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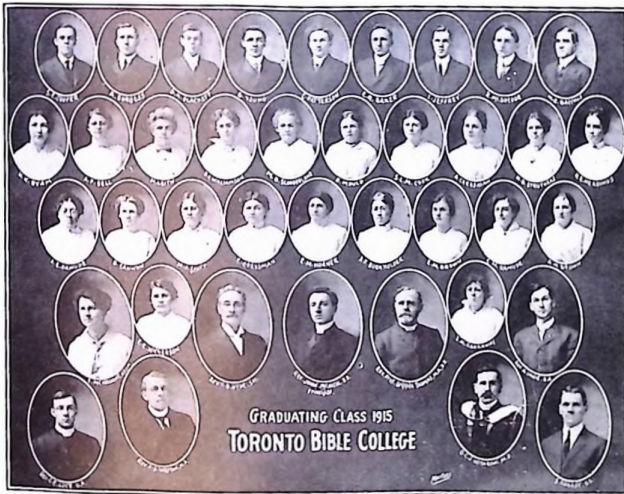

## The Year of Our Majority.

### GRADUATING EXERCISES, 1915.

THE Graduating Exercises of the Bible College were held on Friday, 30th of April, at 8 p.m., in the Assembly Hall, which was filled to its utmost capacity with a very appreciative audience.

The Graduating Class was the largest we have ever had, numbering 40 in all, and was represented by Mr. Geo. M. Blackett, who spoke powerfully on the subject, "Life's True Purpose."



Dr. R. P. MacKay, vice-president of the College, occupied the chair and opened the service which will long be remembered not only by the graduates, but by all present as a time of real blessing.

Miss Helen Struthers, representing the lady graduates, very comprehensively described "Discipleship." As Christ's disciples were students, sitting at His feet and learning of Him; as they were servants and friends of

His; as they were taught to pray; to lift up their eyes and look on the fields which were ripe unto harvest; and as they obeyed His command, "Follow Me" and "Go ye and teach all nations," so this applied to our College life expresses very completely the different branches of training here, for we as disciples sit at the feet of Christ, through His consecrated followers, our Instructors, and are shown the ripe harvest fields waiting for reapers. The fact that 34 students were volunteers for foreign fields expressed more than anything else could how the commands of Christ have been obeyed.

Mr. Chas. Patterson delivered the Valedictory address in a very comprehensive and soulful way. All three students expressed very sincerely what the College and its teaching had meant to their lives in giving them a foundation of faith in God's Word which could not be taken away.

Diplomas were presented to students whose names appear below.

Principal McNicol in his own impressive, quiet manner gave a few parting words to the Class, on behalf of the Instructors, trusting that the true purpose in life may be attained by all and the true principles of Discipleship be realized by all; reminding the Class that they are still linked to this place by that strong bond of prayer.

The address of the evening was given by Prof. J. L. Gilmour of McMaster University on the "Training of Leaders." It was a very inspiring and helpful message and appreciated by all present.

We are glad to know that a number of the graduates of '15 are planning to return next year for Post Graduate work.

## ALUMNI ASSOCIATION.

On Thursday, April 29th, at 6 p.m., the Bible College Alumni Association held its sixth Annual Meeting in the Assembly Hall of the College which looked very pleasing and attractive. There were about 150 members and their friends present.

The President, Rev. C. J. Loney, of Brantford, was in the chair. A feature of the evening was the Roll Call. Fourteen classes out of the twenty in the history of the College being represented. Mention was made of the presence of Miss Martha McDonald, '14, who is engaged in Christian work in Nova Scotia; Mr. John I. Byler, from Youngstown, Ohio, where he has charge of a large Mission; Rev. C. J. Loney, '04, and Mrs. Loney from a pastorate in Brantford, and others from Hamilton and surrounding places who came from busy spheres of labor to be present at the Alumni Meeting and Closing Exercises of the College.

We were pleased to have present with us Mr. E. C. Austin, '05, and Mrs. Austin of South America, Miss Jones, 1900, of India, Miss Graydon of India, and Miss Mould, '15, of India, who has returned after seven year's faithful service in that land and has finished her course, receiving her diploma this year.

It was also discovered that five members present were serving as pastors of City churches; nine have since leaving College taken special courses in other institutions.

The President in his address emphasized the ideal of loyalty to the College, to the Bible, to the Association, and to the Lord Jesus Christ as the pre-eminent Teacher and Leader of men.

Mr. Charles Patterson, the chairman of the Students' Council, gave a very interesting report on the ac-

tivities of the Student organizations; the Evangelistic Band, the Missionary Society, the Student Volunteer Band, mentioning the fact that seven students have left for foreign fields during the past year. He also gave a sketch of an Evangelistic Campaign he had charge of during the Christmas vacation when some fifty young people were led to accept Christ as their personal Savior.

Miss Rosalind Brown, on behalf of the graduates of 1915 spoke of the possibilities of the College, and mentioned several suggestions for the furthering of the work of the College, one being the need of a home or dormitory for women students.

Mrs. Olive Brown and Mr. Campbell Tavener, representing the undergraduate students, spoke briefly of their personal experiences of blessing and knowledge gained since attending the classes and coming into fellowship with the life of the College.

By a unanimous vote it was decided that the election of officers for the ensuing year be postponed until the fall meeting in order to secure a working, resident committee.

Mr. Troyer then presented a brief report giving the present membership as ten Honorary members, forty-three life members and one hundred and nineteen annual members.

The suggestion to publish a monthly College Bulletin was discussed and referred to the Board of Governors for consideration.

After a musical selection from Miss Hallman, '13, and a few words from our Secretary and Principal the meeting was closed by singing, "Blest be the tie that binds."

**REPORT OF PRINCIPAL.**

The Toronto Bible College has come of age. It has completed its 21st session, the best in its history.

**I. ENROLMENT OF STUDENTS.**

Eighty-eight students were enrolled in the Day Class course and 218 in the Evening Class, making a total of 306. This is slightly less than last year's enrolment which was 90 in the Day Classes and 230 in the Evening Classes. The following is a comparative statement of the registration for the past four years:

It will be noticed that there has been an increase in the enrolment of women students during the past session. The decrease has taken place only among the men. This was to be expected under the disturbed conditions of the past winter. Several young men who were prospective students, and were expecting to get work in order to support themselves during their course, had to be advised not to come to Toronto as it was impossible to hold out any prospect of obtaining such means of help during the ensuing session. Four other young men who desired to enter the Bible College at the beginning of the session were advised by us to proceed to the University and to their prospective Theological Colleges because they were in a position to do so. **The Toronto Bible College is of course open to all students of all denominations, but we do not wish to divert from the regular academic channels of education any young men whose circumstances and training make it possible for them to prepare for the Christian ministry by way of the University and of the Theological Colleges of the various denominations.**

The numbers in the above enrol-



ment do not include visitors and occasional students, many of whom attended some of the classes throughout the session, especially those of Prof. Griffith Thomas on Tuesday morning and Thursday evening. When these visitors and occasional students are taken into account the average attendance for the session was larger than in any previous year.

#### 14 DENOMINATIONS.

The Denominational classification of the 306 regularly registered students is as follows. It will be seen that 14 denominations were represented among the students of the past session.

#### II. COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

A staff of nine instructors carried on the teaching work of the session as follows:

**The Principal:** "Constructive Studies in the New Testament," "Geography and History of Bible Lands," "Messianic Types and Prophecies" and "The Miracles of Christ."

**Rev. Prof. W. H. Griffith Thomas:** "The Pentateuch," "Canonicity and Inspiration," and the "Epistle to the Romans."

**Rev. F. S. Weston:** "Christian Doctrine."

**Rev. Andrew Imrie,** "History of Missions," "Principles of Teaching

and Preaching," and "Personal and Evangelistic Work."

**Rev. T. B. Hyde:** "The Person and Work of the Holy Spirit," "The Will of God," and "The Principles and Practice of Private and Public Prayer."

**Rev. C. E. Luce:** "New Testament Greek."

**Miss E. McNaught:** "Elocution and Public Reading."

**Mr. D. Kanagy:** "Vocal Music," and "The Conduct of Gospel Song."

**Dr. O. C. J. Withrow:** "Physiology and First Aid to the Injured." Special thanks are due to Dr. Withrow for the voluntary work he has done in this department. Under his instruction 18 students succeeded in passing the special examinations given by the St. John Ambulance Assoc. for the First Aid Diploma.

#### III. GRADUATING CLASS.

Thirty students have successfully completed the prescribed two years' course of study in the Day Classes, and are entitled to the College Diploma. This is the largest class to be graduated thus far in the history of the College. Four former students have taken an additional year of study and are entitled to Post Graduate Diplomas. Six students in the Evening Classes have successfully completed the three years' course of study prescribed for them and are entitled to the College Certificate.

IV. PRACTICAL WORK.

The Practical Work of the Session was carried on by the Students' Evangelistic Band under the leadership of Mr. George Blackett. It was organized under six departments. We give a brief summary of the results of this work.

1. **Sunday Night Gospel Meetings.** Thirty-two such meetings were held with an average attendance of twenty students. Of these meetings, twenty were held in City Missions and twelve in churches.

2. **Yonge St. Mission Work and Tract Distribution.** Thirty-three Wednesday night meetings were held at the Yonge St. Mission with an average attendance of twelve students. There were distributed 1500 Gospel Tracts, 500 Traveller's Guides and 200 Marked Testaments.

3. **Factory Meetings.** A noon hour meeting was held every Monday throughout the session at the Christie-Brown Biscuit Factory.

4. **Hospital Visitors.** A number of the students engaged in this work, and upwards of 250 visits are reported as having been made to the hospitals.

5. **Cottage Meetings.** Twenty of these were held with an average attendance of three students.

6. **Prison Work.** Two of the young men assisted every Sunday morning in the Christian work at the Central Prison.

As a result of all this work the students are able to report, after eliminating all doubtful and unsatisfactory cases, at least 160 persons as making a credible profession of conversion.

In this quiet, unobtrusive, but effective way the students of the Bible College are contributing their influence to the Christian forces of the city.

V. MISSIONARY INTEREST.

The Missionary Work of the College during the session may be considered under the following six departments.

1. **Missionary Meetings.** The Students' Missionary Society under the leadership of Mr. Ivory Jeffrey held a meeting every Wednesday afternoon for the purpose of missionary education and inspiration. This meeting had an average attendance of twenty-eight students and was sometimes conducted by the students themselves

and sometimes addressed by missionaries and other Christian leaders.

**2. Mission Study Classes.** Eighteen Mission Study Groups were organized with an enrolment of from six to ten students in each. Each of these groups followed a special course of Missionary study covering from eight to ten lessons.

**3. Missionary Prayer Meetings.** Every Thursday morning for an hour before the regular work of the day began a meeting for intercessory prayer was held. The average attendance was twenty-four students. In this connection correspondence was maintained with many of the former students who are now on the various mission fields of the world.

**4. Contributions for Missions.** The students have not neglected to cultivate the grace of giving. They have contributed of themselves during the past session about \$200.00 which has been divided among several interdenominational Missionary Boards.

**5. The Student Volunteer Band.** This is composed of those students who have declared their purpose of becoming foreign missionaries. At the close of the session there were twenty-eight in the Day Class and eight in the Evening Class. The Band held eighteen Quiet Hour meetings among themselves, and six monthly open meetings for all students. Since April, 1914, seven former students have sailed for fields of labor in China, India, Africa and South America.

**6. Extension Work.** The Volunteers have sought to extend and deepen missionary interest among young people, and for this purpose they have held forty meetings in Young People's Societies of the city among nine different denominations.

#### CONCLUSION.

This summary will indicate something of the character and amount of the work that has been carried on by

the students themselves as part of their regular training. This work is always held in proper subordination to the systematic Biblical instruction of the class room; for it is here that the real emphasis must rest. While the Bible College requires its students to engage in some form of Practical Work, its primary aim is to give them a thorough and systematic knowledge of the Word of God, believing that without this there can be no real effectiveness in the work of God. The instruction of the class room is carried on always in the devotional spirit, for we believe that it is in this atmosphere that the perception of divine truth is keenest and clearest. It is "in His light that we see light."

Let me close by quoting a statement by Prof. Griffith Thomas in his address at the Students' Commencement service. After expressing his appreciation of the work of the Bible College and of the privilege he considered it to be associated with it and to share in its teaching, he went on to say: "We shall need more and more such institutions as the Toronto Bible College; and for two reasons: 1st, because they insist on the knowledge of the Bible as the essential equipment for Christian work, and 2nd, because they bear testimony to the great fundamental realities that are the common heritage of all Christians."

#### SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The Toronto Bible College attains its majority this year; from a beginning of 12 students in a borrowed lecture room we now enroll 300 in our own building and graduate a class of 40. Through all these years the evident blessing of God has attended the work, both in the spirit of the students and instructors and also in the way its material needs have been supplied. At no period in our history has this been

more manifest than at the present time, for notwithstanding the trying experiences through which we are passing, the attendance of students, the earnest spirit of devotion pervading their work and the thoughtful provision in material support exceeds the record of any year of the past.

We may now reasonably claim that the Bible College has established itself in the confidence of the Christian public and demonstrated its right to a place in the forces of the Christian Church. Occupying as we do common ground for young people of all the Evangelical denominations, and interpreting the Word of God along those great lines of Truth which are held in common by all branches of the Church of Christ, we have the satisfaction of seeing students from fourteen different denominations meeting continually in the deepest spirit of fellowship and devotion, while they still retain their loyalty to their own church relations.

#### THE INTERDENOMINATIONAL POSITION.

We have testimony to the value of this position from two sources, first, from the students themselves, who speak as follows:—"I am working on a field where there are all kinds of denominations represented. Some I never heard of before, and I find the experience and spirit of the Bible College a great help in enabling me to have sympathy with them all and to preach 'the Word' in which all claim to believe." Another, "I was brought up in a Christian home and am now over thirty years of age, but I must say that I have learned more of my Bible in one month in the Bible College than I ever knew before. Instead of being less, I am a better Methodist than when I entered the College." A student from England: "The studies here in God's Word have deepened and broadened my life in a way I cannot explain. I have

received more than ever I expected to receive when entering, although I came from England on purpose to attend this College." "T. B. C. in my experience stands for 'Things Become Changed,' to me; one of the greatest blessings has been coming in contact with so many other denominations. It has enlarged my sympathies a great deal."

A graduate of the class of 1909 writes to the Principal to say:—"I graduated from Manitoba College this spring with high marks, taking the silver medal for Oratory and Elocution. During my course I found the knowledge I gained at the Bible College to be of great value to me in my studies, again and again. I shall always esteem highly the days I spent at the Bible College as it gave me my start in life."

These testimonies might be repeated indefinitely.

In the second place, we have the testimonies of the leaders in Missionary and Colportage work. Mr. J. Campbell White, when recently in the city said, at a meeting held in our hall, "As important as Latin and Greek, History and other things are, I do not believe anything is so important as a knowledge of the Word of God and how to teach it. I wish I had made a more thorough and painstaking study of the Bible when taking my course. Students whatever else you do, know your Bible and how to use it."

Dr. Zweener used practically the same words at Convocation Hall, "Unless souls are being dealt with and won for Christ by Volunteers here at home, I would strongly advise a course at a Bible Training School to prepare for this service as it is of the utmost value in Moslem Lands."

Rev. Jessie Gibson of the Upper Canada Bible Society, stated, "That the workers coming to our service



from the Bible College are by all means the most satisfactory of any under our direction."

#### BACK TO THE BIBLE.

The present is a time when a return to the authority and simplicity of the Word of God is inevitable. We have had enough of speculative philosophy, German and otherwise, and men are now feeling the need of a positive message based on, "Thus saith the Lord." This is the position the Bible College has always taken and our outlook for the future is full of hope and confidence.

#### IN ACTIVE SERVICE.

During the year 21 of our students have been appointed to Christian service, 7 having gone to the Foreign field.

Miss Martha MacDonald is in charge of a Rescue Home in St. John, N.B. Assisted by Miss Ada Schiefele.

Miss Ola Hughes is appointed Church Visitor for Gerrard St. Meth. Church, Toronto.

Miss Scott and Miss Rosalind Brown as Visitors at Sackville St. Mission.

Miss Cora Doubrough, City Mission, St. Thomas, Ont.

Mr. Byler has charge of the Menonite Mission, Youngstown, Ohio.

Two students have carried on regular church services in addition to their studies, and have commended themselves both to the congregations and to their instructors.

One conducted a series of meetings during the Christmas holidays in the Methodist Church, Victoria Harbor, and had the joy of seeing over fifty young people take a public stand for Christ. As reported by the Principal, the returns from the Practical Work Department show altogether one hundred and sixty professed conversions not including those just mentioned.

#### GENERAL HEALTH.

We are thankful to report a uniform experience of good health throughout the year, and our indebtedness to Dr. Withrow and Dr. Chas. Becker for their attention to those who needed temporary care.

We took occasion in February last to join with friends from many lands in sending greetings to Mrs. Cyrus McCormack of Chicago on the occasion of her eightieth birthday.

#### A BEQUEST.

The College received a bequest of \$2,000.00 from Mrs. A. East, one of our graduates, on the understanding that an income of 6% per annum on

the amount be assured her during her lifetime. This suggests the possibility of other contributions to our funds either directly or by inducing friends to remember this work in their bequests.

The Board elected Mr. C. S. Gzowski to its membership, and has taken steps for the Re-incorporation under the Companies Act, as recommended by the Council last year.

#### LOSSES.

We suffered the loss of two valuable friends of the College during the past year: Hon. S. H. Blake, who in recent years had taken such a large and practical share with us, both in prayerful fellowship and in the maintenance of the work; and Judge Ardagh of Barrie, Ont., who was an interested and generous contributor to the College from its organization. By resolution of the Board a message of sympathy was sent to the surviving members of the two families.

It would seem desirable that the membership of our Council should be revised and new names added to it. In the past two years several members have been removed by death, and others have left the city and province, so that they are unable to be present at our meetings. We need the co-operation of men who believe in the work we are doing, and who will help us by bringing the advantages of the College to the attention of young people who are looking forward to lives of Christian usefulness.

#### THE COUNCIL.

The function of the Council may not be clearly understood by all the brethren and a word in that connection may not be out of order. The Administrative Authority of the College rests in the Board of Governors, or as it was called at first the Board of Incorporation. Soon after the work was organized, however, Dr. Harris, sought the fellowship of a number of brethren in and near Tor-

onto who were sympathetic with the purposes of the then, Bible Training School, and who would promote its interests in their immediate circles, as well as giving the work the benefit of their prayerful co-operation and advice. These brethren were called together at least once a year to hear reports of the work done and to counsel as to its development and usefulness. We know how highly Dr. Harris prized this assistance, and every member of the present Board looks to the Council with a greater degree of dependence for the co-operation that will enable them to continue to carry on the work so as to realize its greatest efficiency.

This year we introduced a new item in connection with our Graduating Exercises, by having a Commencement Service on Sunday morning, when Prof. Griffith Thomas preached a most helpful and timely sermon on "The Elements of a Successful Christian Life," to an audience of the students and their friends that filled the Assembly Hall.

With a deeper sense than ever of our dependence on the grace and guidance of the Holy Spirit, for wisdom and understanding of the times, and how best to interpret the Word of God so as to exalt our Lord, we submit the report of another year.
