# TWENTY-FIRST SESSION.

"For ever oh Lord Thy word is settled in heaven. Thy faithfulness is unto all generations." Psalm 119: 89-90.

That being true there is no uncertainty about the purposes of God being established in the earth—for there is no arm long enough and no power great enough to disturb the foundation of the word of God. Our concern should be to declare that word and let it establish itself down here in the hearts and lives of men.

The Bible College exists for this one purpose, that the Scriptures may be studied, known, understood and obeyed—that their light and truth may be translated into human lives and thus be carried into the near and distant places, where men ''sit in darkness and the shadow of death.''

The twenty-first session of the College finds its work and instructors continuing to enjoy the manifest blessing of God; for in no period of its history has there been a closer unity in the fellowship of those upon whom its administration rests, nor a deeper spirit of devotion pervading the entire student body. This is all the more notable when we remember that the College belongs to no one branch of the Christian Church, but shares its privileges with all who honor our Lord Jesus Christ as the Divine Son of God, and who accept the Scriptures as II is authoritative message to men. There are five denominations represeated on the faculty, and at least 12 denominations represented by the 250 students. It seems difficult to have this fact understood by the Unristian public, even after so many years of its history, but we feel hopeful that it is becoming more and more recognized, and consequently the place and value of the College as an Interdenominational School, with its helpfulness open to all branches of the Christian Church, is being appreciated.

The enrolment of students this term is the largest we have ever had at this time of the year, and it would have been still larger were we in a position to help a number of young men who wanted to take our course, but needed to find employment in order to meet their personal expenses. Under the present condition we felt it necessary to discourage all such from coming to the eity, as the matter of securing work is so difficult.

## STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS.

As in former years the students have allied themselves with the various organizations of the College—The Evangelistic Band, The Mission Study Classes, etc. These societies are largely under the control of the students, and exist for the better carrying out of the practical work department, and the developing of the individual character of the students themselves.

Profiting by the experience of other years we have auranged for a stated amount of physical exercise each week, in order to keep our bodies in good condition, and thus counteract the mental strain under which most of our work is done.

Miss E. McNaught, A.T.C.M., instructor in elocation and public speaking, has a class in calisthenics every Wednesday, attended by most of the students, who are deriving great benefit from this instruction. We believe we should glorify God in our heavy as well as in our spirit (1 Cor. 6: 20), and in order to do so we must keep them as healthy as possible.

# REV. A. IMRIE.

We welcome Rev. A. Imrie again to his place on the faculty as director of the Practical Work Department, having been relieved last year by Rev. W. F. Roadhouse, who did excellent service, and who is now pastor of an important church in the city.

How to do "personal work," how to deal with enquirers," how to approach a person wisely and taetfully on religious subjects and try to win them for Christ, is not easy for the average Christian, but to Mr. Imric it is part of his "meat and drink." It is as natural to him as talking about the weather is to most people, so that on the street, in the shop, on the street car, or wherever he comes in contact with men, he is "doing business for the Lord." The students readily respond to his fine spiritual leadership, and show the same earnest spirit of their instructor in the work they carry on in the various missions and church services within and outside the city.

#### FIRST AID COURSE.

Dr. Oswald Withrow is continuing and developing the special course of medical lectures which he inaugurated last session. The College is greatly indebted to Dr. Withrow, who is voluntarily devoting a great deal of time and thought to their work. After the new year he will take the students through a course in First Aid to the Injured.

# STUDENT VOLUNTEERS.

The Student Volunteer Band was orgmized for the purpose of bringing together those students who are Declared Volunteers, for mutual help and for the study of missionary topics and problems; to place before our fellow students the great possibility of a missionary career, and to arrange and conduct outside meetings in the cause of missions.

It reports a membership of 24, an increase of seven volunteers since the College opened, with a number seriously considering the Foreign Mission claim. The Band is holding a meeting each week for the volunteers only, when some subject vital to volunteers is dealt with, while a monthly meeting for those interested but not volunteers is held; also an open meeting once a month in the evening for the benefit of interested evening students.

The Band has conducted five missionary meetings this term in the various Young People's Societies of the churches in the city.

Since the College closed last April four of our volunteers have sailed for foreign

fields, while three at least are under appointment to leave in the early part of next year.

It will be seen that the missionary interest in the College is quite as deep as in former years.

#### PROF. GRIFFITH THOMAS.

This Session we are having two courses of lectures by this outstanding Biblical scholar—one to the day class on "The Pentateuch," and the other to the evening class on Thursday of each week on the "Epistle to the Romans." Both of these subjects are being treated in Prof. Thomas' usual manner, which combines in such a valuable way the intellectual, spiritual and practical interpretation of Scripture. The attendance on Thursday evenings taxes the capacity of our lecture hall.

Under the auspices of the Bible League of Canada, on Friday, Nov. 6th, Prof. Thomas delivered a most important and forceful lecture to an audience that crowded our hall, on "Germany and the Bible," in which he clearly demonstrated that the origin of the present Europeau war can be traced to the effect of the philosophy of Germany rationalistic which, having set aside the authority and validity of the Scriptures, found it an easy matter to trample on human documents and treaties when they stood in the way of their national self interest. hope to secure this lecture in printed form, which we feel confident will be read with interest by all friends of the College.

The classes in New Testament Greek conducted by Rev. C. E. Luce, B.A., have taken up their work with enthusiasm. Mr. Luce reports that the ability and interest of his classes this term are above the average.

# VISITORS.

In addition to the members of the Faculty, the students have opportunity of listening to wise and inspiring messages from visiting friends of the College. Amongst these was a recent address by the Rev. W. F. Wilson, D.D., pastor of the Elm St. Methodist Church, Toronto, who spoke of "The Goodness of God" out of his large and varied experience as a city pastor. It was a message the students will not soon forget.

Mr. E. C. Austin, a member of the class of 1905, who with his wife is home on furlough from their work in Peru, South America, gave an interesting and stimulating account of the needs and conditions existing in that dark and neglected continent. These words of testimony and reports from "our own boys," are always listened to with peculiar interest, as they give us to realize the share we are having as an institution in ministering to the "regions becond."

The visit of Rev. Chas. Inglis of Loudon, Eng., to the College, was an occasion of deep interest and helpfulness to the students. His large knowledge of the Scriptures and his warm evangelistic spirit were evidenced in the several lectures he delivered.

Miss Kenny of the Zenana Mission, Mr. B. Davidson of the Ceylon and India General Mission, Mr. Lawson of the China Inland Mission and Rev. A. J. Bowen of South African General Mission, and also Mr. Ivan Panin, gave instructive and mspiring addresses during this past term.

## MAINTENANCE.

We are deeply grateful to our friends, who continue year after year to make this work possible by furnishing the means necessary to meet our expenses. Like all similar institutions, we are sharing the "stress of the times." and are willing to bear our share in the sacrifices necessary under the circumstances; but as our income is barely sufficient to meet our requirements, the loss of any contributor is at once felt by us, and must be met by some new friend coming to our help, or the Thus far we impoverishing of our work. have been able to go on without any modification of our staff, and trust with the Lord's blessing and the co-operation of our friends, to continue to do so throughout the year.
