

young student, confused by Scriptural perplexities, once came to C.H. Spurgeon. The great preacher responded, "Young man, give God credit for understanding some things you don't understand." Paul addresses his magnificent doxology to "the only wise God" (Rom. 16:27). Of all God's attributes, I find His wisdom most intriguing.

Dr. S.L. Johnson defines God's wisdom as the application of His knowledge to attain the best possible goals, by the best possible means, for the best possible reasons. Because He is wise, His goals, means, and reasons are perfect. If better goals were possible, or means to achieve them, than those God chooses, He is not wise. To complain is to question His wisdom.

The display of God's wisdom during this past academic year has been impressive. OTS became a Center for Chinese Studies. Canada's first graduate Youth Ministries program was launched. Two new Vice-Presidents joined OBC/OTS. Our Bachelor of Religious Studies degree was government approved. The government also approved grants to our students. OBC/OTS graduations were thrilling. Quality men and women moved into further study and ministry – each a monument to His wisdom.

In God's wisdom, some faculty and staff will leave us. We will miss them.

Wisdom not only resides in God, it is derived from Him. ''He gives wisdom to the wise men'' (Dan. 2:21). What an encouragement! Expanding the Library, Seminary and Liberal Arts program, developing our Center for Expository Preaching, finalizing the OTS accrediting process and cultivating Biblical spirituality require God's wisdom. Do pray that it may be ours. Thank you for standing with us so faithfully. We are deeply grateful. God's wisdom dictates mutual dependency – you upon us, we upon you. The plan couldn't be more perfect.

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Refining a Critical Mass

hysicists call the amount of fissionable material needed to sustain a nuclear chain reaction a *critical mass*. It is the minimum mass of uranium necessary for a nuclear reactor or a nuclear bomb. The term invites application in other spheres as well. Bell Labs has its basic research facility in Murray Hill, New Jersey. Housed in a single, 6-storey brick building, Bell has gathered a research force of 3,200. Bell has intentionally formed a critical mass of gifted scientists and brilliant Ph.D.s. Grouping this enormous amount of human inventiveness and ingenuity in one place has set off a chain reaction leading to inventions and patents changing the way the world communicates.

Ontario Bible College and Ontario Theological Seminary have intentionally sought to refine a critical mass within the Christian community by gathering together faculty and students who are committed to a disciplined and intensive study of God's Word, Christian theology, and practical ministries. Aided by the support of others and with some measure of personal sacrifice, people are brought together for a short period of time to stimulate and further develop their understanding of God, the church, and the world, and to become better equipped for ministry.

Although academic excellence is important, the emphasis is on spiritual maturity and giftedness, rather than brilliance. The end product is not a new profit-making technique but a better equipped, wiser Christian who sets off a chain reaction of ministry.

NEHEMIAH: A CASE STUDY IN CRITICAL MASS STRATEGY

Nehemiah is an excellent case study in the implementation of a critical mass strategy. The same principles used to unite the people of God in common cause to rebuild Jerusalem and deepen their devotion to Yahweh are significant for establishing Christian solidarity. As a spiritual leader, Nehemiah combined an earnest devotion to God with the practical expertise of a capable administrator. This combination of practical and spiritual considerations was crucial to the development of Israel's solidarity. No amount of emotional support or public challenge could replace the practical strategy Nehemiah was committed to working out.

AN INTEGRATED STRATEGY OF PLANNING AND PRAYER

Nehemiah facilitated a critical mass strategy by thinking through a full range of issues: from repentance to work routines, from worship to interest rates, from Bible study groups to construction materials. Nehemiah demonstrated that critical mass is not formed on good intentions or great principles alone. Whether we are planting a church or developing a seminary, we need to deal with people as whole people. As John Stott says, "People are neither bodyless souls nor soulless bodies

but bodies and souls in community."

Nehemiah's vision of God's mission for Israel was not at the expense of basic practical considerations.

Nehemiah was a spiritual leader as well as a diplomat, engineer, and accountant - a rare combination of abilities in one man. But even Nehemiah saw himself as part of a leadership team, dependent upon the wisdom and ability of others to sustain the critical mass. Nehemiah knew that timber as well as trust was necessary to rebuild Jerusalem and Israel's spiritual community. Those who support OBC and OTS have a right to expect leaders who plan and pray like Nehemiah. If we follow Nehemiah's example, we need to be wise and creative in fulfilling our responsibilities to educate men and women in the Word of God. But we also need to be wise and creative when it comes to physical facilities, library development, salaries, and financial aid. All these concerns are important for shaping the OBC/OIS critical mass.

ENCOURAGING OWNERSHIP AND SOLIDARITY

A second quality of Nehemiah's leadership was his ability to encourage "ownership." Models of leadership which promote the leader's public image and depend upon a contrived enthusiasm fail to build Christian community. Nehemah knew that success depended upon God's people, personally and corporately, owning the community experience. This went far beyond each family building up its section of the wall. It

extended to virtually every aspect of community life. "Ownership" meant that each Israelite accepted as his or her own the spiritual, ethical and vocational responsibilities of being part of the critical mass. From his initial challenge "Come let us rebuild the wall of Jerusalem" to the final dedication of the wall, Nehemiah believed in the people's ownership of God's work.

When he opposed the "nobles and officials" for exacting usury from the poor, Nehemiah risked his own leadership to guard the dignity of people. Cultivating ownership meant pursuing Biblical justice rather than economic expediency. It involved taking the time to nurture spiritual understanding rather than staging religious performances. By subsuming individual success and achievement within the larger and more meaningful sphere of the people of God, Nehemiah sought to sustain the chain reaction of God's people doing God's work. In the "Body" language of our day, Nehemiah's policy means "shared leadership," "team ministry" and "everymember" participation. We need this spirit of ownership to characterize the corporate solidarity of OBC and OTS. This means gathering faculty, students, supporters and board members into a partnership which respects each other's needs and abilities, and depends upon one another for his or her distinctive contribution. Personal sacrifice and individual accomplishment are seen from the vantage point of a shared commitment to the mutual benefit of a dynamic spiritual community.

PERSEVERING UNDER PRESSURE

A third quality of Nehemiah's leadership was his commitment to persevere against powerful critics and serious cultural pressures poised to rob God's people of solidarity. Sanballat and Tobiah have their counterparts today in those who cling to their selfish interests by defending the status quo. They resist change because it disrupts their position of control and power. They are disturbed when the welfare of others is promoted. Against the success of Jerusalem they mock and plot, unaware that God will judge them for their sinful resistance.

Tobiah was proud and powerful – a man impressed with his own importance. He was a political insider, networking his negativism and seducing the elite. One of Nehemiah's final acts was to expel this spiritual outsider from an apartment in the temple, right at the nerve centre of Jersualem society. What was true in Nehemiah's day still is sadly true today. The likes of Tobiah need to be

What was true in Nehemiah's day still is sadly true today. The likes of Tobiah need to be resisted for the sake of the spiritual community. The expenditure of spiritual energy may be draining, but it is necessary for the sake of faithfulness and spiritual solidarity.

A CRITICAL MASS OF TEACHABLE, GIFTED CHRISTIANS

At OBC and OTS we have a responsibility to refine a critical mass of teachable, gifted Christians who are ready and willing to set off a chain reaction of ministry: "to prepare God's people for works of service, so that the

Body of Christ may be built up'' (Eph. 4:12). Following the leadership example of Nehemiah, we ought to think Christianly about every aspect of work. We need to encourage "ownership" so that faculty, students, board members and staff participate fully in their calling. Finally, we must stay alert to the pressures which threaten to obscure our vision and frustrate our involvement. At a discouraging time and in a defeated condition Israel became a critical mass to the glory of God and to the displeasure of her enemies. We have that challenge before us and by God's grace we can "reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature. attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ'' (Eph. 4:13). These three principles holistic leadership, personal involvement and spiritual discernment certainly apply within our local churches. They do not arise

leaders who are willing to deny their own egos and opinions for the sake of solid Christian issues and community solidarity. "Ownership" not only must be offered, it must be sought by Christians who desire to give of themselves and use their spiritual gifts. And spiritual discernment is the fruit of a long-term, Spiritguided, disciplined approach to the whole counsel of God.

CAROL COMEAU:

A Missionary in Downtown Toronto...

people person. That's how colleagues, friends and those she ministers to describe Carol Comeau (M.T.S. '85). As a faith missionary at Evergreen, a branch of the Yonge Street Mission, Carol uses her many talents and natural relational skills in ministering to street kids and psychiatric outpatients. Carol came from Fredericton to study at OTS after completing her education

degree at the University of New Brunswick and teaching elementary school for three years. Her field education placement at Yonge Street Mission abruptly plunged her into the inner city – an unfamiliar world filled with colourful people. But their open honesty and friendliness attracted Carol to them. Upon graduation, she joined the Mission full time. Since then, she has played an integral role in helping to plant the Church on the Street (a congregation for street people which meets at Evergreen) and developing a women's ministry at Evergreen.

"Serving here means having my blinders of naivete ripped away," says Carol. "You see and experience things that will never allow you to be quite the same again." She describes street people she knows: child prostitutes, homeless teenagers living in stairwells and eating from trash cans, and psychiatric outpatients longing to be treated like human beings.

While there is sorrow in the city, there is also much joy: Lucille's delight about getting her own place after years of living in a psychiatric outpatient's boarding house; Jason's excitement about staying straight and holding a job for the first time in his life; Kim's enthusiasm, as a new Christian, after leading a fellow punker to faith; Steve's pride at becoming a street church leader when he grew up believing he'd always be a failure.

These are the rewards of inner city ministry.

Not only does she work downtown, but Carol and her husband, Michael, live and play there too. They enjoy the sights and sounds of their Greek neighbourhood and are involved in an inner city church, Danforth Baptist.

Carol says she is grateful for the training she received at OTS that prepared her for ministry. Yet she wonders why Ethics class never tackled the question, "Does reaching the street kids mean you have to dye your hair purple?"



SHEELAH MARWICK


