Hamilton Evening Classes

An unusual sense of quietness, and confidence in the power of our heavenly Father to rule and overrule, possessed my mind for two full days before Thursday, November 27th, last. It was thus with a feeling of expectancy, and assurance that the Lord was about to do something amongst us that I joined with my fellow-members of the Hamilton Branch Executive of the Toronto Bible College Alumni Association on that Thursday evening. We held our meeting at the home of our secretary. It was an evening long to be remembered by all of us!

Discussion centred upon the various projects that an Alumni Branch is interested in, and business seemed to be proceeding in the usual routine way. Then someone asked a question, quite spontaneously. It proved to be a momentous question. "Has anyone ever thought of the possibility of our Branch initiating Evening Classes in Hamilton to be conducted by T.B.C.?" The idea caught fire;

one after another of our little group expressed keenest interest in it. We decided to follow it up, and to appoint various persons to find out what response might be expected in Hamilton itself, and what would be the reaction of our T.B.C. Board and Faculty to the proposal. We went forward towards this new project in the spirit of prayer, seeking the Lord's leading every step of the way. And we found that in each move that we made the Lord had been before us, preparing the way.

Here in Hamilton Sunday School Crusade, the local Council of Churches, the Youth for Christ, and leaders of the I.V.C.F. were all approached. We found that young people from many denominations were asking for something like these proposed classes. We were encouraged to start them after the New Year rather than to wait until next Fall. Some Churches that had programmes already in operation told us that while they could not rearrange their weekly schedule at present, they would do so before the Fall, so that their young people also might avail themselves of these classes. In all, we made contact with 114 ministers and their Sunday School Superintendents. Quite often we heard a comment like this: "The teaching of Toronto Bible College has always been sound and sane. It doesn't go off on tangents."

We made known our suggested project to our T.B.C. staff and found that both they and the members of the Board were ready to co-operate with us. As members of the Hamilton Executive we felt that it was for such a purpose as this that our Alumni Branch had come to the present hour. Through the years we had been gathering strength and building up our numbers and now we felt that, the Lord enabling us, we were ready to initiate College extension work in our own community. We have 125 Alumni members in the Greater Hamilton area, of whom no fewer than 17 are ministers in 5 denominations.

Registrations came in after the first advertisement was inserted in the Saturday edition of the Hamilton papers. By the time that the opening night arrived, Monday, January 26th, no fewer than 65 persons had signified their intention of taking the classes. And when we met for the first regular classes a week later, registrations had mounted to 80! Represented are 26 churches and 9 denominations. It is surely the Lord's doing, and we praise Him for it.

These have been busy weeks for our members, for much of the work of preparation had to be done during the Christmas season. We have been constantly on our knees, seeking from God's Spirit the assurance of His Presence and His leading in everything. And the way in which all arrangements have been made has convinced us that the Lord has continually gone before us. We realized afresh the reality of one of our mottos from T.B.C. days, "He goeth before." And we were made conscious each day, "This is the way, walk ye in it."

Now that the Hamilton Evening Classes have become an actuality our testimony is that the Lord has done great things for us. We recognize His hand in it all, and we desire to give to Him all the praise. Our prayer is that through these classes many young people may be stablished in the faith, enabled more effectively to witness a good confession, and be led out into the regions beyond to make known the unsearchable riches of God's grace.

"Lectures at the Hamilton classes are given by Dr. McNicol and Dr. Rhodes on alternate weeks, and by Mr. Raymer and Mr. Percy every week, thus providing 3 forty minute classes each Monday evening. We have had to move to another hall to accommodate increasing numbers.

The Missionary Impact of T.B.C. Training

The most convincing evidence of the missionary impact of Toronto Bible College training is to let this training speak for itself in the witness of our graduates. To that end we are presenting the personal testimony of a number of T.B.C. graduates who are well-known in inter-denominational missionary circles. One is the founder of The People's Missionary Society, Dr. Oswald J. Smith, who, humanly speaking, is probably responsible for raising larger sums of money for the missionary advance of the Christian Church than any contemporary minister. Not only does his own congregation now contribute more than \$200,000 annually to missions, but he himself devotes no little time and energy to conducting missionary campaigns by invitation in churches across the American continent.

The other testimonies are from graduates who, after service with one exception on overseas fields, now occupy executive positions in the home offices of their respective missionary societies. They are able to view T.B.C.'s impact upon missions from the vantage-point of the mission secretary whose responsibilities require him to take an over-all view of the missionary campaign, and who can assess the work of the individual missionary and station in the light of the total programme that is planned.

For much of this I am indebted to the vision I received while a student in the Toronto Bible College. It was at the Bible College I learned that the supreme task of the church is the evangelization of the world, and that the mission of the church is Missions. That is why I have taken as my motto the slogan: "Why should anyone hear the Gospel twice before everyone has heard it once?"

What the mission fields of Africa need today is a host of consecrated young men and women ready and eager to respond to the needs of that vast continent's unevangelized millions. No matter how high the degree of consecration and eagerness, however, the young person is largely valueless unless he or she has had a definite period of training and preparation for the missionary task.

As the Secretary of a Society having over one thousand missionaries in Africa, I know of nothing that can take the place of a thorough training in the English Bible. Such a training, with all the additional allied subjects as taught in a Bible School, is absolutely essential for success in foreign missionary work. Hundreds of graduates of the Toronto Bible College serving on the mission fields of the world will endorse this and loo

When we apply Bible principles in seeking to live for God and others our horizons are broadened to include the peoples of every tribe and nation.

After an experience of salvation young people's hearts are awakened to the needs of others as never before. The annual Missionary Conference sponsored by the Student Missionary Committee was held during the week of February 10th to 14th. It is during this period of concentrated missions that the students become conscious of the privilege and responsibility entailed in fulfilling our Lord's imperative: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

The S.I.M. film "Speed the Light" graphically showed what could be done. Miss Irene Boyd of the West Indies Mission, told what was being done. The Moslem World with its teeming millions was seen in skit, pictures and words arranged by Rev. R. Joyce of the Egypt General Mission.

India and the Orient were vividly seen and heard as a national Indian, Rev. A. B. Masilamani, and the Rev. E. L. Quirk of the Canadian Baptist Foreign Mission Board spoke, and the C.I.M. showed a film.

The final meeting, with inspiration and dedication, sealed the week of Conference, messages and pictures, as God laid hold of His own young people who said with a united voice, "Here am I, SEND ME!"

For the first time in several years the College Evangelistic Choir has gone far afield in its ministry of gospel music. On the last week-end in January the Choir visited Kingston and Belleville, accompanied by our Director of Music, Mr. Ernest Shildrick and Mrs. Shildrick, and also by Miss Eria Robinson, who is a graduate of Queen's University. Not only were testimonies given by the students but the Sunday messages were brought by them also. From both cities kindly appreciation of the week-end's ministry has been forwarded to the College.

A tour of Western Ontario has been planned for the early part of March. Leaving the College on Saturday, March 7th, the Choir will sing in Kitchener-Waterloo on that evening; in St. Jacob's on Sunday morning and in Brantford on Sunday evening. Monday will see the group in Woodstock, Tuesday in Stratford, Wednesday in Paris, Thursday in Blenheim, and Friday in Leamington. On Saturday morning it is hoped to pay a visit to the late Jack Miner's home and bird sanctuary, arriving in St. Thomas in time for an evening engagement. On Sunday, March 15th, the Choir will conclude its tour appointment, singing in St. Thomas in the morning, taking part in a radio programme in the afternoon, and singing in London in the evening.

The details of this tour have been worked out by our Alumni Secretary, Rev. D. E. Raymer, in consultation with our Alumni members in the various places to be visited. The Choir tour is really under Alumni sponsorship. Without their hearty interest and invaluable co-operation we should have hesitated to go forward with it. Mr. Raymer will accompany the Choir as Tour Director, and Miss Helen Bruce, student leader, will direct the Choir.

Towards the close of March the T.B.C. Choir will go east again this time as far as Ottawa and Montreal. The week-end of March 28th, 29th, will be spent in these cities, the arrangements again in the hands of our Alumni. Full details of the services to be conducted will be published in the local papers. Members of the staff will accompany Mr. Raymer, to assist in filling preaching engagements, and Mr. Shildrick, it is hoped, will have personal supervision of the Choir.

It is just possible that the Choir may also visit Hamilton this session, at the close of the first term in evening classes there. No definite plans, however, have been made as yet.

We would be speak the prayers of all our readers for the College Choir and its director, and for the ministry of gospel music. After this full schedule has been completed, there remains the witness of the Graduation Service in Varsity Arena. It is our desire at T.B.C. that always and in every place the ministry of gospel music may redound to the glory of God and be used of His Spirit to the salvation of souls.


