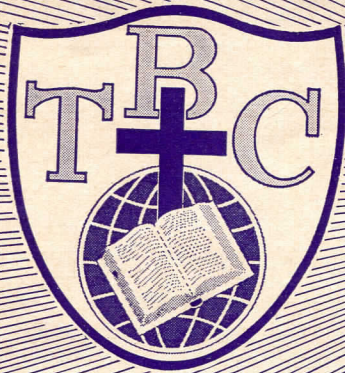

## 39 DECISIONS AT WEST TORONTO CRUSADE FOR CHRIST, NOVEMBER 10-18, 1962

The annual Toronto Bible College Evangelistic Campaign was held this year in conjunction with five churches in West Toronto—High Park Baptist,—Rev. H. Fife; The Church of the Epiphany,—Rev. J. D. Paterson; Olivet Baptist,—Rev. C. R. Evans; Parkdale Baptist,—Rev. Wm. McLean; Dovercourt Road Baptist—Rev. R. W. Wilson; and the Christian Business Men's Committee—West Fellowship. These annual campaigns involve the entire student body of the College, and time is released from lectures in order to do this very practical and very profitable field work.

A great deal of preparation and planning are necessary for a project of this scope, and it was early in the Spring of 1962 that at the invitation of the Churches, the Bible College joined with them in laying the ground work for a complete Gospel blitz of the West Toronto Community of these five churches.

The speaker for the week was Rev. Don Summers of Bristol, England, an associate evangelist of the Billy Graham Team, and a man of simplicity and power. His Bible centred messages spoke to hearts and lives.

The week of evangelism began with a special Saturday night Rally on November 10th, when a good turn-out filled the ground floor of High Park Baptist Church. The pattern for the evening services was set at this service, with the T.B.C. Chorale, and T.B.C. singing groups bringing special music, and students giving their testimonies. On every night but one, decisions were made for the Lord Jesus Christ. Perhaps the high light was on the Saturday night November 17, when 29 young people responded to the call for dedication, and they laid their lives upon the altar of consecration and service.

The work for the students began at 8:15 every morning when a fleet of cars met at the Bible College, to transport the students to the High Park Church area.

There they had an hour of briefing, prayer, testimony, and preparation for the morning's activity, which involved visiting the homes of the community. This program was laid out with military precision, and the student Evangelistic Leaders (John Pomeroy and Cynthia Harrison) did a tremendous job in organization.

Each afternoon Children's Meetings were held in four of the five churches and these too were in the charge of the students. In each one of the meetings, decisions were made for the Lord Jesus Christ.

On Wednesday afternoon a special Ladies' Meeting was held which was directed by the Women students of the College, and Don Summers spoke. Some 50 women gathered for the special meeting.

It is difficult to evaluate such a crusade, but from the comments of both ministers and church people, and the results that were very evident, the Campaign was worthwhile in the reviving of God's people, and the salvation of souls. The ministers themselves have testified to the quickening among their own people, and if this can spread out even farther, then the work of the Campaign is not yet finished.

The following is a list of the statistics compiled to show the extent of the Campaign.

- Homes visited—7,048
- Unchurched families in homes visited—516
- Children attending 20 meetings—1,280
- Special services held in churches—17
- Decisions in evening meetings—37
- Special contacts (people dealt with, asking for ministers etc.)—212
- Decisions for Christ during visitation—2.

In addition to the foregoing, students themselves spoke of the new work done in their own hearts, and many of them caught a new glimpse of what God can do through various means when He has the people willing and ready to work.

### HOW GOD TAUGHT ME TO GIVE

**I** commenced my pastorate at this particular church at a time when they were holding their Annual Missionary Convention. I had never been to a convention in my life, and didn't know the first thing to do. So I just sat

there on the platform and watched.

"The ushers were giving out envelopes, and presently, one had the audacity to walk right up the aisle and hand me — the pastor — one of the envelopes! I sat there holding it in my hand. Never will I forget that moment.

"As I held it I read it: 'In dependence upon God I will endeavor to give . . . \$—— during the coming year.'" I had never read such a statement before. I did not know that that morning God was going to deal with me and teach me a lesson that I was never to forget.

"I started to pray, 'Lord God, I can't do anything. You know I have nothing. I haven't a cent in the bank. This church pays me \$25.00 a week. I have a wife and child to keep, . . .'

"I know that,' the Lord said. 'I know you are only getting \$25.00 a week. I know you have nothing in your pocket and nothing in the bank.'

"Well, then,' I continued, 'that settles it. I have nothing to give and I cannot give anything.'

"Then the Lord spoke again. 'I am not asking you for what you have,' He said. 'I am asking you for a Faith Offering. How much can you trust Me for?'

"Oh, Lord,' I exclaimed, 'that's different. How much can I trust Thee for?'

"I knew nothing about a Faith Offering. But I knew the Lord was speaking. Once I had given \$5.00 for missions, once \$3.00, once \$2.00, but never more than \$5.00. I almost trembled as I waited for His answer.

"Presently it came. I am not going to ask you to believe that God spoke to me in an audible voice, but He might just as well have done so. I was unaware of the congregation as I sat there listening to the Voice of God.

"Fifty dollars.'

"Fifty dollars,' I exclaimed. 'Why, Lord, how can I ever get \$50.00?'

"But again the Lord spoke, and I obeyed His command. How I ever paid that amount I really cannot say. Every month I had to pray for \$4.00, and every month the Lord gave it to me. I received such a blessing, it was such a thrill, that as I paid the final amount, I realized that it had been one of the greatest experiences of my life."

**T**oronto Bible College is a "missionary" College, and large numbers of its graduates are found on the Mission fields of the world. One who has just returned from a visit to Africa to take up the task as home representative has written: "I trust that there may be an opportunity to visit the College again. My wife and I have been so grateful to the Lord for leading us to study at T.B.C."

The other one, now employed by a national radio station says: "Your T.B.C. missionaries out here are very dear friends of ours in the Lord. They were used to lead us to the Lord and how we love them. We pray that the Lord will

give us grace for the days that lie ahead. The 1962 Gateway is lovely. Thank you for all the help you have given and all we shall receive in the future."

These come to us fully and highly recommended by Missionaries. They come as strangers, but sisters in the Lord. If any readers of the Recorder will be interested in helping or even sponsoring their time here (tuition etc.) do let us know. But for them we covet prayer fellowship as they take this big and decisive step into the new experiences, new country and new friends in preparation for service as they return to their own country to serve the Lord Jesus Christ there.

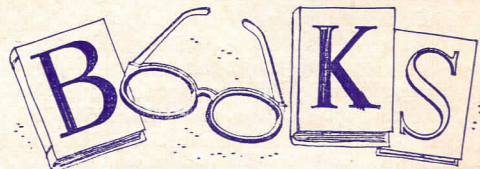
