Full-Time Enrollment Jumps

The Seminary had much for which to thank God this fall when enrollment figures showed significant growth from 398 in fall 1990 to 438 full and parttime credit students in fall 1991. With audit students and those who took summer courses only, the official enrollment is 497.

Dr. Ian Rennie, vice-president and academic dean of the Seminary, attributes the growth to having "many people who pray for us."

He also cites the highly respected faculty, the growing alumni who frequently act as good representatives, and increasingly attractive advertising as other factors in the increased enrollment. Another is the

building extension, which indicates a serious commitment to excellence in theological education.

The increase by 30 in the number of full-time students is particularly encouraging. Dr. Rennie says, "God seems to be calling many into full-time, public ministry, which would indicate that He is determined to bless and heal our land. If this is so, then we will be running to keep up with all the new things that God is doing."

OTS is one of the two largest seminaries in Canada.

College Enrollment Good

Full-time growth increased at the College by 30 students over last year. The total enrollment of full and part-time credit students stands at 534, up from 525 in 1990. This makes OBC the 14th largest Bible college in North America.

Stephen Thomson, director of enrollment services, attributes some of the growth to the increasingly personal service given to prospective students and the growing involvement of faculty and students with them.

And in the past year, the College has increased its visits to Christian high schools, churches, youth groups, and denominational conferences.

Dr. Rod Wilson, vice-president, academic and student affairs, says that in light of the fact that the role of Bible colleges is being reassessed in Christian circles, OBC can be encouraged by this growth. But, he added, at the same time we need to solidify our mission so "we hit the next century with a sense of clear direction."

To facilitate this, Rod Wilson says the College is developing strategies to improve how it hears churches, empowers faculty and staff, and equips students.

He added, "Ultimately I approach increased enrollment with a sense of thankfulness, but am continually aware of the challenges of a changing world."

OBC/OTS Adopts Student "Pregnancy Outside of Marriage" Policy

fter nearly two years of discussion by campus advisory and policy-making bodies, OBC has implemented a policy that will provide clear guidance to students and College personnel in instances where unmarried students become involved in pregnancy.

The heart of the policy reads: "College policy is open to supporting the student to continue on with his/her educational program at OBC in a spirit of ongoing co-operation and within a commitment by the student to adhere to biblical standards of moral conduct."

In other words, the College is ready to stand by its unmarried students during pregnancy provided the student commits to move forward in a spirit of co-operation and, within a clear agreement, to adhere to standards of conduct the College holds to be appropriate for Christian disciples.

The evolution of this policy received a special boost when James Dobson's Focus on the Family organization challenged Christian universities and colleges throughout North America to more adequately address this issue. The irony of the situation, as Dr. Dobson pointed out in a radio address, was that women at Christian schools were feeling pressured into abortions precisely because they were living in a Christian environment.

The too common testimony of some women students at Christian

schools was that, when they found they were pregnant, they knew they would not be welcomed by their families. They also believed their school would expel them. Under these pressures they opted to solve their "problem" by means of abortion.

The OBC student development staff had already been discussing this issue when Focus on the Family held a seminar on the topic at Calvin College in June 1990 for deans, presidents, counsellors and health care professionals from Christian schools.

As I listened to the sad stories from across North America, two messages were obvious. First, Christian colleges must be prepared to provide compassionate support for its unmarried pregnant students. Second, the sooner the issue was addressed, the better.

The OBC policy statement received the unanimous support of the student council, faculty and cabinet before it became policy.

With this kind of agreement on so important an issue this is not just one more policy in our *Community Life Guide*. It is another deep expression of a community committed to demonstrating professionalism, compassion and faithfulness as it addresses the most problematic issues of the '90s.

Foundation Being Established

At the 1991 annual meeting, acting president Bruce Gordon, announced the formation of a foundation to hold endowment funds for OBC/OTS. Establishing this foundation is one of the approaches taken recently to improve the institution's financial stability.

Income from the OBC/OTS foundation will fund a plan to provide growth and development and pay down the accumulated deficit. The foundation will be operative in 1992.

Securing the Future

Strengthening the finances of the institution was one of the areas of focus in the three-year plan that Bruce Gordon tabled in the Annual Report.

To manage expenditure internally, new controls are being implemented to track purchases. OBC/OTS also wants to expand the conference ministry to provide additional income and to increase public awareness of OBC/OTS.

Student Marketability

Providing students with needed skills is another concern. To keep current, Bruce Gordon says the schools and churches must work with each other to develop future leaders.

A number of possibilities have been suggested to broaden the College's programs. One is exploring affiliations with colleges and/or universities in new areas of study. The Early Childhood Studies and Special Needs Ministry programs, now offered in co- operation with community colleges, are very successful.

Another is a co-op program to give students practical experience.

Focus on Family Responds to "Pregnancy Outside of Marriage" Policy

OBC and OTS will stand by unmarried students involved in pregnancy when there is a commitment to adhere to biblical standards of moral conduct. Here, Focus on the Family, which expressed concern for such students at Christian schools, comments on the OBC and OTS policy.

From Geoff Still, President, Focus on the Family (Canada) Association

Love, acceptance and forgiveness are what each of us, as prodigals, has received from God, who loves, accepts and forgives.

But, there is another element needed in a statement of that nature. One of my commentaries, gives this description: "Forgiveness is part of a mutual relationship, the other part is the repentance of the offender. God does not forgive without repentance, nor is it required of mankind. The effect of forgiveness is to restore to its former state the relationship that was broken by sin.

Such a restoration requires the co-operation of both parties. There must be both a granting and acceptance of the forgiveness. Sincere, deep-felt sorrow for the wrong, which works repentance, is the condition of mind that insures the acceptance of the forgiveness. (2 Corinthians 7:10)"

I believe the OBC/OTS policy encompasses these biblical conditions and flowing from that, or leading to it, the love, acceptance and forgiveness of faculty and students evidenced is in the character of our Lord's actions throughout the New Testament. By such acts of mercy many lives may be redeemed and perhaps many others saved.

Dr. Freeland, pastor of Richview Baptist Church, Etobicoke, ON, has served on the Board for seven years and the Corporation for 16 years.

In considering the year ahead, Gordon Freeland said that the Board is called to demonstrate vulnerability and accountability in supporting the

commitment in his nine years as chair, an appointment that had followed three years as a Board member.

In a written tribute, Dr. William McRae said: We thank God for the vision, energy and integrity which Mr. Johnson brought to his office. Under his guidance our provincial charter was achieved, our by-laws revised, our Board redesigned, we became computerized and launched our major capital campaign for the Seminary expansion.

AFTER COMMUNISM

Post-Marxist Churches Recommend Action

A t the 1991 Budapest Global Summit, Christian leaders from post-Marxist countries called on the Western Church to work co-operatively in responding to the newly opened doors in Eastern Europe.

The Lausanne Committee on World Evangelization, chaired by Canadian Leighton Ford, sponsored the Summit to focus on evangelism in post-Marxist countries. It met September 1-7 in Budapest, Hungary.

More than 180 church leaders, observers and media representatives from 56 countries discussed issues with 22 evangelical church leaders from Eastern Europe, the Baltic Republics and some representatives from post-Marxist African countries. The Canadian delegates were Dr. Don Moore, executive director of Vision 2000, and Dr. John Vissers, professor of Theology, OTS.

Coping with Change

In their joint report, Moore and Vissers noted that because the political changes taking place in the former USSR are so radical, the outcome for the church cannot be readily predicted.

During the summit, Christians


from post-Marxist countries reported on the many tensions they face, among them:

- Uncertainty in judging accurately how safe it is to adjust lifestyles in the present climate of freedom.
- Growing rivalry between Orthodox and Protestant churches who once fought together for survival.
- Turmoil, as once suppressed ethnic differences come to the surface and as groups seek to establish their own identity.
- Economic pressure, as churches struggle for resources to help their people and to establish public worship facilities.
- The influence of Western materialism and lifestyle in the present
- People's spiritual hunger providing a prime opportunity for cults as well as for the gospel.

Respecting the Context

While Eastern leaders appreciate the rapid response of the Western church to the opportunities in their countries, they also requested caution.

Moore and Vissers say that Eastern Christians asked the West to "listen closely to the leaders in post-Marxist countries in order to most

effectively deploy personnel and resources." These leaders urged that evangelistic initiatives be well coordinated, so the short and longterm impact will be strong.

They added that a united front would serve as an important model for church leaders in these countries where co-operation is now "sorely missing since the collapse of the Marxist powers."

Church leaders from the former USSR recommended that funds once given for pastors be funnelled into other major needs such as building churches and improving lay leadership and Bible training. They believe their own people should support their pastors.

East/West twinning was another recommendation. Delegates saw such partnership between individual churches allowing for ongoing mutual ministry with a degree of accountability and a responsiveness to each others' needs.

Co-operating in Canada

John Vissers sees co-operation and unity "as an absolute necessity in post-Marxist Europe." He points out that the Lausanne movement is intended to provide an umbrella under which diverse evangelical groups can work together in the work of world evangelism.

Likewise, he says, Canadian churches and mission agencies must work together and utilize the expertise of eastern European Christians now living in Canada. He concludes that with this approach they can "make an effective contribution to ministry in this rapidly changing part of the world."

The 25-member team is divided into three branches with one ministering at Riverside Missionary Church, located on the eastern side of downtown Toronto, and the other at Quay's Community Church, at Harbourfront, on Toronto's waterfront.

The teams' ministry includes witnessing on the streets, visiting neighbourhoods door-to-door, work with children, and cleaning homes for those who can't.

The third group, Steadfast, a drama group headed by Kirk Bartha and Luanne Pyper, performs on Yonge Street.

Dwayne Cline, chair of the Evangelism committee says that students praise God for the expansion of the ministry and ask for prayer as team members work downtown each Friday night.







We had our own small mail disruption recently. Some of our friends received three copies of our fall President's letter because of a problem in a computer address program. We apologize and want to publicly thank those who wrote to let us know. We are working to correct the problem.

Financial Report

In presenting the Annual Report for 1991, Bruce Gordon said that OBC/OTS handles its resources well: "We have committed faculty doing more with less, as students who study at other [public] post-second-

ary educational institutions would acclaim."

In discussing the financial report, he pointed out that like counterparts at public institutions, we have been hit hard by the economy. He did report that the accumulated deficit of \$1.2 million is offset by some endowment funds. (The Annual Report is available upon request.)

Current Year

At the end of September, tuition and ancillary (book store, food services, etc) income was ahead of target.

Tuition provides 43 per cent of our operating income, ancillary and other, 27 per cent, and donations, 30 per cent. Donation income is steady, and administrators are monitoring it carefully.

Recent purchases made from the operating budget are improving student life. Providing two-way radios

This fall students in residence have safer irons, new ironing boards, and will soon have the worn out curtains replaced. They are also very pleased with changes to the hot water system over the summer. The flow has been regulated, and shower users no longer get scalded or frozen unawares.

Building Community Relations

Earlier this year, OTS reversed roles and agreed to serve on an advisory committee for a program being developed by a nearby community college.

This January, Seneca College will offer Introduction to Counselling, the first course in its Pastoral Services program. Jan Potz, BSM '74 and a former OBC faculty member, will be the instructor. She also has an MA in Counselling and counsels at the Institute for Family Living, Toronto.

Dr. Ian Rennie, OTS vice-president and academic dean, said that he and Lynn Smith, OTS dean of students, joined the advisory committee because OTS wanted to give something back to the community.

Teresa Riverso, Seneca program co-ordinator, explained that while this course is non-credit, it is hoped the program will develop to certificate status. It is designed for clergy, as well as social services and health care personnel working in pastoral care settings in hospices/hospitals, penal institutions and the community.

Inquiries had come from the community for a counselling course with a spiritual emphasis. Because Seneca serves a broad constituency, the course will look at needs of those working in different faith communities.

Ms. Riverso said that in turning to OTS, Seneca wanted input from an educational institution acknowledged as credible in pastoral counselling.

ESSENTIALS: A LIBERAL-EVANGELICAL DIALOGUE

David Edwards & John Stott (Hodder & Stoughton: Toronto, 1988, 354 pp, \$14.95).

John Stott is best known as an articulate biblical expositor at the head of the "English Invasion" that has brought many other evangelical Anglican clergy – J.I. Packer, Michael Green, David Watson, and others – across the Atlantic. What are likely less known are his solid theological skills and his deep involvement in the affairs of his native Church of England (C of E).

Because it continued for centuries as a national church as well as an Anglican church, it has forced evangelicals, liberals, and Anglo-Catholics within the "C of E" to co-exist, although often grudgingly, with each other for the past 150 years.

It is Stott's loyalty to the C of E as a whole, and his hope for it, that have obliged him to respond in Essentials to the invitation to a dialogue by David Edwards, a leading historian and liberal clergyman in the church.

With dialogues on the Scriptures, the cross, miracles, ethics, and "The Gospel for the World," this volume is a handy compendium of issues that separate moderate evangelicals from mainstream liberals. What is most impressive about the format is the combination of genuine friendship with hard theological debate.

What is most impressive about Stott [who is always in the position of responding to Edwards' "gunfire"] is his acknowledgement of Edwards' strong points, his unwillingness to get sidetracked from theology into theological politics, and his able defence of traditional Christian doctrines to which evangelicals adhere.

While some readers will find Stott too conservative [on the need for the word "inerrancy," for instance] and others will find him too liberal [e.g. on the possibility of the "annihilation of the wicked"], all will find both Stott and the book challenging and refreshing.

Puritan Collection Now Housed in Library

The OBC/OTS library has recently opened a rare book collection of over 200 volumes by Puritan writers. The collection was donated by Percival J. Baldwin's daughter and son-in-law, Audrey and Bruce Cossar of Stirling, Ontario, where Rev. Cossar is minister of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church.

The Percival J. Baldwin Puritan collection comprises 203 volumes published between 1625 – 1700, with a few works published after 1700. Among the most significant authors represented are James Durham, John Owen, and Samuel Rutherford.

A portion of this collection is listed in the *Short-Title Catalogue of [Rare] Books*, edited by Donald Wing of Yale University. This catalogue is considered by scholars to be one of the most important listings of rare books and is a standard reference work for those seeking to locate copies of items published between 1641 and 1700.

P. J. Baldwin (1907 – 1975) was a senior executive in a major Canadian manufacturing corporation located in Toronto. He was raised in the Calvinistic Baptist tradition and developed an early interest in theology and an insatiable appetite for the writings of the Puritans. During the years after World War II he assembled a 2,000 volume Puritan studies collection, including the original editions donated to OBC/OTS.

In an interview, library director Sandy Finlayson commented that the collection is significant because the Puritan tradition has a great deal to say to the modern church. The movement was marked by a deep awareness of who God is, what He has done for us and how we ought to live in light of this. He stated that "the church will be in a much stronger position to minister to people at the end of the 20th century if we take the time to listen to and learn from, these godly people of the 17th century."

The collection is housed in the Richardson Special Collections room of the J. William Horsey Library, which serves both the College and Seminary. Anyone wishing to use this collection for research purposes should contact library director Sandy Finlayson for an appointment.
