The Session

The enrolment of students in the regular course for the present session is now 164, of whom 65 are men and 99 are women. Of these 21 are in the third year, 67 in the second year and 76 in the first year.

The enrolment in the evening classes is about 350. The attendance of students and visitors taxes the capacity of the Assembly Hall, overflowing into the Prayer Room and often filling the gallery.

An extension class was established early in the session in the west end of the City in Annette St. Baptist Church. It began with an attendance of over 100, and is being continued every Tuesday evening. Dr. Weston and Mr. Hanna are the lecturers. This makes a total of some 600 young people who are attending the various classes of the Bible College.

The size of the classes has made it necessary to spread out as we did last year, and we are grateful to the friends of Zion Chapel for the use of their comfortable rooms.

Among the visiting speakers who addressed the school at the Tuesday morning devotional hour are Prof. Robert Dick Wilson of Princeton, the noted Old Testament Scholar and valiant defender of the Scriptures, Mr. J. S. Flacks, who has recently gone around the world visiting the Jews, Mr. G. W. Gibb, of Shanghai, Associate General Director of the China Inland Mission, Mrs. F. J. Diefenderfer, President of the Anti-Polygamy Crusaders, and Rev. Dr. W. W. Weeks of Richmond, Va., who was pastor of Walmer Road Baptist Church when the first classes of the Bible Training School were being held there.

Examinations for the present term will begin on Wednesday, December 13th, and the Christmas vacation will commence on Thursday, December 21st.

Classes will be resumed for the next term on Wednesday, January 3rd, at nine o'clock.

The Evening Classes will reassemble on Tuesday, January 2nd.

The Evangelistic Society

It takes some little time, at the beginning of the session, to get settled down to the regular routine of work in connection with the Evangelistic Society. We are glad to be able to report, however, that our work is nicely under way. We have been able to enter all the places where services were held, or visitation carried on, last year, and new doors have been opened.

Our mission and church work is carried on under the supervision of Mr. Arthur Leggett. A service is held each Wednesday evening in the Yonge Street Mission, and in other Missions and Churches as the requests come in. We are grateful to God for the way in which He has opened doors for service. Our Band is engaged, at present, for five Sundays in advance, to conduct Sunday evening services in Toronto Churches.

Another important part of the Soeiety's activities is the Factory work, which is directed by Mr. Frank Guyatt. Noon services are held regularly in factories of the down-town distriet.

The G.T.R. freight-shed work is supervised by Mr. Joseph McDermott. Service is held weekly in the G.T.R. sheds, and we are hoping that other openings of this kind will offer. Our students report that an increasing interest is being shown in both our factory and freight-shed services, by those attending.

Many of our students are engaged in Sunday School work, teaching classes in Missions and Churches throughout the city. This department of the Society's activities is under the supervision of Miss Helen Telford.

Hospital visitation is carried on at the Western and General hospitals, under the direction of Miss Dorcas McCourt, and is meeting with many evidences of blessing.

A new department was created this year in connection with the activities of the Society, which is known as the "Publicity Department." This department is in charge of Mr. Waldemar Berg, who came to us from Brooklyn, N.Y. An announcement of services to be held is posted each week, with the names of students who have been assigned to conduct the different services.

And last, but not least, there is the Music Department, which is under the direction of Miss Margaret Bell. Connected with this department there are organized, and working, a choir of 40 voices, two male quartettes, a mixed quartette, and a mixed double-quartette. We feel that the ministry of gospel music in connection with our work should not be neglected. Because we believe that "music is the language of the soul," and that, "expression is the soul of music," we believe, therefore, that the claims of Christ may be expressed to souls through the Gospel in song.

Finally, we desire to express our gratitude to God for the manifestation of His approval on our work, in the salvation of souls. Our aim is to so co-ordinate all our activities that we shall have but one objective, i.e., that men and women, boys and girls, may be led to accept Christ as Saviour and Lord. May we count on your prayers in behalf of our work?

The Missionary Society

The following is a brief description of the activities of the Missionary So-Daily and weekly meetings ciety. are held for the purpose of maintaining and stimulating the missionary life of the College. Among the returned missionaries who have brought the great need of the heathen world before us since the beginning of the session are Mr. Howell of the South Africa General Mission, Mr. Hardman of the China Inland Mission, and Miss Quinn of the Christian and Missionary Alliance. Two meetings were devoted to messages about Home Mission work from students who were on Canadian fields last summer.

The general life of the Student body has been fostered in a number of ways during the term by the Students' Council. On Friday evening, October 31st a gathering was held in the Assembly Hall specially for the purpose of welcoming the new students. On Thanksgiving Day an outing had been arranged but had to be changed on account of the weather. A number of the students met in the afternoon and had a meeting of thanksgiving, fellowship and prayer among themselves; they remained for supper in the College and in the evening were joined by others when a further programme was carried out. On this occasion, Principal McNicol gave a talk on the "Origin and History of Thanksgiving Day."

On Friday evening, November 17th, members of the Board and Council met with the students in the Assema former pastor of the church-introduced the students and made a brief statement concerning the work of the College. At the close of the service the minister expressed the appreciation both of himself and the congregation in the interesting service which was thoroughly enjoyed by all present.

Mission Study groups have been organized, and also prayer groups for special mission fields which meet for a little while at the noon hour each dav.

A new feature has been added to the Missionary Correspondence Department; that of Prayer-Partners. This is the adoption of missionaries by students who pray definitely for and correspond with them.

Eight graduates have sailed for the foreign field since the publication of the last report and 35 students are preparing to go.

Another extract: "Capreol is a town of about twenty-one hundred people, located about twenty miles north of Sudbury. A little over a year ago, following a survey of the town, it was decided to recommend the appointment of a student for the summer months. The work so prospered under Mr. Morley R. Hall, the student pastor (graduate of Toronto Bible College, 1921) that it was decided to continue the services during the winter months. Rather than leave the people without a pastor, Mr. Hall said that he would remain on the field for another year if the Board would support him.
