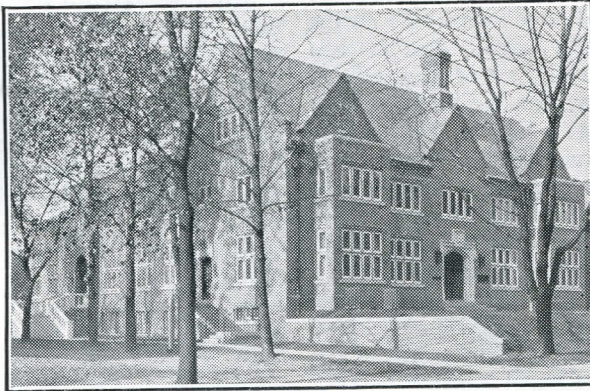


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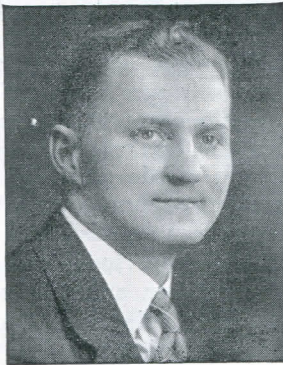

Moving Forward



The new session which opens on Tuesday, September 19th, will see another step taken in the forward movement of the Bible College. Rev. J. B. Rhodes, M.A., who has been serving as special lecturer in Systematic Theology for the past four years, now leaves his charge at Cobourg and joins the permanent staff as a full time lecturer.

Mr. Rhodes has a foreign missionary background, being the son of Mr. and Mrs. F. H. Rhodes of the China Inland Mission, and he received his early education in the Mission School at Chefoo. He graduated in the University of Toronto with honours in Philosophy in 1925 and received the M.A. degree in the following year. He spent a year at Princeton Seminary when such outstanding Biblical scholars as Prof. Robert Dick Wilson in the Old Testament and Prof. J. Gresham Machen in the New Testament were teaching there. He completed his theological course in Knox College, graduating in 1929 at the head of his class.

Mr. Rhodes has an experience of ten years in the ministry, having had two successful pastorates, four years at Exeter and six years at Cobourg. The Principal visited St. Andrew's Church in Cobourg one Sunday in

July and took part with Mr. Rhodes in his last communion service with that congregation. He saw something of what Mr. Rhodes' ministry has meant for them, of the warm place he has secured in the hearts of his people, both old and young, and of the loss which they have felt at his leaving them. They have taken his resignation in a fine spirit. As some of them told the Principal, they realize that in accepting the call of the Bible College Board he is entering a work for which he is peculiarly well fitted and which will give him a much wider field of usefulness.

Mr. Rhodes will bring added strength to the teaching staff of the College because of his Christian culture, his conservative scholarship, and his fine quality of reserve, the mark of strong character, which students know so well how to appreciate. He will continue the teaching of Systematic Theology, and he will hereafter have the department of Introduction and Evidences also. He will take part in the Evening Class work, and when a post graduate year is added to the regular course he will have something to do with it.

Mr. Rhodes will also act as the College Librarian, taking over the library from Mr. Burns, who has done splendid work in arranging and cataloguing it. This will enable Mr. Burns to devote himself to the practical department, which will be under his charge, and to the student activities, which have grown to such proportions during the past few years, and also to

the work of the Alumni Association of which he is the permanent Secretary.

Another feature of the coming session will be the further expansion of the College work in the new building. The south wing, No. 12, was in use last session. The north wing, No. 14, occupied by the Academy of Music last session, is now undergoing alterations. It may not be quite ready when the session opens, but in the course of the fall term we expect to have full use of it.

The business office will be transferred there with Mrs. Lantz in charge. The music room on the ground floor with the pipe organ will be ready for use and Mr. Shildrick will have a private room of his own near by. On the first floor there will be two new common rooms for the girls, Miss McCarthy's private room, an emergency rest room, and the nurse's room.

A few alterations have been made in the south wing also, so as to use the concert hall there as the praise and prayer room, and make it a kind of College chapel. The present praise and prayer room will ultimately be turned into a lecture room. When all these alterations are finished and the whole building is ready for use we shall plan to divide the large classes by a system of grading. This will make the instruction more efficient and prevent the loss of personal contact between the teacher and the student. We hope to be able to put this plan into operation before the end of the session.

Graduating Testimonies

Three years ago I entered the Bible College as a young Christian, having accepted Christ as my Saviour only a short time before. I came with a degree of wonder and

perplexity, not quite certain what the Christian life really was. You can readily understand my reaction to such a fellowship as I found there, a fellowship made up of young people belonging to various denominations, creeds and churches, and with different temperaments and personalities.

I have found a sense of unity and harmony prevailing. Christ is the centre and spring of spiritual life in this fellowship; He is the ruling Head and source of power. Through the Holy Spirit, He is given complete control in the guiding and directing of student affairs, in corporate life as well as individual life. We are all one in Christ Jesus, one large Bible College family. He is the One to whom our purposes, aims and interests are related. Furthermore, He is our Life, the bond that unites us all in a common acceptance of and submission to the will of the living God.

I have learned many valuable lessons through the studies, the friendships and the experiences of the College. One in particular, to me the most significant and most vital, is that I have truly come to know Christ Himself in all His beauty and perfection. I had known Him before, yes, but only as my Saviour from sin. The veil has been drawn aside; now I see something of the brightness and glory that radiates from His own Person. He has

become to me the "altogether lovely one". There is every element of beauty in Christ, for in Him there is no moral flaw, no spiritual imperfection. There is nothing lacking in His holiness, His courage and His love. I understand why He is called the chiefest among ten thousand, the lily of the valley and the bright and morning star.

Jesus is perfect in His manhood and holy in His submission to the purpose and will of God. The secret of His perfect manhood lies in the fact that "the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us". He also is the "perfect Friend, the One on whom I may depend". I have realized and been conscious these College days that Jesus is the Friend who "sticketh closer than a brother" and who never leaves me nor forsakes me. He has become a living reality in my life. I am beginning to know something of the eager cry of Paul's heart, "That I may know him and the power of his resurrection and the fellowship of his sufferings, being made conformable unto his death."

My conception of redemption before I came to the College went no farther than that Christ had saved me from my sins and given me an assurance of heaven. The gospel was so simple when offered to man that I failed to see its profound depth when it was being wrought out by God. The death of Christ on the cross was no accident or blunder, but it was the design of God himself. Deep were the waters that Christ passed through to reveal His infinite love for us. "He was despised and rejected of men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief." God's love manifested at Calvary inspires our love. "We love Him because He first loved us."

The power of God as displayed in the life of Christ has been a revelation

to me. He healed the sick, stilled the sea, created food for the hungry, and even raised the dead to life. The utmost demonstration of His might, however, is seen in His resurrection. He defeated death and the grave and is now at the right hand of God, the source of power. To realize this power, I learned that I needed to be united in fellowship with Him and to be made conformable unto His death. The spiritual death to self, self-ambitions, self-desires and self-will, I have found to be a painful process. By spiritual union with Christ, I am identified with

all that happened to Him; that is, when He died, I died also. Oh, the splendour of it, "If we be dead with Christ, we shall also live with Him!" No longer is it I, but it is Christ.

The Christian life, with Christ as its source and power, has a heavenly aroma. Christ is my Lord; I am His by His eternal love, by His infinite sacrifice, by His saving grace and by the power of His resurrection. We are each loved by Him personally and individually. Such love demands my love, my life, my all.

It would be impossible for me to enumerate the many spiritual blessings received from the course at Toronto Bible College. The phases of truth presented have been numerous and varied, and my experience has been deeply enriched as the cardinal verities of our faith have been urged upon us with clarity and simplicity.

The foundation of our teaching rests upon the unfolding through the Bible of God's redemptive plan for mankind. Man was estranged from God when self-will asserted itself at the fall. God's grace immediately went out to fallen man and He promised a Redeemer. Throughout the Old Testament age God revealed Himself from time to time and unfolded His plan for the redemption of man. God was preparing the world for the greatest event in history, the culmination of Divine revelation in Jesus Christ.

In the New Testament a new prin-

ciple came into operation through the cross of Jesus Christ, and it is upon this basis that redemption has been wrought out and the kingdom of God is to be established. The Christian is identified with Christ in His death and resurrection. He is now a new creature by virtue of the new birth, and walks in heavenly places in Christ Jesus. Eventually the creation itself will be freed "from the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God". God must eliminate from the universe all that is contrary to His will. He must destroy all His enemies. The last enemy to be destroyed is death.

It may appear as though the forces of evil are now triumphant, but we have confidence in God who is directing the affairs of men from that unseen world which is the seat of ultimate reality. We believe the time will come when wickedness and war shall be no more and Jesus Christ shall reign in peace and righteousness.

Before coming to College I thought the Holy Spirit was merely the influence of God at work in the world. The realization of the personality of the Holy Spirit has been a great source of strength. He is not merely a Divine

influence, but the Third Person in the Godhead. The Holy Spirit is the dynamic of our Christian experience. Without His power we would be unable to stand against the hosts of iniquity around us. His presence enables us to conquer. He is ever here to conquer. He is ever here to comfort, guide and sustain along the Christian pathway. It has been said that the greatest unused power in the world is the power of the Holy Spirit. Because of His presence with us we have illimitable resources of spiritual power always at our disposal.

But not only have I learned of the Holy Spirit's guiding in individual life: the entire life of the College demonstrates the leadership of the Holy Spirit in a corporate body. If the Holy Spirit is able to guide individual lives, why not a corporate group? This practical guidance is illustrated in the government as well as in the life and fellowship of the College. Plans are not determined by majority vote but by a patient waiting upon the Lord until unanimous decisions are made.

The fellowship among the students has produced a tolerance, a new and sympathetic understanding for those

of other denominational convictions than our own. We represent many denominations but are all one in Christ Jesus. We have not magnified our differences. We have found that each separate group has something unique that it can add to the building of the universal church of Christ. Our fellowship has truly been "like to that above" as we have prepared ourselves to go into the harvest fields of the world.

As we go forward to bear witness for the one whom we love, we are reminded of His words, "greater works than these shall ye do because I go unto my father". "Greater works than these"? A soul redeemed, brought from darkness into light, is a far greater miracle than to have water changed to wine or a sea calmed at our bidding. It is through the power of the Holy Spirit that we see these miracles of grace accomplished. Let us in dependence on that mighty power use what we have learned at Toronto Bible College to this end, that we may better proclaim the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ in the world, and help to hasten the time when His kingdom shall be established.
