# **Seminary Expansion Started**

pace at last! On recommendation of its Campus Facilities Committee, the Board of Governors approved a \$2.4 million expansion of the Seminary. This will double the size of the Seminary to 22,000 sq. ft. and includes construction of a muchneeded covered walkway to connect the Seminary to the College and residence

Lael Construction Co. Ltd. said it could start in mid-May and expected to finish by March 1992. The work will be done in two phases. After the new twostorey expansion is completed, renovations will be done to the present building to make it more functional.

Among the gains will be two more classrooms, a chapel, which can also be used as a classroom, a preaching lab, a student reading room, a board room. which can be used for

seminars, more faculty offices (at present four OTS faculty work out of the College) and a faculty lounge.

Dr. Ian Rennie, vice-president and academic dean, OTS, says that with a total of seven class rooms the Seminary will be able to offer more courses in the part-time program, scheduled on Mondays and in the evenings.

A new student lounge, in the centre of the complex, will connect the new and old sections. The project architect is Gary Rankin of Deacon, Arnett, Murray and Rankin, Architects.

The Seminary expansion is the largest project of the Commitment to

Excellence campaign. Funds received have already been used for faculty and staff professional enhancement and to do the College retrofit. Phase one of the library expansion is also part of the campaign.



## **Reorganization at OBC This Summer**

In order to give better service to students, several changes will be implemented at the College in the summer of 1991.

Commitment

#### Admissions Streamlined

After reviewing the previously separate recruitment and admissions procedures, the College decided to combine them, so students only have to work with one department from their initial contact until their arrival here. During the spring a newly formed Admissions' Committee revised the admissions process, and the application forms. Stephen Thomson, now has responsibility for the new department. Previously, the Registrar's office supervised the admissions program.

Student Financial Aid will also move from the Community Life Department to Admissions. With this streamlining students will receive acceptance sooner and the new student enrollment should increase.

#### Extension Ed Amalgamated

In another move, the Extension Education Department will be integrated with the

To facilitate service, all registration will be conducted out of one location -- the former day school office. Glenn Wyper continues as the OBC registrar and Shirley Brush, formerly registrar of Evening School, will become assistant registrar. Glenn will have responsibility for full-time students and Shirley for part-time students.

Dr. Robert Duez will no longer serve as vice-president, Extension Education. He will assume responsibilities for the Independent Study Program at the credit level and will return to the class room on a full-time basis.

#### Music Program Modified

The Bachelor of Sacred Music program is being suspended due to lack of funds. No new students will be accepted for the immediate future, unless they have advanced standing in music and can complete the program with the courses offered.

The College will continue to offer a three-year Music major in the Bachelor of Religious Education. Students may also choose a four-year joint major combining Church Music with a focus on Christian Education, Missions, Pastoral Studies or Youth Ministries.

Dr. Robert Duez is acting vice-president and academic dean, OBC. He happily looks forward to shifting his emphasis from administration to teaching.

he 1990-91 Athletic Program at Ontario Bible College culminated in the annual Sports Banquet on April 17 capping a fine season for all our events, teams and athletes.

For the first time in recent history, only full-time students were eligible to participate on our varsity teams. Although it significantly reduced the number of potential players and, perhaps, the calibre of our teams, the new standard reinforced our priority that all our athletes are first and foremost students. It also keeps OBC consistent with the standards of the other colleges and universities against whom we may compete.

The Ontario Christian College Athletic Conference (OCCAC) began its second season of operation with men and women's volleyball. OBC fielded two quality teams with the men's being one of the strongest in years. However, they could only manage a third place finish in the championships after finishing the regular season in second spot.

It was the women, with seven freshmen on the team, who surprised many observers and won their second consecutive OCCAC title. Led by veterans Leslie Snooks and Lesley Kelso, they defeated Redeemer College 3-1 in the championship match.

The basketball and hockey teams, after practising hard in the fall semester, kicked into full gear in January. Their dedication did not result in any more OCCAC championships, but the benefits were far greater elsewhere. Both basketball teams and the hockey team played against non-Christian teams and showed strong Christian character, even in defeat. In one game, the hockey team lost 13-3, but the opposition's coach remarked on the positive impact the OBC team had on his players.

Other highlights included Caroline Hoffmann winning the women's singles title at the OCCAC Badminton Championships; exciting new events in the intramural program such as beach (two-person teams) volleyball and softball; and the selection of Hugh Morrison and Caroline Hoffmann as Students-Athletes of the Year.

We are seeking sponsors for our teams to help defray costs and enable the teams to enter local leagues. Plans also include re-introducing the OBC golf tournament and promoting Alumni vs OBC volleyball, basketball and hockey games. The OCCAC will continue to grow and develop with Eastern Pentecostal Bible College entering the conference in 1991-92.

## A SHATTERED VISAGE: THE REAL FACE OF ATHEISM

Ravi Zacharias (Tennessee: Wolgemuth & Hyatt Publishers, Inc., 1990, 205 pp, \$12.95).

A Shattered Visage contrasts atheistic and theistic approaches to human existence. First the author examines the deficiencies of an atheistic world-view and then explores the merits of a theistic world-view.

Drawing upon varied illustrations from philosophy and literature, Ravi Zacharias, BTh '72, cogently challenges the atheistic perspective. He writes that the affirmation of the non-existence of God faces four hurdles which cannot be overcome:

- If there is no God, the question of origins has no explanation. No intelligent reason for morality can be established.
- If there is no God, no intelligent reason for morality can be established. On atheistic assumptions no basis for right or wrong behaviour can be espoused.

- If there is no God, there are no grounds for affirming the meaning-fulness of existence. The death of God and the death of meaning go hand in hand.
- If there is no God, all hope for existence beyond the grave is eliminated. The best atheism can offer is silence about human destiny or an argument for ultimate nothingness.

Having established his case, the author proceeds to present a positive case for a theistic base for existence, morality, meaning and hope. A very convincing apologetic is given for theism over atheism as being more cohesive intellectually and more meaningful existentially.

In this short volume, Ravi Zacharias has grappled with the great questions facing humankind. He argues his case in a compelling manner, reflecting a good blend of mental clarity and spiritual fervour. This volume is recommended for stretching your thinking and strengthening your faith.

# Special Needs Program First Grad

As OBC's first student to complete the Special Needs major run jointly with Humber College, Cheryl Mazurk found the program gave her a way to develop personally and professionally.

This April, she graduated with a Bachelor of Religious Education degree from OBC and completed the requirements for the Developmental Services Worker diploma from Humber.

Cheryl's desire to work with those who are developmentally delayed goes back a long way. Her mother Joan once babysat a little girl who was handicapped and her father David is now in



this field as Director of Christian Horizons in Bracebridge, ON.

In fact she originally came to OBC for a one-year Certificate intending to go elsewhere for D.S.W. studies. But a new program in this specialty meant that Cheryl could register in the first Special Needs class in 1988. Vito Mezzapelli started in that class too; he graduated with his BRE and is completing his D.S.W. internship.

In the preceding year, Beth Posterski, OBC co-ordinator for the Special Needs major, had acted on a request by Christian Horizons for a new program. Officials had said they liked to hire OBC students for their group homes because of their ministry perspective and compassion, but felt they needed

specialized training.

Drawing on the model of the cooperative program she had developed earlier with Seneca College in Early Childhood Studies, Beth worked out a program with Humber at its Etobicoke, ON, Lakeshore Campus.

After two years of study at OBC, upon recommendation of the College, students are accepted at Humber for their third year. In 1991, 10 OBC students will start at Humber and another 10 are expected to start in 1992. At Humber they will take selected D.S.W. courses during the fall and winter semesters in a module designed for OBC students.

Finally a practicum is scheduled for April through July. But Cheryl pushed to complete it by the end of April.

And on the Monday after graduation she was putting her training to work as an instructor in an adult development program.

Both OBC and Humber speak highly of the joint relationship. Cheryl said, "All the instructors were helpful." Seaton Lewin, Humber's co-ordinator of D.S.W., commented, "I think [the program] is working exceptionally well."

Taking a BRE enabled Cheryl to fulfil her personal desire to make her Christian beliefs concrete.

Dr. Tat-Kwan Wong and his identical twin Dr. Tat-Ying Wong are just two of a number of OTS students who make room in packed business and professional lives for graduate studies.

Tat-Kwan and Tat-Ying share a family

practice with two other physicians in Downsview, a residential area of Toronto. Another high priority for the brothers is contributing as part of a 15-person ministry team to help Grace Gospel (AGC) Church grow.

Last year they were among a group of 80 sent out by Chinese Gospel Church of Toronto to plant a Chinese AGC congregation in mid-town Toronto near Yonge Street and Eglinton Avenue. The church, which meets in a public school, has grown to between 110-120 mainly through evangelism.

The brothers started in the MTS program in 1987. Tat-Ying graduated in 1990 and is now working part-time on his MDiv. At this point Tat-Kwan, who is graduating this year, is not sure he wants to team up with his brother on that venture. He claims a few reservations about tackling Greek or Hebrew for an MDiv.

But he says, at OTS both he and his brother fulfilled their goals of getting to know God better, and of equipping themselves to serve the Lord effectively in their work and churches.

Combining family life, medical practice, studies, and ministry is "tough," says Tat-Kwan, but he asserts "You really get to experience God's provision and God's grace." Tat-Kwan recalled one example of God coming through for them: on one occasion around exams,

their practice slowed down for two weeks and they could prepare properly.

He particularly appreciates the practical nature of his program. His four counselling courses help in dealing with patients, and the Bible and theology courses have made both brothers better teachers, preachers and leaders.

Jim Tam, an assistant pastor with Chinese Gospel Church, describes the brothers as key leaders in Grace Church. Tat-Kwan, himself, credits Jim's effective leadership for guiding the Grace team. Jim graduated this year with his MDiv.

In spite of all his accomplishments, Tat-Kwan insists with genuine humility that "What has happened in my life is all of God's grace."

#### Dr. Stewart Boehmer

For 41 years Dr. Stewart L. Boehmer, past president of OBC and chancellor of OBC/OTS, gave distinguished service to the schools, making an outstanding contribution to the growth of the College in particular.

On Saturday May 18, 1991, at Toronto East General Hospital he went to be with the Lord. He leaves his wife Evelyn and two sons and daughters-in-law, Dr. Fred and Vida of Brandon, Fla., and Jim (a member of the OBC/OTS Corporation) and Faye of Unionville, ON. He is lovingly remembered by them, by his grandchildren, great-grandchildren and by his many friends.

The family asked Dr. McRae to speak at the private service held Tuesday, May 21. A public memorial was held May 23, at Calvary (AGC) Church, Toronto, which Dr. Boehmer pastored before coming to the College as president in 1963.

Prior to assuming the presidency he had served from 1950 – 1963 on the Advisory Council and Board of Governors of Toronto Bible College. During most of this period he also served on the Board of Governors of London College of Bible and Missions, London, ON. It was largely through his vision and initiative that the two colleges merged to form Ontario Bible College in 1968.

He was accepted unanimously as president of the new institution. After his resignation in 1974, the Board of Governors appointed him as the College's first chancellor and that of the Seminary when it was founded in 1976. As chancellor he officiated at many convocations and graduations, and continued to encourage staff, faculty and students.

Former faculty colleagues and students remember his warm-hearted nature and strong spiritual leader. A challenge he liked to give in chapel still rings true: "Let us not be recreant to our calling or to our task."

In introducing chapel speakers, he often said that there was no greater honour that could be bestowed than to call the person "a servant of the living Cod."

Dr. Stewart L. Boehmer was truly such a servant.
