The Clarity of Scripture

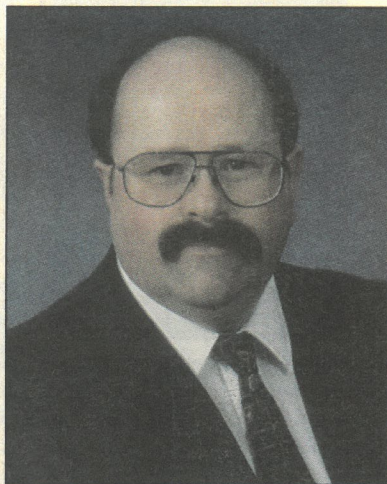
A dangerous idea permeates churches, centres of Christian learning, and secular society. It is simply the view that the Bible is difficult to understand. I would like to get rid of that idea and give *Connection* readers some encouragement in their study of God's Word. One of my favourite sermons has to do with making the case for the clarity of Scripture, rooted in the Bible's own teaching that God's Word is light.

What has led to the popular view that Scripture is difficult? First, the Bible is a big book and this can be threatening. Second, there are some tough verses and sections in God's Word. Third, the Bible deals with profound issues and that brings an element of uncertainty. Fourth, church fights over the Bible give the impression the Bible is easy to misunderstand. Fifth, the emphasis on scholarship about the Bible can lead to the view that only the intellectual elite can understand Genesis to Revelation. Further, reliance on a trained clergy class creates the view that the "average" person need not expect to explore

Scripture. Seventh, a lot of books on hermeneutics (the big word for understanding) make Biblical interpretation seem like nuclear physics. Lastly, the legitimate task of learning the Bible's original languages makes most believers think that they are not really competent to speak about Biblical truth.

These last items point to the ironic fact that even college and seminary life can be harmful for proper Bible study. Learning about theories on every issue in every chapter in every book of the Bible can dull the spirit and the mind. The beauty and power of Scripture can be lost in the maze of commentaries and lexicons and professorial obfuscation. This is not an argument for closing down Tyndale! No, it is simply a recognition for perspective and care in all legitimate study of God's Word.

My hero on this topic is Kevin Quast, a close friend, and associate professor of New Testament at Tyndale. If you ever ask Kevin for help on New Testament Greek, he will tell you repeatedly that the English (or German or French, etc.) text in good translations gives you what

you find if you read the original. This is an obvious deduction to make from the simple fact that the world's best Greek scholars have been working for two thousand years to make good translations.

If the Bible was as difficult as people suggest, would it be possible to teach Scripture to children? Sunday School is proof that Biblical study does not require a double doctorate. Further, is it not insulting to God to say that His Word is not very illuminating? The dust on our Bibles speaks about our priorities, not about God's ability to speak.

Another way to see the light of Scripture is in contrast with truly difficult books. Immediately I think of Immanuel Kant's famous book *Critique of Pure Reason*. The title alone should be

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Tyndale Mourns the Death of Chancellor Tony Tyndale

Vere Stafford Carrington (Tony) Tyndale, dedicated husband, father and friend, died peacefully on August 24 at 9:45 a.m. after a courageous fight against cancer.

Dr. Tyndale was an accomplished man dedicated to integral Christian work. In 1943, at the young age of 17, he enlisted in the British Army and went on to serve in Palestine, Egypt, Liberia, Korea and Germany. During this time, he earned his undergraduate and Master of Arts degrees at Winchester College and Worcester College, Oxford University in England. In 1955, he retired from his military career to move to Canada to

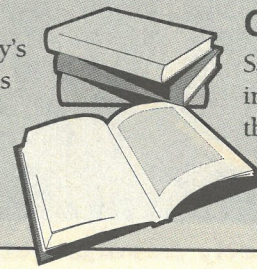

The Bible's Imaginative Window to God

Students of the Bible are literature majors (lovers of literature) whether or not we recognize it. As Leland Ryken reminds us in his *Windows to the World*, "Its most customary way of expressing God's truth is not the sermon or theological outline but the story, the poem, and the vision, all literary forms and products of the imagination." As we study the sacred text we nourish our intellect and heart through our imagination. (We receive truth as much from the right brain as the left.) Northrop Frye in *The Educated Imagination* explains: "The constructs of the imagination tell us things about human life that we don't get in any other way." Therefore, let us not be afraid of the literary nature of Scripture—its story, its poem, its vision—rather, welcome and embrace the height of God's creativity in language.

The poor bungling and inarticulate postman in the film *Il Postino* needs the great poet Pablo Neruda to give him a language to express his soul and his love. The language is metaphor. That same language of love is a thread throughout the pages of our Bible. As we seek solace and hope in our times of pain and need we rush to the Psalms to read of our "shepherd," our "rock," our "fortress," our "shield," our "horn of salvation." When we celebrate the joys of life we exclaim, "The Lord is my chosen portion and my cup. The boundary lines have fallen for me in pleasant places." Jesus used metaphors to define Himself and His relationship with His followers: "I am the Vine," "the Good Shepherd," "the Door," and "the Bread of Life."

Accompanying metaphor is the story. We pattern our lives, not around a set of ideas, but a story. In Ryken's words again, our world view has a "mythology" as well as an "ideology." In a culture which is losing its stories, the Bible gives us a story: a story of our past, present and future. Lovers of the Scriptures read over and over again the stories of the Bible and those stories inform our most basic decisions. When we struggle with gender issues, for instance, we turn to Adam and Eve in the Garden for our model.

Esther, Ruth, Moses, David, and Joseph—all these familiar figures which people our mental landscape—guide us in how we are to think of God, our-

human frailty and failure, nor do they pretend to "solve" the great mystery of evil. Milton, Dostoevsky, Melville—none of the great writers articulate the dilemma more forcefully than Job. The Bible is literature of mystery and power as well as beauty. As much as we can analyze and systematize the theological concepts enumerated in the text, the immensity of its truths remain larger than our boxes.

Humility must accompany our seeking after knowledge. The poet John Milton observes that our education is about "repairing the ruins of our first parents." The satisfactory knowledge that Adam and Eve enjoyed in the Garden is now incomplete. Reading Scripture, like reading nature, is about restoring those enormous gaps in our apprehension of God and ourselves. The psalmist celebrates the knowledge of God in nature's splendors, but he readily admits the more intimate and salvific knowledge of God in Scripture: The "Law of the Lord is perfect," he exclaims, "reviving the soul," "making wise the simple," "rejoicing the heart," "enlightening the eyes." That knowledge of God brings understanding of ourselves and in Frederick Buechner's memorable phrase, "the gospel of our meeting." The Bible is literature which confronts and convicts, living and active, drawing us into the great mystery of God's love and forgiveness.

May we read the Scripture often and carefully and thoughtfully as if our lives depend upon it—for so they do!

selves, and others. The Exodus and the Desert experience of the Jewish people is told over and over again to remind them, generation after generation, that at the core of their lives is God's salvation. Jesus reinforces that story with the symbols of the Lord's Table; we too reenact the same story of deliverance.

Believer and non-believer alike recognize the Bible as a literary masterpiece. The honesty and candor of the Scripture reinforces its integrity. The authors of the Bible do not gloss over

serve with InterVarsity Christian Fellowship, where he worked for 24 years. He went on to work with the South American Missionary Society from 1982-1994 and taught at the University of Toronto's Wycliffe College from 1985-1992.

Dr. Tyndale also completed his Master of Education and Doctorate in Education at the University of Toronto in 1983 and 1987. Since 1994, he has travelled twice a year to work with Anglican Bishops, Clergy and Layleaders to teach and promote the Ministry of the Whole People of God.

Last year, in February 1998, Dr. Tyndale became Chancellor of Tyndale College & Seminary. The school was renamed after William Tyndale, a pioneer Christian leader who lost his life because he dared to translate the Bible so the average person could understand and read it. The appointment of Dr. Tony Tyndale as Chancellor was fitting not only because of his extensive mark on the worldwide Christian community, but also because he is the 13th generation descendant of William Tyndale's brother.

Dr. Tyndale leaves behind his wife Penelope, children Mark, Andrew, Rachel and Nicholas and five grandchildren. He will be greatly missed by the Tyndale community and the positive influence Dr. Tyndale had at the school will continue to touch people in the years to come.

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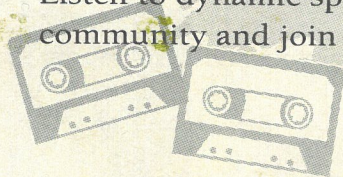

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The 16th Century Reformer

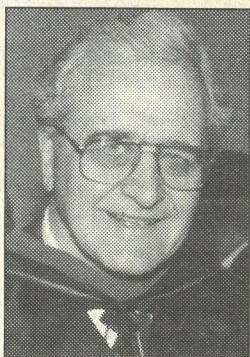

Martin Luther, perhaps more than any other person in Christian history, gives us helpful understanding regarding the nature and use of the Bible. In common with most Christians of his day—and of all days—he believed that the Bible was the revelation of God, inspired by the Holy Spirit so that it truly and faithfully recorded the message of God, and that this message centred in Jesus Christ.

Luther also laid stress on other aspects of Scripture which were not so widely accepted in his day, and of which we also need to be reminded. He emphasized the power of the Bible's message. It is supernaturally powerful, because the Holy Spirit accompanies this message. It produces the miracle of regeneration, creating repentance and faith. And by His Word God rules the Christian, the church and the nations. In fact, through the Bible, God rules over Satan

as well. As Luther expressed it in his great hymn "A Mighty Fortress is Our God" - "one little word shall fell him."

Luther was especially convinced that the preaching of the Bible was powerful, and this provided the power which made all the other ministrations of the church and the Christian effective. He also insisted on the study of the Bible in its original languages, and then of the necessity of translation into the

vernacular, dethroning the Latin Vulgate and allowing the Bible to be rendered meaningful for each generation and culture.

Once when I was speaking at the Lutheran Bible Institute in Seattle in the 1970s, when there was a good deal of discussion about the nature of the Bible, I asked the principal about his view of the Bible. He did not, as many would

have, enter into a discussion of biblical inspiration, but in good Luther form he simply stated that "the Bible is where you meet Jesus Christ." A salutary emphasis indeed.

My most treasured book is my father's Thompson-Chain Reference Bible. Dad was a preacher, and I was the fortunate son who inherited the Bible he loved—the one from which he preached and gained spiritual nourishment.

While I love to hold this object of memory (Dad passed away in 1971), I especially enjoy tracking his steps through the Bible. How do I track his interests? By the pages that are soiled and torn with much usage. They tell me of his loving interest and those places he most often preached from or simply read.

One obvious place of much reading is Philippians 2:4. I can see Dad mulling over Paul's words: "Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others." How wonderfully Dad reflected those words in his life.

Nothing can be treasured more than God's Word.

Be nourished by it.

Be guided by it.

Allow it to build hope, faith and love.

God's Word is Christ,

And we are His.

May it grow up in you in Christ-like proportions. God's living Word!

a clue that we are in for some heavy slogging. Here is a little gem for your consideration, picked at random for your delight: "Everything actual is possible; from this proposition there naturally follows, in accordance with the logical rules of conversion, the merely particular proposition, that some possible is actual."

Of course, the best way to realize that Scripture can be understood is by reading it and allowing it to speak for itself. Over the centuries it is the clarity

of God's Word that explains why error has been corrected, heresy has been exposed, evil has been answered, and goodness has been lived. The illuminating power of the Bible is shown most clearly by the fact that it brings us to Jesus, the incarnate Word, so that we can hear His words, feel the power of His life, and allow His light to shine in our dark and confused world.

Dr. Beverley is currently on sabbatical. He is working on several book projects and preparing a major manuscript studying the Unification Church. Dr. Beverley will return to teaching the fall of 2000.

The Post-Christian Mind

Harry Blamires

In Paul's letter to the Christians in Rome, he urged his readers to not be conformed to this world, but rather to be transformed by the renewing of their minds. In order to do this, we must know and understand the world in which we are living, be able to critique it and respond to it.

For many years Harry Blamires has been helping Christians with this task and has been writing books which challenge Christians to think about their place in the world, their relationship to the culture and at the same time, to defend a Christian way of thinking in a non-Christian world. In his latest book, *The Post-Christian Mind*, Blamires examines how our culture has successfully created an environment where the subjective is valued over the objective truth of Christianity: where truth has been made relative rather than absolute and where good has been called evil and evil called good. To do this, Blamires looks at a number of areas of life including the family, the church, the media, economics and politics. In so doing, we are forced to examine just how much we have all allowed ourselves to be transformed by the world around us, rather than seeking to be used as instruments of God for the transformation of our world for Him and for His glory.

While most of the examples in the book are drawn from events in the United Kingdom, this is nevertheless a book which has wider application for life in Canada. *The Post-Christian Mind* is written in the best tradition of Christian journalism as practised by G.K. Chesterton, Dorothy L. Sayers and C.S. Lewis earlier in this century. You may not agree with all of Blamires' conclusions, but it is an excellent book that you should read if you are concerned about being salt and light in the world in which you are living.

Amy Loewan's Biography



At birth, she was named for long-awaited peace. Born in Hong Kong in September 1945, Amy Loewan came into the world as Luk Wai-Ping, the youngest daughter of five children. Ping, from the Chinese character depicting 'peace,' and Wai, meaning 'gift' was a fitting name for a child coming into a world yearning for a new code of living and vision of peace in the aftermath of the Second World War.

In her first profession as an occupational therapist, Loewan began a lifelong investment in working with people. She also had begun to explore art in earnest by the time she moved to Edmonton, Alberta, 20 years ago.

In 1981, Loewan became a Canadian citizen. Her artistic journey led to the completion of her Master of Fine Arts Degree in painting from the University of Alberta in 1995. Many of her works have integrated her eastern influences such as Chinese calligraphy with western postmodernist art practices.

Since 1976, Loewan has exhibited in major cities in Canada as well as New York and Melbourne, Australia. In the summer of 1998, she exhibited an installation entitled *Earnestly and Truly*, a community project as part of The Works: A Visual Arts Celebration in Edmonton.

In the last year, Loewan has won two national art competitions. In December 1998, she was awarded the Canadian Artists and Producers Professional Relations Tribunal Award for Excellence in the Arts commemorating the 50th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Most recently, in June 1999, Loewan was the first prize winner of the Tyndale College & Seminary Expressing Christian Faith Through Art competition.

Incarnating Christ in One's Life Key to Evangelism

For JoAnne Cinanni, whom the Lord has used to bring more than 40 people to Christ in the past six years, evangelism is most effective when it is incarnated in the life of the believer, rather than just simply spoken. In fact, her guiding principle is to "Preach Jesus, but if at all possible, don't use words."

A 1967 graduate of the college, with a Bachelor of Religious Education Degree, JoAnne, who is single, describes more of an approach to life than an approach to evangelism. "I have found that the way the Lord directed me is basically 'love them to Jesus.' I really believe if we're walking in close fellowship with the Lord, people will come and ask us what's different about us."

For the past 20 years, JoAnne has been a women's representative in Colorado Springs, Colorado, at the international headquarters of The Navigators. Until last Christmas, for 10 years, she also worked eight hours a week at a weight loss centre, as a behavioural educational counsellor.

"I did that in order to meet non-Christians, because otherwise it's very hard to be part of their world," said JoAnne. "That's where a lot of my ministry came from."

"People are drawn to us and attracted to us because it's the Lord in us that they're attracted to," she says, noting that a close relationship with the

Lord is essential to effective evangelism. In fact, she likes to refer to John 5:19 on this point: "Jesus gave them this answer: 'I tell you the truth, the Son can do nothing by himself; he can do only what he sees his Father doing, because whatever the Father does the Son also does.'"

JoAnne finds that when the Lord uses her to lead a woman to Christ through friendship, often other members of that person's family are subsequently saved as well. "When a person trusts the Lord, then so many others do in their families," she said. "There seems to be a pattern throughout the Bible where families trust the Lord, especially in the New Testament."

"To me, prayer is everything. It doesn't happen without prayer," she adds. "I feel that God extends an invitation to join Him where He is working. Without Him, I can't do anything. As I stay connected to Him in that innermost relationship, things happen." Another of her favorite verses is Proverbs 16:3: "Commit to the Lord whatever you do, and your plans will succeed."

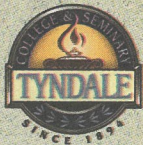

Living as the Local People Do, to Reach Them for Christ

For Randall and Rita Mah, life on the mission field means living as the local people do, and in the mountainous country of Lesotho, in southern Africa, that means living in a one-room stone hut with grass roof, having no electricity, pumping water by hand, and travelling by horseback.

The seminary graduates were on the mission field for two years where they taught Bible studies in the local language, Sesotho, and helped establish and maintain Bible clubs in different schools, to which they travelled on horseback. They returned to Canada in November 1997.

Prior to their mission work in Africa, Randall and Rita attended the seminary. Randall graduated with a MDiv in Youth Ministry in 1993 while Rita received a one-year certificate in Christian Studies in 1995. (Tyndale is a family affair for Rita's family, as her three sisters, Estella Tse, Betty Abellera and Connie Wong, have all taken courses at Tyndale.)

Both Randall and Rita said that the seminary prepared them well for life on the mission field. Rita said the mission courses helped provide a solid foundation in terms of what to expect, and resources that would be available, before going overseas. Meanwhile, for Randall, seminary helped provide focus. "My intention in going to seminary was to pursue the possibility of doing mission work. Definitely part of my preparation was discovering whether I belonged in

the field or didn't belong in the field."

Before going to Lesotho, Rita and Randall had also gone on short-term mission experiences, either individually or together, in Belgium, Brazil and Jamaica.

Since coming back from Africa, Randall has been retooling by taking courses at Tyndale towards his DMin degree through Fuller Theological Seminary. Rita has been attending Seneca College where she completed the

International Health Program in partnership with the Missionary Health Institute.

Randall and Rita plan to return to Lesotho in the fall, this time with their six-month-old daughter, Tabitha. They will be in Lesotho for the next three years, as full-time missionaries with Africa Inland Mission, but have been seconded to Scripture Union where Randall has been asked to lead the high school ministry coordinator's

position in the national office in the capital city of Maseru.

"My ministry will take us all over the country," said Randall. "We're now overseeing all of the high schools for the Scripture Union clubs throughout Lesotho. The primary way that I'll be doing that is through training teachers or student leaders, to run their own Bible clubs."

Rita, meanwhile, will be helping part-time with an AIDS project, also for Scripture Union, as well as teaching/training, and getting biblically based curriculum into the schools.

PREACH THE WORD:

Addressing the Famine of our Day

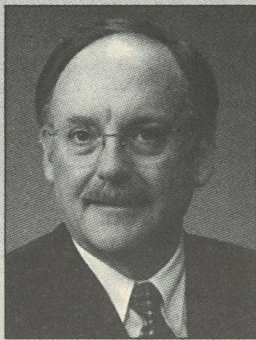
"Preach the Word, brothers!" The gravelly admonition from Lloyd Perry's beginning homiletics class still rings in my ears. Following the advice of the apostle Paul and countless communicators of the Gospel who have followed him, our professor told us (as young seminarians) that the task has not changed. There is something timeless about the truth of the Word of God and its impact on a human life. There is something dynamic as well. What is the role of the Word of God, the Bible, in the life of the church in the 21st century? Is it the same as in the 1st century? How do we put into practice the "Preach the Word" clarion call?

Some see preaching as a "science." We are taught to understand the original languages and interpret the writings in their grammatical-historical context. We learn how to "rightly divide the Word of God," to understand the subtle nuances of grammar and syntax, and to place high regard on the literary nature of Scripture. We determine which portion is from the hand of the original author and which may have been added at a later date. We decide relevant application for today. Preaching which reflects the science of Scripture analysis alone can become simply a lecture of arguments for and against a particular view. The audience may be left in awe at the insight from the Word but may experience little of its redemptive power. Is this really preaching the Word in the way that the apostle Paul had in mind?

While some may preach the technical nuances of the Word, others approach preaching as an "art form." With this approach the focus is on communication skills, careful word-crafting, logical flow of ideas and structure, the skillful use of dramatic effect, humorous illustrations and anecdotes, and other delivery devices to capture the attention of the audience. Dialogical preaching, the experiment of the 60s and 70s, where two preachers would actually enter into shared dialogue in a sermon, has been replaced in the 90s by narrative preaching, where the telling of a story, Biblical or contemporary, has captured the imagination of the preaching world. Technology has made an entrance as well. Now the outline, illustrations, quotes and just about anything else is available through PowerPoint. Taking a "mouse" into the pulpit is the sign of a high-tech preacher!

The science of preaching can result in dull listening, while the art-form of preaching can leave an audience simply fascinated by the event. Even with these wonderful tools in

use, do we hear preaching that is making a difference in our culture? Are we not in danger of using the "bells and whistles" of study and/or technology to gain an audience but in reality losing a generation: impressing but not empowering? Where do we see the impact of preaching the Word that was experienced in the secular 1st century? Where do we see the world being turned upside down by the manifest power of the Holy Spirit? Where do we see multitudes of lost and seeking people from all walks of life discovering the liberating Good News of Jesus Christ? I believe we are suffering, not from a

shortage of accurate commentary and exposition of the Word, nor from the absence of cutting-edge technology to attract an awestruck crowd, but from a Biblical demonstration of the Spirit's power (see Romans 15:18, 19 and 1 Corinthians 2:1-4 to begin to discover the model). When Paul preached, the authenticating signs which drew crowds and changed lives were not mind-bending in complexity nor distracting in visual display, but powerful to change lives. The Spirit of God, revealed through the anointed preaching of Paul and the other apostles, changed their world, actually turning it upside down. There are places in our world today where this type of

blessing seems to be falling, but on the whole, our western preaching seeks to satisfy the mind first, the itchy curiosity of technology second, and the radical call to repentance and life change last. I believe we can use the tools of the mind and technology in their appropriate place, but we must come back to the release of the Spirit through the Word of God if we are to reclaim the people of our culture for the Kingdom. Maybe what

we are facing has been prophesied to us by Amos:

"The days are coming," declares the Sovereign LORD, "when I will send a famine through the land—not a famine of food or a thirst for water, but a famine of hearing the words of the LORD. Men will stagger from sea to sea and wander from north to east, searching for the word of the LORD, but they will not find it."

AMOS 8:11-12

It is our call to "Preach the Word" to our generation. We must continue to teach students to be relevant practitioners of both the science and the art-form of preaching, and pray that they will catch the added dimension of spiritual power that brings Kingdom results in every generation.

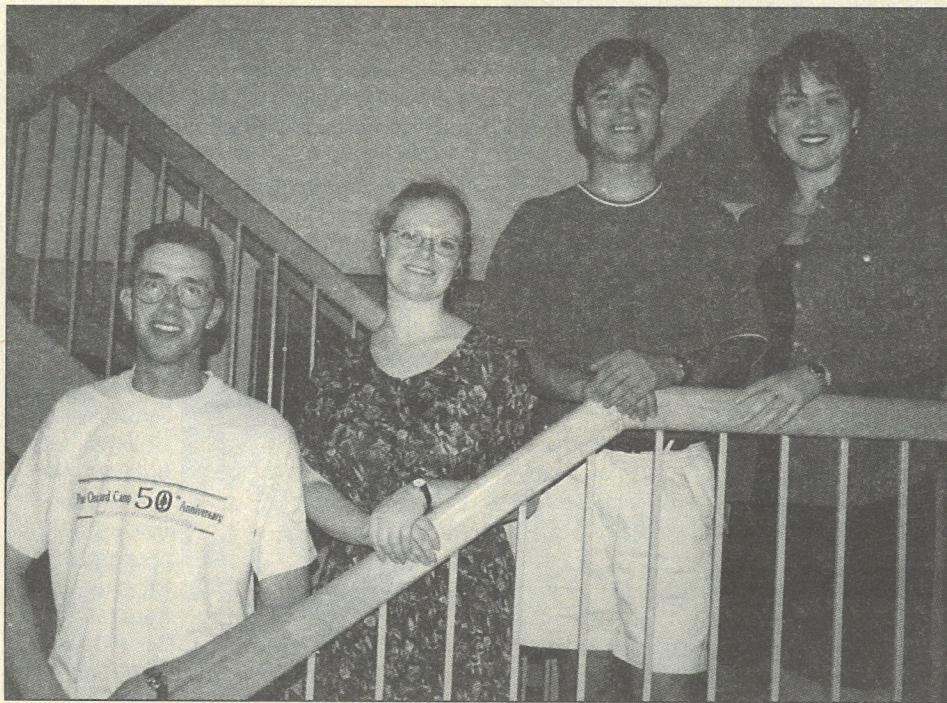
The newly installed student council at Tyndale Seminary hopes to increase student involvement this year, in addition to fostering within students' hearts a burning desire for the Lord.

James Vold passed into his heavenly reward after an extensive period of painful struggle with kidney problems. After a failed kidney transplant in 1985, Rev. Vold spent three days each week on dialysis.

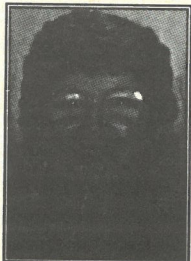
Rev. Vold was involved in Christian ministry for over half a century. His ministry included pastorates in Ottawa and St. Catharines, Ontario and Glenside, Pennsylvania. In addition he served in a number of churches as interim pastor. Rev. Vold was not only a gifted preacher but also a very capable Bible teacher. Part of his ministry included Tyndale (then Ontario Bible College). In the fall of 1976, Rev. Vold commenced teaching

at our evening school, offering courses in both the diploma and credit divisions. He was one of our most popular teachers and his classes were always full. In 1981 Rev. 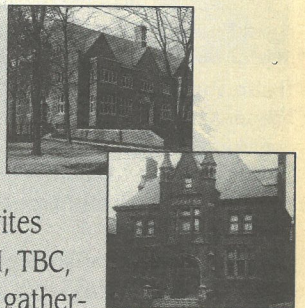
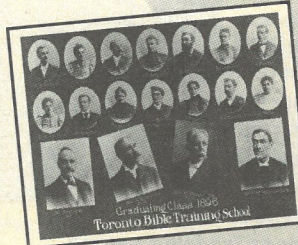

Money Matters "Demutualization" and You

Currently, there are five mutual life insurance companies who are beginning the process of "demutualizing." These include Canada Life, Industrial-Alliance, Manufacturers Life, Mutual Life and Sun Life. Mutual life insurance companies will begin the process of "demutualizing" so they can become stock companies which will have shares listed on a stock exchange. Estimates indicate that there will be a transfer of approximately \$11 billion in cash and stock to about 2.5 million Canadian policy holders.

If you own a life insurance policy in a company which is "demutualizing," the insurance companies are offering you a choice: you can choose cash or stock.

The Cash Option

If you choose the cash option for your demutualization benefit, Revenue Canada will see that income as a "Corporate Dividend" and will require you to pay tax immediately.

The Stock Option

If you choose the stock option, then you are only required to pay tax when you sell the shares. Although you received the shares at no cost, you will be required to pay capital gains on the proceeds, because the total amount is seen as a capital gain.

Charitable Donation Option

If you choose the stock option, then it is possible for you to donate your shares to an organization like Tyndale and significantly reduce your taxes. Because of special tax laws which are in effect until 2002, if you donate your shares to an organization like Tyndale, you can reduce your capital gains tax by 50% - but only until 2002! In every income bracket, the total tax savings is lower than the cash or stock option.

For Example:

If you sell your shares for (assuming a \$0 cost base)	\$100
Your taxable capital gain income is (75%)	\$75
If you donate your shares, your capital gain is reduced by half	\$37.50
BUT, you get a tax receipt for the full amount!	\$100

This same principle applies to all publicly traded shares when they are donated to an organization like Tyndale.
