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Toronto Bible College



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The Last Fifty Years

This month the Bible College begins its fiftieth session and enters its Jubilee year. During the half century that has passed since the institution was established, a great change has taken place in the general attitude towards the Bible.

Fifty years ago expositions of Scripture were given from many pulpits. Congregations were being fed on the Word of God. It was not an uncommon thing to hear a speaker on the public platform quote some Scriptural passage or refer to some Biblical incident. He could count on his audience being familiar with the quotation or understanding the reference. But now all that is changed. Few ministers venture to preach expository sermons, and it has become a habit with some of them to begin their sermons without a text of Scripture by simply announcing a topic. Ignorance of the Bible has become so general that even pub-

lic men with a Christian background, when dealing with current problems, rarely introduce a Biblical allusion into their platform or radio addresses.

This was not so in former days. The great Christian statesman of Queen Victoria's reign, W. E. Gladstone, said on one occasion: "Talk of the questions of the time! There is but one question, and that is the Gospel. It can and will correct everything needing correction. My only hope for this world is in bringing the human race into contact with Divine revelation." Something has happened since his day which seems to have put the Book that contains that revelation out of court.

Today there is evidence everywhere that a deep desire for some religious revival exists under the surface of the life of the Church. No one denies that the present tragic state of the world has come upon us because we

have forgotten God, and that our primary need is to return to Him. Without that, all our plans for a new world-order will fail. But where shall we find Him? How can we return to Him if we neglect the Word through which He has spoken to men down through the ages? No real religious revival can be expected so long as we refuse to turn to the Bible for the mind of God.

The discovery of the fact that the mind of God is to be found in the Bible, after years of doubt and unbelief, led to the conversion of the famous teacher, "Rabbi" Duncan, who so powerfully influenced students in Scotland in the nineteenth century.

"It passed through me like electricity," he declared long afterwards,—“the great thought that God meant man to know His mind. It was the seed of all I have.”

This great truth is the vital principle in the system of training which the Toronto Bible College has been seeking to develop and carry on for almost fifty years. Its fundamental purpose is to train young men and women to find the mind of God in the Word of God, and to equip them to go out into the world and serve Him wherever His will leads them. The need of this work has become more vital than ever in these war years, and so the College is going on with it.

The Fiftieth Session

The session will open on Tuesday, September 21, and will begin in the usual way, with a devotional service at 10 a.m., when the incoming students will be welcomed into the College fellowship. The applications from new students are quite as numerous as last year. And yet the classes, when they assemble, may be found to be somewhat reduced again by the continued demands of the war. The full College curriculum will be maintained, so that the students who are able to continue their attendance will not lose any part of their course.

We shall have to carry on, however, within much narrower limits. The Government is taking over the South Building for military purposes. It is to be used for specialized training in connection with the army's medical work. All departments of the Bible College work will have to be confined to our main building for the rest of

the war-time. This will mean some inconvenience for all of us, students and staff alike, but it need not mean any loss of efficiency in our work. We should accept these limitations for the time being, and make them contributing elements in our training.

It is altogether likely that before the session opens Miss McCarthy will have left us for her home in Ireland. Her aged parents in Belfast are in need of her care because of their greatly impaired health. She has recently been granted permission by the Government to leave Canada for the old land, and is now waiting for a passage across the Atlantic. In the meantime she remains a member of the College staff until she leaves. After that her classes will be taught by other members of the staff. The Preparatory Year, which she has made such a valuable part of the College system of training, will not be allowed to drop.

When the session comes to an end in the spring of next year, it is our hope and plan to mark the occasion with appropriate Jubilee services.

Words of Witness at Graduation

After His resurrection, and just before His ascension to the Throne of Heaven where He is now, our Lord gave a final promise to His disciples, "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

During my past three years at the Toronto Bible College, I have come to realize how this promise is true. As we studied the Bible together, we discovered that Christ was its central and supreme theme from the beginning to the end. In the Old Testament we found the record of the preparation for His coming. In the Gospels we found the story of His wonderful life and His death and resurrection. Christ promised His disciples that after His departure He would send the Holy Spirit to take His place. We have found this promise realized in every phase of our Bible College life. We were not subjected to a discipline of rules and regulations imposed upon us from without, but rather we were encouraged and helped by our instructors to recognize the fact that true Christianity is obedience to the law of the Spirit dwelling within.

In learning this lesson we were not deprived of our individuality, but rather we were afforded the opportunity of giving expression to our Christian faith through our own personalities.

As each one of us practised this principle, we discovered that there was perfect harmony in all our relationships. This was the secret of our fellowship in the College, and thus we discovered the true secret of the fellowship of the Church, the body of Christ throughout the world—a fellowship based upon the recognition of the Lordship of Christ and the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

As we studied the Bible and also many other subjects that are a necessary preparation for Christian service we gained a fuller understanding of what God is doing in the world today. We saw that Christ has left the Church in the world as His witness and that it is the responsibility of the Christian Church to evangelize the world. We learned that it is by the preaching of the Gospel that the Kingdom of God is being established in the hearts of men. Christ is the supreme need of our world today. Christ is our only Hope.

We go forward into the world to witness for this Christ and to give our lives to the service of His coming Kingdom.

A Tribute from India to Principal McNicol's Books

We quote from a letter recently received by Dr. Waters from his son, Rev. M. A. J. Waters, in India, in which the latter expresses his appreciation of Dr. McNicol's volumes, "Thinking Through the Bible":

"I have found Dr. McNicol's books most helpful. The way to know whether a book of mine is appreciated or not is to look for underlining or lack of it. Dr. McNicol's books are *well underlined*. I think he has done something quite unique in his four volumes. He has "stuck to his knitting" and avoided the great temptation of elaborating minor points that might attract him. It must have been a real *discipline* to get so much into that number of pages. I have always thought that a writer should know the art of *compression* and the art of *omission*. Dr. McNicol's volumes illustrate both; they are unique in that they let the Bible speak for itself as much as possible.

"His divisions of the books are a great aid in studying them; for instance, the five divisions of 2nd Timothy, which I have used for five Bible studies at my mid-week meeting at Kellogg Memorial (where Mr. Waters preached during his holidays to hundreds of missionaries). Please acknowledge with thanks my use of these. Tell Dr. McNicol that the theological students in Indore College (where Mr. Waters is to lecture this fall) will be getting the benefit of his work as well.

"The volumes contain passages of real beauty. His study of Job is a masterpiece, so is his treatment of faith in his excellent studies of Hebrews. These volumes must be of great interest to former students. If the ministers at home would take these books as a through-the-Bible series at their mid-week services, they would surely have a good time with them."
