Howitt, especially as it takes so much of his valuable time from a very busy practice.

At the solicitation of the Board of Incorporation, I undertook to discharge the duties of Secretary last October. I have been endeavoring to fill that office since.

Several new departures have been made in our method of work. A new system of registration has been introduced which provides for a full and permanent record of each student, not only while in the college, but also in their subsequent fields of service. A larger effort has been made to bring the work and its claims to the attention of the Christian public, both by correspondence and interviews, which has resulted in a number of enquiries being made as to our course of study, and several new names being added to our list of contributors. In this connection special mention should be made of the large place given to the work of the College in the pages of the *Evangelical Christian*, published once a month, by our friend, Rev. R. V. Bingham; also to a special display article in *The Star Weekly*, of March 30th, when a most interesting sketch of the work, with the photo of the Faculty, was published. We have had a copy of this paper sent to all our contributors and others.

The Practical work department, under the direction of Mr. Inrie, has been one of our most important developments. The entire student body has been organized for practical Christian Service. A report card calling for a record of their work is handed in each week and reviewed in open session by Mr. Inrie, as far as time allows. This has proved one of the most interesting and valuable periods of the week.

Meetings were conducted by Members of the Faculty in, Chalmers Pres. Church, St. John's Pres. Church, Northern Cong. Church, North York S. S. Convention, Convention of the King's Daughters, Bible Class Leaders of the University of Toronto, Young Women's Christian Assoc., C. P. R. Shops, Canada Cycle and Motor Co., Fairbanks, Morse Co., Eclipse Whitewear Co., Taylor's Safe Works. In these latter, from 50 to 225 men have heard the gospel at the noon hour, from week to week.

Our building is becoming increasingly a centre for active Evangelical interests. In addition to the work done here each Sunday, for the Deaf Mutes, the Mission to Lepers hold a monthly meeting

for prayer. The Zenana and Medical Mission, the Sudan Interior Mission, the Toronto Mission to the Jews, the Shantymen's Christian Assoc., and the Upper Canada Bible Society, each held their annual meetings in our hall.

Additions have been made to our equipment by the donation of a clock for the Assembly Hall; a Neostyle Duplicator, for the office; and a generous supply of books for our Library. These latter have come from Mr. Fleming H. Revell, the families of the late Dr. Harris and Dr. Stewart. Mrs. Harris has also presented us with three valuable sets of book shelves. For all of these practical expressions of co-operation we are deeply grateful.

In March last, our Assistant Secretary and Librarian, Miss Margaret Oliver, resigned her position in order to become a student in the college next fall. Her place is now filled by Miss Margaret Armstrong, who brings to her new position a deep interest in the work of the College and a large experience in practical Christian Service.

Our students have been in demand for active work outside their regular duties during the year. Mr. O. J. Smith has ministered regularly to the two Congregational Churches at Belwood and Garafraxa with much acceptance and manifest blessing. Mr. Wm. MacDonald served in the same capacity at the Congregational Church, Churchill. Mr. F. W. E. Story was engaged as Church Visitor at Indian Road Baptist Church. Miss Ola Hughes is the regular Bible Woman at the Sackville St. Mission, Miss Millar at Rhodes Ave. Pres. Church, Miss Whitelock at Waverley Rd. Bapt. Church, Miss Burkholder at the Mennonite Mission.

#### MISSIONARIES.

During the past autumn, six former students have sailed for the foreign field.

Mr. and Mrs. Duncan McDonald, who have been appointed by the Foreign Mission Board of the Presbyterian Church to work in Central India, sailed from Montreal on October 13th. They were followed a week later by Miss

Emily A. Clark, who goes to labor in Northern Nigeria, under the Sudan Interior Mission. Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Rist sailed from Vancouver on Nov. 15th for service in China under the China Inland Mission. Dr. Edward S. Fish, who was also appointed by the same Mission, sailed two weeks later. Mr. L. R. Steckley, who was appointed by the Mennonite Board last spring, left for South Africa during the summer, and Mr. D. J. Storms, who has been accepted by the same Board, expected to sail for his field in Turkey, but the unsettled state of affairs there has prevented his going at present.

And now I have to record with profound sorrow, the great and serious losses we have sustained in the death of our beloved brethren, Dr. Harris and Dr. Stewart, the two lives which more than any others or perhaps all others together have been instrumental in the organization and development of this School. Both were called away from our midst during the past year.

On Tuesday, Dec. 19th, 1911, in Delhi, India, our honored and beloved President, Rev. Elmore Harris, D.D., while visiting the Mission Fields of that great country, was suddenly stricken down and taken from us when we felt his presence and help so essential to the future development of our work.

A little later, on Tuesday, March 5th, 1912, in our own city, in his own home, full of years and good works, our venerable first principal, Rev. Wm. Stewart, D.D., after a brief illness passed peacefully away, retaining to the last his deep concern and practical interest in this work to which he had given so fully of

his life and service from its organization 18 years ago.

On Wednesday, April 24th, Mr. J. D. Nasmith, our first Vice-President and Charter Member of the Board of Incorporation, was called home with startling suddenness, while on a trip to the Coast with his wife. His body was brought to Toronto for interment, and the funeral service was held in the Assembly Hall of the College, conducted by the Secretary, who was Mr. Nasmith's former Pastor. A large number of the deaf mutes, with many other friends of the deceased, were present to show their sympathy and respect. Our sincere sympathy goes out to the widow and family in this great sorrow and loss, and we pray they may have the comforting and sustaining grace of God in their bereavement.

Humanly speaking, these losses are irreparable, and language fails to express our deep sense of bereavement, and were it not for the assurance that they were but the instruments of the Lord's pleasure in bringing this work into existence, which he has so signally blessed through all the past, we might well be discouraged for its future.

Knowing, however, that while "God buries His workmen, He carries on His work." we take up the trust committed to us, and in the same faith and assurance in which these our brethren lived and served, we face the future with courage and hope.

A fitting memorial service to the memory of our late President, was held in the Assembly Hall of the College, on Friday, Jan. 5th, 1912, conducted by our Vice-President, Dr. R. P. McKay, and participated in by Rev. Prin. O'Meara, Dr. W. H. Hincks, Dr. McTavish, Rev. Jno. McNeil and the Principal. The Faculty and Officers of the College were represented by the Principal and Secretary, at a service held at the home of the late Dr. Stewart, before his remains were taken to Beamsville, Ont., for interment.

Believing there never was a time when the need of men and women trained in the knowledge and use of the

Word of God, for practical Christian service, was more felt than at present, and seeing the large number of devoted young people who are willing, at much self sacrifice and devotion, to give their time to obtain such a training, we feel confident that the work of this institution is worth vastly more than it costs in labor and money, and face the future assured of the blessing of God, and confident of the continued co-operation of His people in carrying it on.

## The Alumni Meeting.

The third annual banquet of the Alumni Association was held on the evening of April 26th, in the Assembly Hall, which had been very tastefully arranged for the purpose. The President, Rev. C. E.
