

A CALL TO HOLINESS

he practice of personal holiness is a rare commodity.

he practice of personal holiness is a rare commodity in our marketplace. Our standards of practical holiness are at the lowest point in the history of the western world. A commitment to holiness in one's personal life is not a common call today. It is my firm conviction that we need a thorough revival of personal holiness in evangelicalism.

How to be holy? That is the question! And it is the question! will be addressing this year in my President's Chapels at both the College and the Seminary in a series entitled "A Call to Holiness." I urge you to pray that a deep commitment to practical holiness will be cultivated among us through these chapel messages.

Nowhere is holiness more clearly declared than in Hebrews 12:14: "Make every effort...to be holy; without holiness no one will see the Lord." Four glorious and sobering truths are woven into the fabric of this text.

First, holiness is a lifestyle to be pursued by every Christian. It is a walk in conformity to the nature and will of God. Second. holiness is a possibility for every believer. What a word of encouragement to those struggling with sin. Holiness is possible because of God's provision for us in Christ. Third, holiness is the responsibility of every believer. The imperatives of the New Testament make this conclusion impossible to avoid. Dr. John White says, "Holiness is not optional for a Christian. It is not an elective. It is your major!" Finally, holiness is essential for fellowship with God.

In a sense, at OBC/OTS we are returning to our roots with this emphasis. A distinctive of the early Bible college movement was a focus on personal piety. This is a part of our tradition which we cannot afford to let slip.

There is a significant relation between this year's chapel theme (Holiness) and this year's UPDATE theme (The Lordship of Christ). This issue of UPDATE focuses upon His Lordship over the nations. In subsequent issues, we will focus upon society, the Church and our lives. Where His Lordship is recognized, holiness will be evident!

Through your prayers and financial support you are a valued member of our extended OBC/OTS family. Frankly, each month I grow to appreciate you more. Under God, you enable us to train hundreds of men and women each year for leadership in our world. Thank you so much.

As part of our community, I invite you to join us this year in the pursuit of personal holiness in your life.

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CHRIST: Lord of the Nations

here is a certain uneasiness about today – a feeling that everything is out of control or on the verge of slipping away beyond the point of no return. The world, the nations, our own personal lives – all seer to be beyond our control. Indeed, beyond anyone's power or capabilities.

We live in the hope that leaders of the nations will act reasonably in their relations with one another, with justice ar compassion within their own countries. But there are those whose arbitrary acts of violence, oppression and terrorism cause us to question the motives and decisions of others in places of power, or of those who might gain power.

Economic uncertainty, unforeseen and unpredictable events, accidents, unexpected illness combine with the pressures of everyday affairs to produce in many of us an underlying anxiety about our lives. We fear our lives are out of control – given over to sheer chance or fate.

CHRIST: Lord of the Nations

THERE IS SOMEONE IN CONTROL

But out of the ancient texts of the Christian Scriptures that we trust come magnificent declarations that there is Someone in control – in control of creation, the nations and its leaders and in control of our lives as well.

It was this great fact that gave courage to Job during the time of his own suffering – God was in control of creation, of the nations and of his own personal life. For that reason, he could not give up his faith and trust in Him (Job 12:23; 13:15). The Psalmist echoes the same message when he writes in a more prophetic vein: ''All the ends of the earth will remember and turn to the Lord, and all the families of the nations will bow down before Him, for dominion belongs to the Lord and He rules over the nations'' (Ps. 22:27,28).

GOD INTENDS TO BRING HIS BLESSINGS TO THE NATIONS

Because of this, the Church must always be missionary in nature. We do not have exclusive claims on Christ. He is Lord of the Church, but He is more than that. Indeed, as He is Lord over the nations, so He is Lord over the Church. Through Christ, God intends to bring His blessings to the nations (Gal. 3:8; Rom. 16:26) and is now in the process of doing so. What an important part we have to play in this. Hence, Christ's commands to His disciples: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit..." (Matt.28:18,19); "...you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8).

A COMMAND

These passages of Scripture contain both a *command* and a *promise*. We are *commanded* to carry the good news of His salvation and Lordship to the very ends of the earth. What a privilege! What a responsibility! "We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making His appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God' (Il Cor. 5:20). This is a responsibility that we do not bear lightly. It is to be to all people (Luke 2:10). The message has implications for life or death, for peace or war, for victory or defeat, for forgiveness or condemnation.

Historically, Christians have been called upon to leave family, friends and homeland to carry this message to people around the world. This is still necessary. According to Ralph Winter, there are still 16,750 ''hidden peoples'' without a gospel testimony in their culture. This calls for a major missionary thrust in these great days of opportunity.

But something new is happening in Canada today. God has brought peoples from the nations of the world to our very doorsteps. What a day this is. Each of us can be and must be involved in making disciples of all nations right here at home.

A PROMISE

These passages also contain a great *promise*, for it is not just that the gospel *must* be proclaimed. It *will* be proclaimed, and people from among the nations will respond. Indeed, they are responding in many countries as never before. On every continent, among every nation, men and women are pledging their allegiance to Christ as Lord and Saviour.

One of the most striking examples is in the Peoples Republic of China where, during the cultural revolution, every effort was made by the leadership of the country to stamp out the Church and so destroy every vestige of Christ's Lordship. Yet God is doing a new thing in that land and men and women are coming to Christ in great numbers. Bishop K.H. Ting notes that, since 1979 "Churches are increasing for the Protestants at the rate of no fewer than one per day."

There is a great harvest taking place, as our Lord said there would be. Christians everywhere need to rejoice in our Lord and continue to give to Him the obedience that is rightfully His. The task of proclamation calls for faithful ambassadors who will represent their Lord among the people of the earth. It also requires sacrificial support from God's people everywhere. But the promise stands. Christ is Lord of the nations, and one day that Lordship will be visible to all.

"After this I looked and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and in front of the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands. And they cried out in a loud voice: "Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb" (Rev. 7:9,10).

OUR COMMITMENT TO HIS LORDSHIP

At the heart of OBC/OTS is our commitment to His Lordship over the nations. Missions is not an option. It is a major for our faculty, staff and students. Under the hand of God our agenda is to train men and women for the grand task of proclaiming His Lordship in our world. That is why I am so delighted this year to join the seminary faculty in their Missions Department. Do pray for us that by His grace we will make a difference in this world. That is our prayer for you too.

China – A Christian Visitor's Perspective

In June this year, Don and I joined Roger and Lynn Smith for an adventure in Hong Kong and China.

Hong Kong and China are two different worlds. Hong Kong is a giant shopping centre – not unlike Toronto. China is another place and time.

In China I felt as if I were visiting a movie set. During the day we observed primitive methods of agriculture, unchanged in a thousand years. Water buffalo plowed rice paddies. People balanced bamboo poles on their shoulders to carry loaded baskets. Winter wheat was cut by hand, winnowed by tossing in the air with a flat basket and cured by spreading on the roads to dry. Healthy crops indicated that ancient methods of agriculture work.

In the evening we returned home to our hotel built for foreigners. Good food was set before us and refreshing wet face cloths were given to each of us to wipe away the heat and grime. Our hotel cocoon was comfortable. It was as if our insulated existence was reality and the world outside our airconditioned window a movie. In fact, the opposite was true. Our hotel and bus could be "turned off" and life in China would go on uninterrupted.

We were faced with the fact that people are people everywhere, but cultures create barriers between us. We talked about bridging the cultural gap between Canada and China to share the good news about Christ. Our conclusion was that there are two clear paths open to many of us. One is teaching English in schools in China and the other is hosting students and scholars from China.

One enjoyable evening in Beijing we met three young women who are finishing a two-year term teaching English in a college. They had ridden their bicycles for one hour to visit us and faced the same ride home in the rain after our visit. They had opportunities to talk about Christianity as part of their westem culture class as well as informally with their students. Many Chinese young people are eager to learn and practise English. English teaching positions are available in China. The only requirement is a degree – in anything.

Providing hospitality to Chinese scholars can be a rich experience. As part of their exchange, these men and women are interested in seeing how Canadians live and what they believe about life. By developing links of friendship with these influential people, we have the chance to share God's care and truth.

Singapore 87 – A Canadian Perspective

Expanding information, communication, and transportation technologies. A world population of five billion people. The growth of cities. Changing family roles. Shifting national wealth. Opposing worldviews. Politically closed countries. A church with no boundaries. This was the challenge set before us at Singapore 87 as younger leaders committed to world evangelization.

Representing about 70 countries, some 300 of us had the privilege of meeting together from June 1 to 10 at the National University of Singapore under the sponsorship of the Lausanne Committee for World Evangelization. Built around the themes of Christian leadership and world mission today, the conference included Bible teaching, small group discussions, plenary theme addresses, workshops, seminars and joyful times of worship with a thoroughly international congregation.

Perhaps the most significant aspect of Singapore 87 was the opportunity to meet pastors, teachers, evangelists, theologians and Christian workers from around the world. Over the meal table, we discussed the spiritual life of our churches, the barriers to effective proclamation of the Gospel in our cultures and the prospects for Christian mission in the world today. In these informal times together, friendships and networks of relationships developed which we pray will be used by God to enhance effective co-operation in mission among our generation.

So challenged were the Canadian participants at the conference that we drafted and signed a statement called ''Younger Leaders on World Evangelization: A Canadian Agenda.' The document represents our commitment to develop theologies and strategies for evangelism which will address the Canadian context. We are praying that it might serve as a catalyst to encourage other younger leaders in Canada to respond to God's call for world evangelization.

While at Singapore 87, I also had the opportunity to meet with about 25 Bible college and seminary professors. The Lausanne movement has always had a strong Biblical and theological basis in the Lausanne Covenant, a statement on the mission of the Church under which many different groups have been able to co-operate in the common task of world evangelization. Issued in 1974 at the International Congress on World Evangelization in Lausanne, Switzerland, it has been followed up by a variety of consultations and study documents. It was thrilling to meet and hear that many are still working to integrate theology and evangelism in the worldwide cause of mission 13 years after that first Lausanne event. The Scottish theologian, James Denney, once said that "if evangelists were theologians, or theologians evangelists, we should at least be nearer the ideal Church." I left Singapore 87 with a renewed vision of how our ministry at OBC/OTS fits into the worldwide task of evangelization. Let us be praying for the 1989 Lausanne Congress in Singapore.





MRS. MARION NEWBY (CROWLEY '50)

arion Crowley Newby, contralto Gospel soloist, was born and educated in Toronto. She received the ATCM (now ARCT) diploma in piano in 1945 (Associate of the Royal Conservatory of Music). Studying voice under the late Madame Monica Vellamo, she was planning a concert career.

However, after dedicating her life and talents to the Lord Jesus Christ while in her early

20s, she entered TBC for training and was graduated in 1950. Marion taught voice at OBC on both London and Toronto campuses. From 1962-74, she taught music for the Kent County Board of Education.

In Canada's centennial year, the Recreation Department of the City of Chatham produced a long-playing album of Marion singing hymns and spirituals as its centennial project.

After a devastating illness, husband Percy went home to be with the Lord in March, 1982. Marion has one son Duane, a daughter Dalyce and two granddaughters.

Marion has been a member of North Park Community Chapel, and for a short time, a member of Byron Chapel, London, Ontario.

Her latest tape "Glorified," contains ten songs (spiritual, contemporary, and traditional Gospel) arranged by her accompanist, Brian Usher, with backup voices and a ten piece band. As a single person again, Marion has resumed travelling as a Gospel soloist with her own acompanist for recitals, retreats, conferences, anniversaries and special services.

Marion says, "Looking back at my time of study at TBC, I regard those years as the three happiest of my life. As a maried student, I found many counselling opportunities among the students who had selected me as head girl in my graduating class. As a student, I was deeply impressed by the demonstrated principle of the Holy Spirit's corporate leadership, which was practised by faculty, staff and students."

Everywhere Marion travels, she meets alumni of OBC. In Australia, Arkansas and Ontario she has ministered in churches where alumni serve as senior pastors; associate, visitation and youth pastors; Christian education directors; etc. As she ministers musically, Marion has the joy of seeing people come to Christ and be built up in their faith.

Central to her whole presentation in song is the person and work of the Lord Jesus Christ. She insists that the genuine Gospel musician ''uses songs that magnify and glorify Christ, not a human personality.'' In this way, needs of loneliness, guilt and ignorance of God, Christ and the Bible are happily met.

DIRECTOR OF CHINESE MINISTRY PROGRAM, OTS

Dr. Milton Wan of the China Graduate School of Theology, Hong Kong, has been appointed as director of the Chinese Studies program at OTS. This program is designed to train students to minister in the burgeoning Chinese congregations of Canada with their strong oriental roots and their immersion in western life. Dr. Wan is uniquely qualified to lead this program, as he did his first doctorate in theology in England and, while teaching at CGST, is completing a second doctorate in Chinese culture. The program will train those who wish to minister among the Chinese of Asia as well as other parts of the world.
