journey. It was for this reason that we gathered together on Saturday evening, May 14, for a service of worship and thanksgiving.

About two hundred and fifty alumni and friends were present at the service held at Walmer Road Baptist Church, just a block from the old Spadina campus. The date and location for the service were chosen because it was Elmore Harris, the pastor of Walmer Road Baptist Church who brought together a group of twelve, including clergy

and members of the business community, on that same evening in 1894. Out of that meeting came the commitment to establish Toronto Bible Training School which began classes in September of that same year. The worship service was centered around the theme of thanksgiving to God for His faithfulness. Staff, Faculty, Board Members and Alumni took part in the service. Three alumni, Robert Cousins ('80), Laurine Schmelzle ('67) and Reverend William Tyler ('36), each spoke of memories of College life and of the shaping influence of those years in their personal lives.

The music included a number of familiar hymns as well as the less familiar college hymn, "Help Us, O Lord the God of our Salvation", first used as far

back as 1914 for the twentieth anniversary. The singing was well supported by an ensemble of 10 singers and the College Trio under the leadership of faculty member Elizabeth Davey and Sharon Bell as organist. OBC Vice-President, Rod Wilson, gave a brief meditation drawing our attention to the need to acknowledge our past failures as well as successes. We were reminded

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



President Bruce Gordon

"I believe that God uses men and women like you to accomplish His purposes on this campus." ne of the richest words in the Old Testament is the Hebrew word "checed." It is translated "mercy", "lovingkindness", "great love", etc. Checed speaks to us of a lovingly faithful, loyal God, who is able and worthy of our trust.

As Denise and I look back over the three and a half years we have been at OBC/OTS, the word "checed" has become real to us. Our needs have been met, perhaps not in accordance with our plans, but with God's. We have found that He really is loyal to our trust.

The year 1993/94 has been the first year in the implementation plan of our financial restructuring plan. It has been a time of testing, trying and waiting as we went with an Operating Budget which projected an improvement in our overall financial picture of more than \$1,000,000. It also aggressively projected that the efforts of a new Foundation Board would raise donations of \$1,100,000 towards the Budget.

Our year-end of May 31st is now over and God's provision and faithfulness has been felt on our campus. The objective of balancing our budget within our three funds (Operating, Property and Restricted) has been accomplished and \$1,103,000 in donations, exceeding the \$1,100,000 budget, has been raised.

It is these tough experiences which strengthen our belief. As you, our partners, read these words, I suspect

that some of you are just hanging on. Your situation appears hopeless and the word "trust" is fading off the pages of your memory. Friends, read Psalm 89 and meditate on the word "lovingkindness" in verse one. We serve a faithful Redeemer and His loyalty surpasses all.

I believe in a God who delights in rescue. I believe in the faces of our students here on campus. I believe in a divine master financial strategist, and I believe that God uses men and women like you to accomplish His purposes on this campus.

Is it easy? No. Is it fun? Not really... not as the world defines fun. Is it hard work? Very much so. Does it pay dividends? More than you and I will ever know, and we will have an eternity to find out.

graduation. The service began with "Praise My Soul the King of Heaven", not just because it is a tradition but because this hymn continues to express the heartbeat

of the community at the end of an academic year.

The OBC "trio-in-residence" provided the music with an arrangement of "Guide Me O Thou Great Jehovah", "El Shaddai", and "He Watching Over Israel Slumbers Not Nor Sleeps". Vice-president, Dr. Rod Wilson, reminded the graduates that an understanding of God as the guide, as the one who is the Lord God Almighty and as the one who never sleeps, will provide confidence for the future.

Two graduating students spoke of the impact of OBC

on their lives: Shelly Beal was influenced by the blend of the academic, personal and spiritual components of the College, while Nestor Medina was thankful to God for the way he had been led from his homeland in Guatemala to Canada and to OBC.

As well as a time of celebration this was a time of anticipation. Of the 69 graduates, 27 of them plan to move on to further education, 28 plan to move into ministry positions, while 8 anticipate some sort of secular employment (the remaining group are unclear at the present time). Please pray for these women and men as they move through this time of transition.



As well, some are pursuing further education for specialized ministries and some are planning to be more active and better equipped lay workers in their churches.

We ask that you will pray with us that they will make a significant impact for the Kingdom wherever God calls them to minister.

he OBC/OTS Foundation hosted the first President's Circle Luncheon on May 26 at the Granite Club in Toronto. There were 180 people in attendance, including faculty and administrators of both schools, church and para church leaders, President's Circle members and their invited guests. Dr. David McKenna of Asbury Theological Seminary in Kentucky was the guest speaker.

The President's Circle was established this past year

(Fall, 1993) to help build a stable financial base for the annual operating fund for the college and seminary. There are currently 214 members of the President's Circle, donors who give \$1000 or more each year, and the Foundation wants to continue building the membership of this significant group of supporters.

The purpose of the luncheon was to recognize and thank the members of The President's Circle for their generous support. Both

President Bruce Gordon and Foundation Chair Geoffrey Moore explained the commitment and mandate of the OBC/OTS Foundation to provide financial leadership for the institutions. As part of their presentation they introduced the guests to the Foundation's new brochure, "A Vision for the Next Century."

JOHN WESLEY SEMINARY FOUNDATION

"Canadian Free Methodists have a remarkable record of supporting their students at OTS"

On Monday, April 18, OTS was visited by a team of four members from the John Wesley Seminary Foundation which oversees graduate-level theological education for the Free Methodist Church in the United States. The team consisted of Bishop Gerald Bates and Dr. Bruce Kline from the denominational headquarters in Indianapolis, Indiana, Dr. Wayne McCown from Roberts Weslevan College in Rochester, New York and Mr. Guy Delamarter from Oregon.

They met with President Gordon and Dean Rennie, attended chapel, examined the library, sat in on a class conducted by Dr. Victor Shepherd of the Chair of Wesley Studies, interviewed the registrar and dean of students, and had lunch with the Free Methodist students studying at OTS. The outcome of the visit is that the J.W.S.F. is recommending to the Commission of Christian Education of the Free Methodist Church in the US that OTS be an accredited seminary of the

denomination, and that financial aid be given to American Free Methodists students attending OTS. Canadian Free Methodists have a remarkable record of supporting their students at OTS, and now students, particularly from the northeastern section of the States, will be able to receive similarly generous funding while at OTS. This further cements the ties between the Seminary and Free Methodism, and gives an important entree into the American student world.


FACULTY NEWS



DR. BETH POSTERSKI

Elizabeth (Beth) Posterski has successfully defended her dissertation and completed the requirements for her Doctor of Education from the University of Toronto (OISE). The degree will be conferred at Convocation ceremonies in November. Her thesis, "The World's Children in Toronto Day Care: Portraits of Four Child Day Care Centres," looks at the challenge of providing child care and basic English language instruction to Toronto's ethnically diverse population.

Posterski is Chair of OBC's Ministry Studies department. During her nine years of teaching in the department she has been responsible for developing and coordinating two joint programs with community colleges: Early Childhood Studies (with Seneca College) and Special Needs (with Humber College). Posterski's thesis has widened her lense, already focused on children, to include multicultural issues.



DR. IRVING WHITT

Irving Whitt, professor of Missions at OTS for the last three years, received his Doctor of Missiology (D.Miss.) at the June graduation of the School of World Mission at Fuller Theological Seminary, Pasadena, California, which is arguably the leading centre of mission study in North America. Whitt served for some years in missionary service in Kenya, East Africa, and in his thesis has examined the development of missionary principles and practice by the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada. The title is "Developing a Pentecostal Missiology in the Canadian Context: 1867-1944".

The School of World Mission recognized Whitt's ability in handling some significant aspects in the historical development of the Christian Movement by offering him the SWM History Award. His dissertation has already generated interest by those within the PAOC. Whitt has made a great contribution already to OTS and now the expectation is that he will be an increasing help to missionary involvement in the Canadian churches and overseas.



DR. VICTOR SHEPHERD

Victor A. Shepherd, who occupies the Chair of Wesley Studies, OTS, is soon to publish his fifth book, *Seasons of Grace: From Wilderness to Wonder* (Creative Bound, 200pp., \$17.95). It follows his most recent *So Great a Cloud of Witnesses* (forward by Dr. Ian Rennie), a book of 25 profiles of Christian "Greats," as originally published in Fellowship Magazine, of which Dr. Shepherd is an editorial director. Seasons takes the reader through some of the gyrations of faith and life with its searing pains and soaring joys. It journeys through the seasons from "wilderness," that place of angst and turmoil, to one of "wonder" – God inspired awe and contentment. It gives a whole new perspective and appreciation for one's wilderness as not something to "escape," but rather a place to seek out and even savour – a place where God speaks. Biblically, Seasons of Grace parallels the Christian's maturing in years, yearning and usefulness: Fall (Redemption) - God's saving grace (Eph. 2:5,8); Winter (Deepening) -Growing in grace (2 Pet. 3:18); Spring (Awakening) -Abounding in grace (Rom. 5:20); and Summer (Usefulness) - Serving acceptably in grace (Heb. 12:28) Seasons of Grace will be available in the OBC/OTS

MUSC 0368 TBA Church Music Leadership

Study of the music program of the local church and of effective ways of administering this program. Subjects covered will include understanding worship, understanding music, music ministry, organization and administration, special productions, balancing music styles, congregational singing, praise bands, graded choir programs, multiple staff relations, sound systems, instruments and technology. Taught by guest lecturers.

SOSC 0351 T. Quek Introduction to Psychology

This survey course serves as a basic introduction to psychology. Topics covered include: the methodology of psychology, biological and perceptual processes, learning and cognition, emotion and motivation, personality and individual differences, behaviour disorder and therapy, social psychology, and integration of psychology and theology.

BIBL 0205* S. Thompson Gospel of John: That You May Believe

The purpose, structure and message of this Gospel will be examined with a special focus on its distinctive contribution to our understanding of Jesus.

CHED 0302 R. Dirks Marriage and the Family

This course will provide a study of Christian marriage and family life in accord with biblical principles and the relevant findings in the social sciences. Topics to be included: friendship, marriage preparation, communication, marital and family roles, marriage enrichment, a Christian view of sexuality, the ethics of family planning.

TUESDAY 7:00 - 9:50 PM

CHED 2000 (1 credit) F. Mackenzie **The Abused Person** An introduction to the types of abuse prevalent in society today. An overview of child sexual and physical abuse, abuse of the handicapped (both in residential settings and in the home) and elder abuse. A practical study of the treatment and prevention of abuse, recognizing abuse indicators and laws relating to abuse.

CHED 0215 N. Hunter Acting Out 1

A rigorous and practical exploration of theatre by the church, in the church and for the church. Course participants discover basic theatrical principles and techniques through the study, rehearsal and performance of a range of material.

BIBL 0101 R. Hebert Understanding the Old Testament 1 (Sec. 1)

A survey of the Pentateuch, Israelite history until the end of the united monarchy, and books of wisdom and poetry. Developing redemptive history is set against the background of Old Testament times.

LITR 0171 E. Davey Introduction to English Literature

An introductory course designed for the first year student unfamiliar with literary studies. Particular attention will be given to the reading process itself as we explore current theories in approaching a text. We will read in various genres – poetry, drama, essay, novel, and short story – as key figures through history beginning with Chaucer are introduced.

HIST 0104 P. Priesen History of Christianity: An Introduction (Sec. 1)

An introduction (Sec. 1) By lectures, seminars and reading, this course introduces students to an interdisciplinary evaluation of the history of Christianity through periods (e.g. early, medieval) and themes (e.g. Reformation, capitalism) with a focus on discussing a selection of documents form the 1st to 20th centuries.

WEDNESDAY 7:00 - 9:50 PM

LANG 0111 M. Ascough Introduction to College Writing

An introductory course in researching and writing college papers. Attention will be given to these, organizational methods, outlining and supporting materials, and library research. Students will have opportunity to write short papers to apply skills and methods discussed.

BIBL 0103 S. Thompson Understanding the New Testament 1 (Sec. 1)

An introductory study of the four Gospels with a particular focus on background, content and methods of studying Gospel literature. An emphasis will be placed on Luke's gospel.

RLGS 0321 R. Henton Christianity and Science A basic exploration of the relationships between science and the Christian faith which will include both philosophic issues as well as concrete examples of apparent tensions. An overview of both traditional and contemporary understandings of the scientific method and epistemology will provide

the framework for examining specific problem areas.

INTC 0201

Cultural Anthropology A study of enculturation of the young: norms, institutions and the maintenance of societal behavior patterns. Also, there will be a careful consideration of kinship, roles and status, social groups, the production and distribution of goods and services and the development of "cross-cultural" attitudes. Non-intercultural students may select this subject as an option in general arts. Also SOSC 0201.

THEO 0221

Theological Studies 1 This is the first part of a survey of Christian doctrine. Four major aspects of Christian truth will be considered in this course: (1) the foundational doctrine of Scripture, its inspiration and authority, (2) the doctrine of God, including God's attributes and Trinity, (3) the person and work of Christ, and (4) the person and work of the Holy Spirit.

CHED 0305 Educational History and Philosophy

This course includes an analysis of biblical, historical and philosophical foundations of Christian education issuing in a personal philosophy of education.

BIBL 0305

Ephesians and Colossians: The Pre-eminent Christ

This course will include an analysis of the letters in the light of their historical, cultural and religious setting in Asia Minor, an exposition of their message, and an application of their teaching to contemporary life.


