

"NO RESERVE, NO RETREAT, NO REGRETS"

his theme for the 1964 Missionary Conference at Toronto Bible College, was evidenced, not only as a goal to strive for, but something that was in actual practice. To share in this very excellently organized, arranged and carried-out conference, was to realize that the student committee had already made this their personal theme. There was "no reserve" in the volume of prayer and work, out of which the blessing of the Lord sprang during these four days together during Feb. 5-8. The faculty and students had united in earnest prayer long before the conference, and during the conference they were joined by Missionaries from 30 foreign mission boards, prayer preparing the soil in which God could work.

The theme itself was the life motto used nearly fifty years ago by Borden of Yale, and this formed the basis of the special messages brought by Dr. Don Hillis, the Associate Director of The Evangelical Alliance Mission. The book, "Bordon of Yale" by Mrs. Howard Taylor, was also given to the students as the conference missions book for 1964.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE CONFERENCE

To pick out highlights of the missionary conference such as is held at T.B.C., is usually very difficult. This year however, being the 70th anniversary of the Bible College, there was an historical perspective that was indicative of the outstanding missionary emphasis of the Toronto Bible College.

Perhaps the highlight that will be remembered longest was the "Old Timers' Panel" when eight missionaries who went to the field early in this century, sat around the table on the platform to tell of the leading of the Lord and the experiences of those early years. These eight missionaries: Dr. E. Fish, Rev. John Bell, Rev. H. K. Dancy, Rev. Victor Veary, Rev. R. B. Oliver, Rev. & Mrs. J. Proctor, and Mrs. G. W. Playfair, had

served in missionary work for a total of 398 years! As they told of the leading of the Lord, and the many experiences that they had, often in danger of their lives, tears and laughter alternated, as we realized the truth of the scripture that says that these are men and women "of whom the world is not worthy". Their testimony, as echoed by Dr. Fish, was that the Lord alone was worthy of their lives, and their united testimony was that they would "gladly do it over again" if they could have the opportunity and the years.

Panels and discussion groups that ran the gamut from "Missions Yesterday", "Missions Today", to "Missions Tomorrow," Missions and the National Church, Missionary Qualifications, and many others, proved of real help and vital interest to the student body and the friends that gathered with them.

Perhaps to balance the Old Timers' panel, was one of missionaries who were home on their first furlough, and students who had applied for missionary service and were preparing to go out to the field almost as soon as they graduate. No more startling contrast could have been seen, than the picture of the older ones who where laying down the burden, and the younger ones who were taking it up. Surely it is for this purpose that Toronto Bible College was raised up.

A skit by the students themselves, portraying a very imaginative interplanetary meeting somewhere in Mars, brought the truth home to those who were gathered for opening day: that instead of reaching for the moon, the church should be interested in "the uttermost part of the earth".

The main speakers for the conference included the Rev. Dennis Clark of India; Rev. Gordon Dunn of the Far East; Mrs. J. Proctor of Africa; Mr. Paul Roffe of

Latin America; and the Rev. E. Davies of Europe. These, together with nearly fifty missionaries representing the many mission boards, provided counselling, entered into discussions, and made literature available, all with the end in view that the young people might be fully informed and prepared unto every good work.

We asked Dr. Don Hillis, to comment on the conference, and this is what he said: "It was a personal joy to share in the Missionary Conference of Toronto Bible College, on its 70th anniversary year. The percentage of T.B.C. graduates, who have gone and are going to the foreign fields, has been enviably high. It is the avowed purpose of Mr. Percy, the Director of Missions, to maintain and increase this percentage as the Lord should continue to bless the work of the Missions Department at the Bible College. Dr. S. L. Boehmer, President of T.B.C., is in whole-hearted accord with

this missionary drive, as are the board of governors, the faculty and all associated with the school.

"My own personal contact with the College was an encouragement and a blessing to me, and on behalf of my mission may I say that The Evangelical Alliance Mission anticipates the privilege of receiving applications from many T.B.C. graduates for missionary service in the days to come. On behalf of TEAM, I would particularly extend congratulations to the 50 young people who will be graduating this year. We would invite the prayerful interest of these young people in the work of TEAM."

33 DEDICATE LIVES

Perhaps there is not anyone who will forget the 1964 Missionary Conference. But it was on the Saturday night when hearts were solemned and hushed, that God broke down barriers and moved in such a wonderful way. The scene was set by the missionary banquet, which emphasized India, in decoration and in the very lovely Indian meal supervised by Mrs. Dennis Clark. When Mr. Silas Fox brought a brief message at the banquet table, he did it in his own inimitable style, in which he gave expression to the passion of a long life spent for the Lord in India.

To go up to the auditorium, and join with nearly four hundred people for the final and solemn service, was in itself a benediction, after the four days of conference. The T.B.C. Chorale sang, and the noted T.B.C. Trio of other years (Carol Leck, '63, Helen Oliver, '63, Sandra Martin, '64) also provided a special number, and hearts were lifted up expectantly as Dr. Hillis began to speak.

At 9:30 p.m. the conference was nearly over. An invitation was given. Quietly and reverently the great congregation in the auditorium began to sing "All to Jesus I surrender, All to Him I freely give." The first verse was sung quietly and solemnly. As the second verse began there was a rustle, and one of this year's graduating class stepped out from her seat and slowly, quietly, thoughtfully, she walked to the front of the auditorium to stand in a solemn dedication of life. As the hymn continued, so did the spirit of God continue to speak, and as the meeting closed 33 young people had stood to their feet and walked forward, dedicating their lives for the service of the Lord Jesus Christ where-ever He would lead them. The majority of these were students in the College, but there were many outsiders who had come to visit and had stayed to surrender.

We now pray that God will not only take these who publicly gave this witness of commitment, but many others who in the quietness of their own hearts said: "Here am I Lord, send me."

So Toronto Bible College begins another 70 years, if the Lord should tarry, in the training of men and women, and praying the Lord of the harvest that He thrust them forth into the harvest fields of the world.

Said Mrs. Veary: "We lived by faith in those days at T.B.C. and all these years, have daily proved the promises of God."

Now after 40 years, there was an accrued interest that totalled \$5.15! "I just had to send it to T.B.C." wrote Mrs. Veary. "And since that day, I have repeated those words over and over. "TRY THE TORONTO BIBLE COLLEGE, MISSIONARIES GO OUT FROM THERE!" Of course they do. In our class of 1923-24, more than 75% have gone into all the world. From now on our slogan will be: "Try T.B.C. Missionaries go out from there!"

GOD'S COVENANTS by Donald G. Barnhouse Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Co. Price \$3.50

This is Vol. 8 in the Barnhouse series on Bible Doctrines. This one covers Rom. 9:1-11:36. Recommended for ministers and students of the Word.

ORIGINS OF THE SYNOPTIC GOSPELS

by Ned B. Stonehouse Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Co. Price \$4.50

The late Dr. Stonehouse took four of the most crucial questions asked of the gospels, and analyzes and answers them well. The book is thoroughly documented and indexed for ready reference.

INTERPRETING THE BIBLE by A. Bergeley Mickelsen Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Co. Price \$5.95

The professor of Bible and Theology at Wheaton College has produced a scholarly book for students and teachers. For those who are searching the Scriptures, Dr. Mickelsen seeks to discover the meaning of the Bible Authors, and to transmit the meaning to modern readers. Throughout the book, the love of God in Jesus Christ is paramount, for it is of Him, that the Scriptures are the supreme witness.

Two Missions Books: A STRATEGY OF MISSIONS by Harold R. Cook Price \$1.50 FACING FACTS IN MODERN MISSIONS A SYMPOSIUM Price \$1.75

Both of these paper backs are published by Moody Press and are valuable aids to re-thinking Missions today. Dr. Cook has again provided a sharp, clear insight into Missions for 1964.

BIBLE PARADOXES by R. Earl Allen Price \$2.75 G. R. Welch Co. Ltd.

Anyone who has read the New Testament, and particularly the teaching of the Lord Jesus Christ, must have been captivated by some of the striking paradoxes that He used.

A paradox is "an assertion of sentiment seemingly contradictory, or opposed to common sense, but that may be true in fact". The author uses some of our Lord's teaching on "receiving by giving", "freedom through slavery", "rest through labour", "living through dying", and many, many others that will burst forth with new meaning to the readers of this very easily read book.

THE BASIS OF CHRISTIAN UNITY by D. Martyn Lloyd-Jones Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Co. Price .50c

Dr. Lloyd-Jones has produced this very inexpensive paper back volume of a message on John 17 and Ephesians 4. It is written as only Dr. Lloyd-Jones can write. The Bible student or minister will find a rich field in this little book.

THEM HE GLORIFIED by Bernard Ramm Price \$3.25

Dr. Ramm has added to his already wide range of published works, with this book which is a systematic study of the doctrine of glorification as revealed in the Old and the New Testaments and fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ. In his preface Dr. Ramm says "Therefore present salvation is anticipatory of further salvation. The bringing to perfection of our present salvation in the future end time is exactly the substance of the doctrine of glorification". His chapter on "The Glorification of the Body" is a particularly fresh and illuminating thesis on the real dignity of the human body as the last and highest creation of God.

HAND BOOK OF BIBLE HISTORY by George Stob

Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Co.

This is the third volume in a series of four, that covers the whole scope of Bible history from the time of creation, to the history of the Christian Church as given in the Acts of the Apostles and the Epistles.

This volume (number 3) covers the gospels only, from the preparation for the coming of the Holy Child Jesus to the resurrection and His appearance to the disciples and to the world.

ISRAEL AND THE NATIONS by F. F. Bruce Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Co. Price \$4.00

Here is another book of history, this time dealing with the period from the Exodus to the fall of the second temple in 70 A.D.

The annals of the nation of Israel, continues to be the most amazing piece of history known. Dr. Bruce has taken the Bible story, as well as extra-Biblical material (the writings of secular historians and the inscriptions left by cultures contemporary with ancient Israel) and has woven them together in a very fascinating story. Overriding all his writing of course is the majesty and the glory of God Who is the Ruler of all history.

THE FOUR MAJOR CULTS by Anthony Hoekema Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Co. Price \$5.90

This book adds to the growing list of comprehensive works on some of the more aggressive cults that are spreading their teaching throughout the world today. The present volume deals with Mormanism, Jehovah's Witnesses, Seventh Day Adventism, and Christian Science, and the author has a well documented, well written approach to each one of

He deals well with the history of these groups which are fascinating, insofar as they all began in the 19th century, and whose founders' names are revered and their teachings are still honoured. The founders themselves would prove to be a fascinating study, since Joseph Smith, Charles T. Russell, Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy, and Mrs. Ellen G. White have all given strong evidence of immoral, unbalanced, or neurotic behaviour. How the teachings of such can be accepted is a mystery, even taking into account the weakness and fallibility of man. The author has given a strong case against each of the four major cults, that should be understood by the Christian church

SPLENDOUR FROM THE SEA by W. Phillip Keller The Moody Press Price \$4.30

For many many years, the Shantymen's Christian Association has been a part of the Christian advance in North America, and particularly in Canada. Perhaps there are many Christian people who do not know that there are conditions on our North American continent as stark and primitive as any in the heart of Africa, and in the midst of it are thousands of men particularly, and women and children, who need to hear the message of the gospel.

The agency that God raised up to shoulder the major part of this task is the Shantymen's Christian Association, and this book is the story of the founding and work of that God - blessed

organization.

This is one of the few books written about an organization that does not praise men, for you will not find names running through it. Rather is the name of Jesus Christ and the glory of God the theme, and in the reading of it one's heart is not only thrilled and challenged by vivid descriptions and stirring tales, but by the simple faith of men and women, and by a God Who hears and answers prayer.
