DEDICATION

This edition of the AMBASSADOR is affectionately dedicated to the Reverend James N. Bedford, B.A., B.D., D.D., who was President of the London Bible Institute and Theological Seminary from February 1, 1945 to May 21, 1954. The ten graduating classes and two undergraduate classes who came to know and love "The Prexy" esteemed him very highly in the Lord for his work's sake.

Dr. Bedford was born in Houghton, N.Y., the third son of the Reverend and Mrs. Dean S. Bedford. He graduated from the Pastors' Course at the Moody Bible Institute in 1932, and received his Arts degree from Houghton College in 1936. It was at Houghton that he met Janet Donely who later became Mrs. Bedford. Dr. Bedford then accepted a student pastorate and continued studies at Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Philadelphia earning his B.D. degree in May, 1939. In July of the same year he was ordained to the gospel ministry.

In the fall of 1944, after a fruitful ministry in New York State, Dr. Bedford was approached by the London Bible Institute to become President of the school, and, believing this to be the leading of the Lord, he came to London in February, 1945, to assume this new responsibility.

The development and expansion of the school, on a firm Scriptural foundation, under the leadership of Dr. Bedford, have occasioned much thanksgiving to God. In recognition of his work in the field of Christian education, Houghton College conferred the honourary degree of Doctor of Divinity on the President in 1952.

We know that the school will always have a special place in Dr. Bedford's heart, and those who worked with him, those who studied under his teaching, and those who fellowshipped with him in the school's wide ministry, sincerely wish him God's richest blessing in his new field of service, being assured that, "The steps of a good man are ordered of the Lord and He delighteth in his ways."

Statement of Jaith



We salute the housemothers for the splendid way in which they make a "home" away from home.








The Faculty


Chapel services are much anticipated by the school family as we take a break from classes to gather together in the Hooper Memorial Chapel.


Spring Banquet=

Treasured Moments


The week-end of October First began at 2 a.m. Friday, when the School halls were gaily decorated. A few hours later the "skippers," glowing with excitement, "skipped".
