The school's mission statement redefines this leadership role by committing to educate and equip Christians to serve the world with passion for Jesus Christ.

Being a Christian leader in the midst of today's rapidly declining morality isn't

easy. People are their own self-sufficient gods Textbooks explain everything rationally and logically. Democratic laws give some too many rights and others less than an endangered species. These are just some of the challenges leaders have to overcome.

OBC/OTS is determined to make a difference. It Drs. Ford and Stiller at the recent is preparing servant leaders to ensure Christians

have a strong voice and influence in the world. With this in mind, the Board of Governors asked Brian C. Stiller to be the new president of the school. His inauguration on October 20 formally marked a time of new growth.

presidential inauguration.

"As we look to the future, I realize the schools only serve well if we all

participate," said Stiller during his responsive speech at The Peoples Church ceremony. "I have a fairly simple understanding of leadership. It is this: to describe what is and to describe what will be."

He also reminded the audience of the essence of good leadership.

"The ingredients required are prayer, outstanding scholarship, compassion for those lost and broken, joy in Jesus, diligence in moral faithfulness and a deep

commitment to a relationship with Christ."

International lecturer and author Leighton Ford was guest speaker at the inauguration and fittingly reflected on "Transforming Leadership: A Challenge for the New Millennium."

Ford posed five probing questions to the new president and the audience in relation to ministry.

"What men are guiding you? Choose men who

will lead like Jesus. What ambition drives you? Seek a Godly ambition. What vision focuses you? Cultivate the ability to see the unseen. What passion moves you? Take time to let your heart feel but move the heart of God. What faith enables you? Step out boldly in the name of our sovereign God."

Prior to inducting Stiller officially as president, Board of Governors Chairman

Archie McLean quoted well-known Christian author Oswald Saunders during a speech, which summed up the challenges of today's churches.

"We today are facing an acute crisis in leadership. The church has not escaped this dearth of authoritative leadership. Her voice, which once sounded a clarion call of hope to the beleaguered humanity, is now strangely muted and her influence in

the world community has become minimal. The salt has lost its savor and the light its radiance."

Michael Cassidy, founder and team leader of African Enterprise and international conciliator, addressed the leadership crisis when he was on campus November 6, delivering the first annual Samuel Bernardo lecture series. The late Bernardo, a philanthropist who saw the growing need for quality leadership in institutions and organizations, would have appreciated Cassidy's dissertation on "A Leadership Led by God."

"Hitler was an effective leader. Stalin was an effective leader. So we start to see that there is more to all of this than people just being capable," Cassidy told the audience. "The best leaders surrender personal ambitions to the Lord. They

City Council Drops Parking Lot Bombshell on School

ice president of finance Winston Ling received a major shock several months ago. North York city council sent a letter informing him that the school had missed a final mandatory date for paving its parking lot as part of the original seminary expansion project. A bigger surprise was that deadlines had been missed three times previously and there were no more clemencies left.

"We weren't aware that there was such an obligation," said Ling. "Otherwise, we would have certainly addressed the situation from the beginning." Ling discovered that neighbors had been promised for more than five years that something would be done about the giant cloud of dust that would cover their windows and walls during windstorms blowing across the OBC/OTS parking lot. They waited for an extra year beyond the promised completion date and then filed a complaint with the city.

"I don't blame them," said Ling. "I think we are showing a very poor witness for the Lord in this situation."

Records indicate that poor finances have made it virtually impossible to complete the \$400,000 project when planned. During the past year, the school had made minor repairs to improve the condition of the lot, with plans to pave it when finances were better. Then the unexpected letter came and three senior managers met with the city to see if the project could be extended another year. The city declined to do so without a detailed plan from the school.


Many who have heard of the problem are glad that the parking lot issue will finally be addressed. Its condition has been a joke among students for some years. Larry Willard, vice president of development, recalled the days when he was doing parttime studies at the school.

"I was driving into the school yard on a rainy day in September during my first week here. As I turned into the parking lot, I felt like I had been instantly transported back in time to a scene from a WWI 'no man's land' buffer zone. There were hundreds of various sized craters all over the road filled with water and a soupy mud that extended over the entire surface of the road. My car would literally disappear for moments in one of the holes, only to reappear covered in mud from one end to the other."


That year Willard remembered changing his shocks and having his front end realign ed. "I kept wondering how the school could allow their image to be so tarnished," he added. Currently, the school is meeting with a number of donors asking for help.

"Right now, we need a lot of prayer from our partners for wisdom on how to handle this bombshell," said Willard. "This is one issue that we just can't ignore. The city has a clock that's ticking away and they have said they will take legal action if we don't respond soon."

Willard's closing comment was, "Please pray for our school."



Tax Breaks for Donors

ew and increased donation limits were introduced on March 6, by finance minister Paul Martin. The 1996-97 federal budget allows

donors to give more to charities in a tax effective method in order to further assist the important work of these organizations. The new donation rules are: taxable capital gain resulting from the donation. This increases the donation limit to 100% (as only 75% of the capital gain is taxable).

Most people are unaware that the substantial changes made in the tax laws give supporters of OBC/OTS a tremendous tax advantage when they donate to our school

- ▶ the general annual limit on charitable donations as a percentage of net income is increased from 20% to 50%.
- ▶ the limit on gifts by individuals in the year of death and the preceding year (including bequests or legacies in the deceased's will) is raised from 20% to 100% of net income.
- ▶ with gifts of property that have a capital gain, the limit of 50% of net income is increased by 50% of the

These modifications substantially increase the tax advantages of giving, both while you are alive and as part of an overall estate plan. OBC/OTS is a charity that can benefit from these improved donation rules.

Dear Friends,

Just a few weeks ago, 1,000 pastors and Christian leaders gathered in Toronto for World Shapers '96, a national conference on leadership. It was a remarkable moment in the history of the evangelical community in Canada as the meeting was the largest of its kind ever in the country. Eclipsing the number of attendees, however, the real significance of this event was the spirit of cooperation that reigned. Absent was competition, grandstanding and polarization on issues.

The evangelical community has many denominations, independent movements, agencies, parachurch groups, and learning centers, and I praise God for their initiative and burning passion for Christ-centered ministry. But for the Gospel to have an impact on our nation, the people of God need to be united in their love for each other. Such love is more than words on paper or occasional verbal confessions. Such love is rooted in how we go about doing our daily ministry.

In our love for each other, we are united in Christ. This unity doesn't mean that we all become the same or that we all merge—for there is real value in a variety of expressions and initiatives. What it does mean is that our differences don't divide us. What it means is that we share our resources and learn from each other's experiences, whether that be ministering to people with special needs, to people with particular hurts, or other outreach initiatives.

Here at Ontario Bible College and Ontario Theological Seminary, we want to foster a spirit of cooperation and a strategy for working with other schools. The challenge of preparing people for Christian leadership is so enormous that it is not unity in Him.

World Shapers '96 was evidence of the growing awareness among our churches and leadership that the enemy is not each other. The breaking down of walls of secular ideologies and the raising of a standard of truth in our cultures calls for a new vision of being strong, together in Christ.

A Commitment to Excellence

OBC's new English language and writing program was implemented in September and is going strong. "We are getting the results we anticipated," said director Elizabeth Davey. All new OBC students (full and part-time) were tested in their writing and analytical English skills during registration week and were placed in one of three streams: orientation seminars, an introduction to college essay writing and English for academic purposes. The introduction courses have a maximum of 20 students in the classes. For the EAP sessions, there are seven well-qualified tutors (ranging from Ph.D. students to teachers in the public adult education system). Each tutor works with five students for 10 weeks a term. Lessons are taught in the newly established writing and language center. This program is one more indication of the college's commitment to integral excellence for the 21st century.

Sanctifying the Internet

If you are among those who believe that the Internet is decadent, worldly and void of any redeeming value for a Bible college and seminary, then you need to read on, because here at OBC/OTS, we plan to sanctify the Internet for God's use.

Most of us are aware that new tools and technology, similar to the Internet, are revolutionizing the communication world. The Internet, computerized distance education, multimedia educational devices and classroom video conferencing, to name a few, are now universally employed with incredible benefits.

However, some in the Christian community still look on these tools with fear, concern, suspicion or all of the above. As Christians, we may not like everything about the content in some of the new technology but there is much to be gained if we employ it properly. Here at the school, we would like to add a little salt and light to the technology and sanctify it for Kingdom use.

President Brian Stiller has a fascinating term for this new technology. He calls it "the new Roman roads." When

Jesus came to earth and sent out the apostles to spread the Good News of the Kingdom, we believe it was no accident that only a few years before, the Romans had revolutionized the western world with new technology, which allowed them to build advanced roads and

bridges to make transportation possible anywhere in the empire.

The new technology of their day became available at "just the right time" to allow the Gospel to go out with unprecedented speed and the harvest was brought in as Jesus had commanded. Today, we can't imagine crossing Canada on land without roads, rails,

bridges or cars. The advantages and necessity of such technology are taken for granted.

Although Christians did not invent that new technology back then, they used it wisely for the benefit of the Kingdom and the harvest. We believe today's technology offers the same advantages to the Kingdom

as the Roman roads did 2,000 years ago. As we announced several months ago, the school has already installed a number of computers and networks whose efficiency and cost are proven daily. We now need to add new tools to simplify communication and to make it inexpensive to reach the ends of the earth with our current training programs. At the college and seminary, we are always looking for ways to reduce the cost of educating our students. And by making training more convenient, new opportunities are created for those who otherwise may not be able to take part.

At OBC/OTS, we are committed to making this giant leap into the next mil-

lennium using the newest communication technology and methodology. This will help prepare students, pastors, missionaries and leaders for ministry. The school has just announced a fundraising

campaign called *Harvest '96*, which will support our desire to acquire these great tools that will make our courses and materials available in Toronto, Timmons and Timbuktu.

We are also preparing to offer Internet access on the World Wide Web to pastors, missionaries, church leaders and our supporters. This would make gathering information and communication with other Christian colleges, parachurch organizations, professors or family and friends anywhere in the world possible.

Presently, we are supplying courses and resource materials on-line to those in locations where they otherwise could not get access to training. A missionary in Africa, a pastor in James Bay, church groups any-

where, students with disabilities or anyone not able to attend classes on campus could then log on to our network and be equipped for service at any hour of the day or night. Three on-line distance courses are ready to be offered to laborers of the harvest. We only need the funds to finish the job.

We are building a fully equipped student computer lab with on-line access to Biblical research materials at any library in the world, whether it be the latest information on the Dead Sea Scrolls in Jerusalem or new manuscripts in Rome. We no longer have to buy copies of every major book or study published, which becomes costly. Finally, we plan to set up satellite campuses throughout Ontario, including the Toronto area, using video conferencing. This will make courses convenient and inexpensive for students. But to do this, we need to upgrade our own classrooms with multimedia equipment that interface with the Internet, CD-Rom or a VCR technology.

These tools are an important component of our strategic plan, and the Lord has made them available "at just the right time" to help us equip pastors, missionaries and leaders of our churches and the entire Christian community to bring in the harvest.



A Mother's Prayers

BC/OTS' convocation on September 11, 1996, was special for Ruby Barnes Wilkinson in more ways than one. Not only was her son John installed as OBC's new VP and academic dean, but the event also signified her 60th graduation anniversary from Toronto Bible College (now OBC). And as she looks back on her college days after six decades, she reminds us that some things never change.

"We were kept very busy with our studies back then but we also had a lot of fun socially," remembered Ruby. "It was my first time away from home and it was nice to meet young people my age."

Ruby, born in April, 1915, was raised in Barrie, Ontario, and attended a local Baptist church. She enrolled at TBC in 1933, at a time when only one general program was offered. The Wilkinsons have two sons. John, the oldest, lives in Toronto while David works in San Francisco, in the field of business. Both are married and each has two children.

For over 40 years, up until 1983, Ruby actively served with Gideon Ministry, in roles such as nurse at various summer camps, national auxiliary secretary and national auxiliary chap-


lain. Ruby and George presently attend Don Valley Bible Chapel, where they have been worshipping for the last 12 years.

MODULAR CLASSES POPULAR




Where I am Supposed to Be

January 17th 1994. My life always seems to be in a rush. It took less than a day for my mother to birth me into this world. It has hardly been longer between the time OTS approved my application and when I hurried into class after a hasty taxi ride from the subway. Birthed into seminary life, I sit in my first class, unshaven, panting after my run from the taxi, and feeling very much as if I have stepped into a new world. I think I feel a gaze of consternation from the professor. Am I too young? Do I look new? How would he tell? I am not sure if this is where I am supposed to be.

I listen to the lecture. This is intimidating. Can I handle this level of thinking? I'd heard that seminary

A distracting phone call told me that my transcripts from Britain had just made it over. I could come to OTS! On the way home that evening I ran to a bank machine in Union station. It ejected into my hand the little slip of paper that would inform me of my financial status. In the swirl of commuter crowds I gazed down at the slip

and breathed a word of praise to God. Money just wired from Britain by my supportive friends was now in my account. It was final. I would come to OTS.

January 16th 1996. I sit in a classroom with four other students. We know each other well and we banter. Dr. Kessler, our professor of Hebrew exegesis, sits down across from us and joins in. The class gets underway and we immerse ourselves deep in the original text of Scripture. Its art comes alive in our minds. Its truth woos the heart. This is stimulating. No, that is an understatement. This is gripping. I am growing and I thank God I am here.
