Facing the Challenge

THE RECESSION may "officially" be over but its impact continues to burden us. Like many other colleges, seminaries, and ministries, we are facing a cash flow crisis.

In spite of a number of controls implemented in the past two years, and success at increasing private support, we face a shortfall of \$600,000 (\$260,000 in private giving income; \$140,000 from ancillary operations [retail sales and conferences]; \$200,000 in property for additional financing costs).

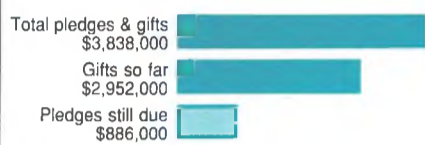
We share this news, not to pressure you, but because so many of you have been our partners and we want to keep you informed.

Let me summarize our position:

- The crisis is limited. It is strictly a cash-flow problem. Programs are current and effective, faculty and staff are committed to preparing students for ministry and life in the modern world, and students are committed to serving Jesus Christ.
- The cabinet and new budget committee are exercising strong leadership in identifying how we can carry out our mission within constraints.
- We have already taken strong measures in 1992/93, reducing expenditures by 5 per cent or \$300,000.
- For 1993/94, we are further

cutting expenditures by 5 per cent over that of 1992/93 for a total decrease of 10 per cent or \$500,000. We have to face some hard decisions in order to do this, but are committed to being cost effective and good stewards of our resources.

• We are being accountable before the Lord for our actions. We recognize that past deficit financing in the operating area has encumbered us. In 1993/94 we will use actual income from 1992/93 as a benchmark for planning the level of expenditures.

Building the Seminary was an exciting step in providing for growth. However, we still carry a burdensome bridge-financing loan with its interest costs. Pledge fulfilment is slower than anticipated as the economy has affected some friends who made pledges in good faith.

• On the positive side, support from private giving has increased by 20 per cent this year, thanks to the efforts of the Development department. We praise God for this! The department anticipates that private gifts will continue on this level. As well, it is pursuing new initiatives for 1993/94. (See Financial Aid — page 1)

• We have set up the OBC/OTS Foundation to assume responsibility for securing funding for operating costs, endowment, capital expenditures and student financial aid. A strong board is being assembled for a focused task; members will contribute their expertise and experience to planning for funding the vision. Their first meeting is scheduled for this spring. As well, the Development department will become part of the Foundation on June 1, 1993.

• The next few months will be difficult. Please stand with us in praying for wisdom and courage as we weather the recession's effects.

• The Lord has unlimited resources and we believe that out of the difficult, can come forth good.

• We do need your involvement. Many of you have been faithful prayer and financial partners and we would ask you to continue to support us and our students, particularly in the next three months.

With God's grace, your help, and fiscal responsibility on our part, we can meet our current objectives and build a strong base for the exciting opportunities ahead. ☩

Wesley Chair Added at Seminary

In its fall meeting, the Board of Governors approved the creation of the Wesley Chair at the Seminary. This is the Seminary's first denominational chair and will be filled with a part-time faculty appointment.

Four denominations are funding the joint Wesley program; they are the Free Methodist Church, the Salvation Army, the Brethren in Christ, and the Standard Church. Wesleyan bodies in Canada have been discussing the possible education of ministers in a Wesleyan context in Canada for a number of years.

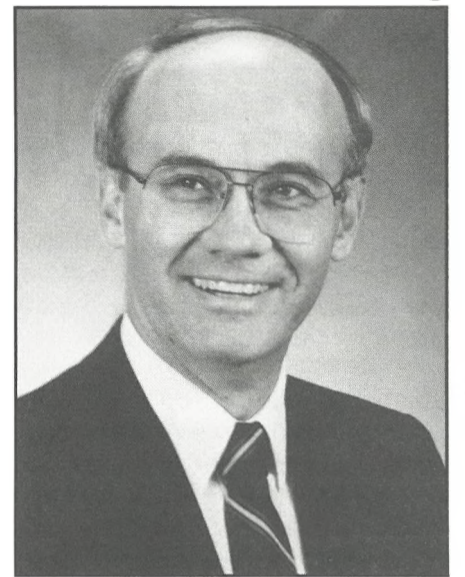
Last year in a similar venture, a number of Christian Brethren assemblies and individuals agreed to support the Chair of Expository Preaching at OTS.

Denominational chairs benefit both OTS and participating denominations. For OTS it diversifies and enriches the program while ensuring funding is in place to support the expansion.

Bishop Donald Bastian of the Free Methodist Church wrote in an open letter that such an approach would help the denominations involved. "I believe that if we train our future ministers more thoroughly in who we are and what we stand for this will increase the cohesion in our body as well as help our pastors all across Canada to share a common vision of our task."

Eight per cent of OTS students are of Wesleyan background.

The sponsoring denominations, in agreement with OTS, have asked Dr.



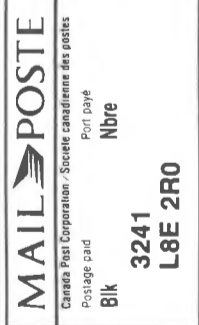
Dr. Victor Shepherd.

Victor Shepherd, pastor of Streetsville United Church, Mississauga, to take the post. Bishop Bastian's letter commends Dr. Shepherd as "one of the most articulate voices in [the United Church's] conservative ranks." "I have explored with him all aspects of Christian faith. He has spoken often of his roots in the Salvation Army... He is a born again man whose lifestyle reflects Methodist roots."

Next year Victor will teach Historical Theology in the fall, followed by a new course in the spring examining the major aspects of the theology of Wesley and then in May-June of 1994 another new course on the key works of Luther and major themes in his theology. The Seminary has offered a course in Wesleyan Heritage for a number of years. ☩

Rod also praised John Bell for his commitment and attention to detail in his past two years as acting chair. John is also the co-ordinator of the music major and of two certificate programs.

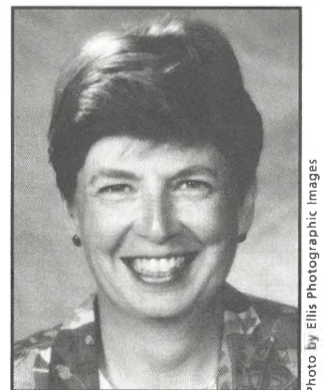

Come to Graduation

Dr. Haddon W. Robinson, Harold John Ockenga distinguished professor of Preaching, Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary, South Hamilton, MA, and immediate past president, Denver Seminary, will speak at the Seminary's graduation service, May 8, 1993.

After years at Bayview Glen Alliance Church, Thornhill, the Seminary now needs more room for guests and has moved the graduation service to 2200-seat Agincourt Pentecostal Church, Scarborough. Last year additional chairs had to be brought into Bayview's 1200-seat auditorium.

The College's graduation will be at Agincourt for the third year. Dr. Ken Badley, senior member in Philosophy of Education, Institute for Christian Studies, Toronto, and former associate professor of General Studies, Canadian Bible College, Regina, will be the guest speaker for the April 24, 1993 service.

Librarian Recovering

Public services librarian, Hugh Rendle, is recovering well from a bone marrow transplant done in November 1992 as part of his treatment for leukemia. Thank you for praying for Hugh and his family.

Blue Box

OBC/OTS students have shown their concern for the environment by initiating the recycling program Adopt Blue. Although an earlier version was put on hold last year, it was revitalized with blue boxes appearing throughout the campus in December. A group of approximately 20 students wishing to do their part as stewards of the earth have volunteered to "adopt" at least one blue box each, caring for its emptying and maintenance on a weekly basis. Collection includes glass, plastic, metal cans and

newspaper as well as fine paper.

The group hopes to increase the number of collection bins and involve more students to keep the program growing and strong.

On March 15, actor Roger Nelson, whose credits include Stratford, brought one of the church early evangelists to life in The Confessions of St. Patrick, when he performed in Hooper Chapel, at the College.

Celtic Tour

Dr. David Sherbino, professor of Pastoral Studies, OTS, and his wife Audrey, will host a summer tour, Our Celtic Heritage, July 16 - August 2, 1993, of Ireland, Wales and London.

Emphasis in Islamic Studies Added

Starting with the Summer Session in 1993 the first of four Islamic courses will be added to the OTS Missiology program in co-operation with the Zwemer Institute of Muslim Studies, CA. Rev. Irving Whitt, professor of Missiology, OTS, says this emphasis reflects a new focus in North American missiology on the Muslim World. As well, he sees this as another way the Seminary can help Canadian pastors to relate in our multicultural society. In Toronto alone there are now 200,000 Muslims. ☩

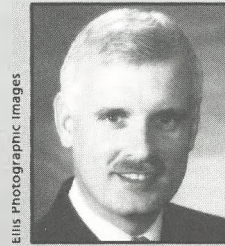

Heaven became more real to us this past Christmas. Oh, my wife Denise and I have always believed it's out there — somewhere. We had read Revelation 21 and 22 hundreds of times, and I even memorized it in Sunday school. We knew that Jesus Christ would return someday, but somehow it all seemed a little far away.

However, through sadness and pain, the reality of Heaven took on new meaning this Christmas — a closeness not experienced before — creating a new desire to be there.

On November 16, 1992, Denise's father was diagnosed with acute leukemia. Two treatments of chemotherapy failed to move this cancer into remission and on January 2, 1993 at 1:26 p.m., God took him Home.

Denise and I were there and through our tears we said, "What is it like for Dad at this moment? It must be wonderful."

Now, as the days pass we move through the process of grieving. It hurts. We question God's decision and struggle along with the others left behind.

Yet heaven is nearer. Someone who is very special to us is there, the first of our immediate family to arrive on its golden streets. God has increased our desire to be in the place He is preparing.

I understand better now that Heaven is a real place with real people and a real God. As His children we will see not only Dad, but our Redeemer amidst all the glory and splendour to which Revelation 21 and 22 cannot do justice in its description.

In the meantime, friends, we remain, still called to the Lord's service, called to be faithful. I pass on to you the advice my father-in-law gave us a week before his homegoing. Holding out one finger and then a second, he encouraged us saying, "Day by day, one by one." ☩

OTS Position

The OTS Alumni Association executive will focus in the next few months on rebuilding its membership. With the resignation in February of Ruth Copeland as president, two members remain on the executive, Captain Catherine Brown-Ratcliffe, MTS '83 and Peter Lam, MDiv '89. Catherine now co-pastors with her husband at Erin Mills Salvation Army Corps and Peter is associate pastor of North West Chinese Logos Baptist Church, Toronto.

Before a new president can be appointed, more work needs to be done on defining the roles of executive members. In the meantime, Catherine and Peter will work with Krysia Lear, and faculty advisor, Dr. Grant Gordon, will continue to be involved.

Peter has agreed to serve as a non-voting representative on the Board of Governors. ☩

Made in the Image of God

Understanding Women's Leadership in the Church

IN 1992, OTS dean of students, Lynn Smith, added a national and international perspective to her understanding of women's issues. Since coming to OTS in 1986, she has co-ordinated the Women in Ministry course in alternative years and has spoken at churches and conferences on women in the church, among other topics.

In June 1992 Lynn represented Canada on the Women's Commission and at the general assembly of the ninth World Evangelical Federation Conference in Manila, Philippines. With 300 delegates from 60 countries, she considered issues related to the theme Arise and Build. The Canadian delegation included Dr. John Vissers, OTS professor of Theology, who was on the Theological Commission.

Lynn found that in spite of cultural differences, the delegates from the 14 countries on the Women's Commission shared the same issues. She sums these up as "the need for education and an end to abuse and exploitation of women, both sexually and economically." In a written report she went on to say:

In order for this to happen, the voice of women needs to be heard at all levels of organization and the church is the place to begin and to model true humanity — the honouring of men and women alike as made in the image of

God — neither one made for the exploitation of the other — but equally called to the task of revealing God to a lost world.

If we see both men and women equipped by, and responsible to, their creator God for their specific calling, and if we see the task of the church to be a community that builds both men and women up in their area of giftedness, then many issues of dominance, exploitation, and abuse will disappear. And the church will regain its credibility in the world.

The delegates were divided into committees to design projects that would address the issues. The projects were:

- for the education of women as to their true identity as made in the image of God and their true responsibility as called to image God to the world;
- for the education of both men and women in the church regarding these issues;
- for the establishment of skills training to give women some economic independence so they can escape the oppression of poverty that results from abuse and exploitation.

EFC Consultation

At the end of October 1992 Lynn chaired plenary sessions at a Canadian event, the Evangelical Fellowship of Canada's Consultation on

Women and the Church. She also served as a member of the organizing committee.

One hundred and forty men and women from across Canada attended, hearing speakers and responding in round table sessions and at the closing meeting with the majority of participants favouring an egalitarian position. The steering committee is taking a summary report to EFC's general council meeting in April 1993.

Her Perspective

In an interview, Lynn thoughtfully explained her position. "If I'm empowering people, I'm freeing them to respond to the call of God upon their lives. If I'm empowering women, then I'm helping them to be as free as men are to respond to the call of God."

She clarified that she is not advocating power struggles or one person gaining power at the expense of

another. Rather she believes that everyone in the church will benefit when others are enabled to serve fully. She says, "Anything that separates functions into men's work and women's work divides the community. Functions should be based on giftedness rather than on gender."

Yet she holds hope for more opportunities for women as she sees people in all denominations exploring the questions. Lynn says that to have credibility in the community, the church must address how it is perceived to treat women. "It's not an issue that will quietly go away." She adds that while dealing with the concerns can lead to division or unity, the outcome really depends upon the way that the church handles the issue.

Empowering for Equity

Lynn uses education, encouragement and example (mentoring) to break down the three barriers she sees to women fully using their gifts. She comments on these obstacles:

- 1** Inaccurate theological beliefs. Many avoid exploring their old understandings of Scripture fearing that it could undermine the integrity of the Bible. Being at the Seminary, however, can help ease their concern. Lynn says that studying with others who hold the same high view of Scripture and yet have different beliefs on a range of topics helps diffuse anxiety.
- 2** Attitudes and beliefs that make women a subordinate class. She says, "In many ways our Christian culture has been influenced by the societal culture of power. Only when we are willing to give up power can we truly empower others." Lynn identifies Christ as the model for this approach and says that examining old theological beliefs brings openness to change attitudes.
- 3** Disempowering practices and systems that come out of the above attitudes and beliefs. Lynn comments that attitudes and ways of doing things must change at the same time. ☛

Pre-registration a Success

By December 14 nearly half the College's students had taken advantage of a new pre-registration process and signed up early for the spring semester. OBC registrar, Rev. Stephen Thomson, said that as a result of the 225 pre-registrations, the January registration day was "relatively tension-free."

Students had two incentives: getting an earlier choice of courses and a one per cent discount on tuition fees. Stephen says that continuing education students

were particularly pleased as the new policy meant that they could go right to class instead of having to wait in line to register on the first night.

The OBC registrar commented that while some "minor glitches" need to be smoothed out, the co-operative effort by his office, and that of Dr. Stephen Roy, the OTS registrar, and OBC/OTS comptroller, Bel Voegelin, has paid off. Both registrars are highly appreciative of the work done by the Comptroller

in designing a pre-payment process that enabled their plans for pre-registration to become a reality.

At the Seminary with the second semester starting January 25, pre-registration extended to January 15 with 185 pre-enrolling for courses. The registrars anticipate that next year even more students will be able to plan ahead so they can benefit from the plan. ☛

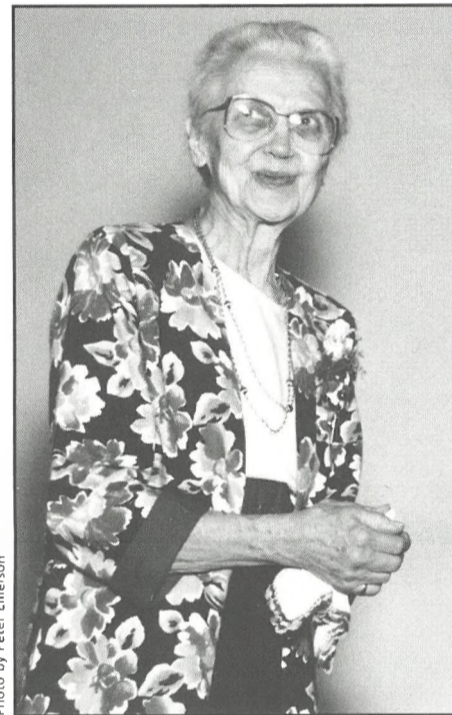

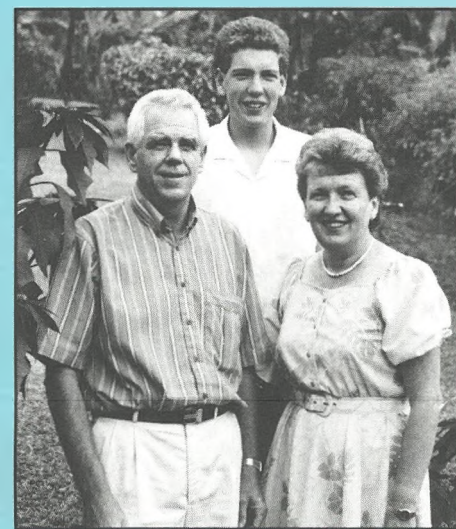

Double Jubilee

100 Years of Service to be Celebrated

It won't be a surprise party, but OBC will commemorate 100 years of preparing men and women for Christian service with a year-long celebration starting in May 1994.

The first event, a service of thanksgiving, will be held at Walmer Road Baptist Church, the home church of Dr. Elmore Harris, first president of the College. This celebration of God's goodness will include communion and is scheduled for Saturday, May 14, the actual date on which the founders of Toronto Bible Training School first met in 1894.

Throughout the year, dinners, an outdoor party, and other events are planned.

As well as arranging special functions, the Centennial Steering Committee plans to incorporate annual events such as the missions' conference and Alumni Homecoming into the festivities. The year will

close with the 1995 graduation services in April.

Laurine Schmelzle, chair of the Committee, says "I am looking forward to our centennial year as we rejoice in God's providential care." Laurine is also secretary of the Board of Governor and a grad of '67. Also serving are Mary Ann Buffam, director of Development, John Franklin, chair of the Department of General Arts, Krysia Lear, director of Communications and Alumni Relations, and Dr. Rod Wilson, vice-president.

Book Going Ahead

As announced, the College has commissioned author Alwyn Austin to write a history, and research started this January. In co-operation with Paul Friesen, the OBC history professor, and library director, Sandy Finlayson, Alwyn developed a research course that allows five

of persons;" concepts such as "unpardonable sin," inspiration; literary forms such as allegory, Hebrew poetry; familiar terms in Hebrew, Greek and Latin such as *nunc dimittis*.

Some features that caught my eye include: the endorsements by writers Robertson Davies and John Updike and literary critic Frank Kermode; the international roster of contributors from universities, colleges, and Bible colleges; the editorial board of advisors including F.F. Bruce; the bibliographies including A Checklist of Biblical Commentaries Available to English Authors; the biblical text used - The Authorized King James Version because it has been "the favourite text of the clear majority of post-Renaissance English authors"; and the refreshing use of inclusive language.

This reference book will also help readers well acquainted with the biblical text to appreciate its concepts in new ways. It also reminds us of the larger context of the academy as we pursue biblical and theological studies. Perhaps most important, it can awaken those with a narrow focus. While many modern readers may be ignorant of Scripture, which we hold as dear and sacred, some of us may be equally ignorant of the world of literature — which is the expression of our cultural inheritance and tradition and which informs the way we think and believe as much as the Bible does. Perhaps Jeffrey's greatest contribution with *The Dictionary of Biblical Tradition in English Literature* could be bringing our two worlds — the faith community and the unbelieving world — into significant dialogue.

A DICTIONARY OF BIBLICAL TRADITION IN ENGLISH LITERATURE

David Lyle Jeffrey, general editor (Eerdmans: Grand Rapids, 1992, 960 pp, \$103.95).

In the introduction of his book *The Great Code*, Northrop Frye wryly queries about the Bible: "Why does this huge, sprawling, tactless book sit there inscrutably in the middle of our cultural heritage... frustrating all our efforts to walk around it?" While David Jeffrey, in his *A Dictionary of Biblical Tradition in Literature* (The DBTEL), does not deal with this philosophical question, he does help the modern reader walk through the Bible instead of around it.

David Jeffrey, professor of English literature at the University of Ottawa and author of several books including *The Law of Love: English Spirituality in the Age of Wycliff* and *A Burning and Shining Light: English Spirituality in the Age of Wesley* has been working on this impressive reference work for 15 years. While there were more than 160 contributors, Jeffrey researched and wrote about 40 per cent of the dictionary himself. In December 1992, Jeffrey introduced the book to the OBC faculty. His warmth and enthusiasm for biblical scholarship were as appealing as his obvious expertise in his field.

With almost 1000 pages and nearly 800 encyclopedia articles, The DBTEL is intended for students, academics, and general readers of English literature who are basically biblically illiterate. The work is designed to help readers identify biblical allusions, names, and quotations embedded in literary texts all the way from Chaucer to 20th century authors such as Margaret Laurence. Readers will be both amazed and convinced of the pervasive influence of Scripture on our literature and alerted to the need of studying the biblical text itself to fully understand what they are reading.

The entries are varied: proper names of people and places such as Raphael, Hagar, Jericho; allusions such as "vale of tears," "no respecter

The first stop is Hong Kong where Dr. McRae will visit the China Graduate School of Theology in regards to our Chinese Ministries program. During this two-day visit, arranged by Dr. Milton Wan, head of the program at OTS, Dr. McRae also plans to meet pastors, alumni and prospective students.

Then it's off to Seoul, Korea, for a week's visit organized by Dr. Tom Hwang (MDiv '88), a member of the Board of Governors and director of Foreign Missions, Torch Center for Evangelism and Missions, Korea. There, Dr. McRae will address approximately 2,000 delegates from all over Korea at a Presbyterian pastors conference. Again he will
